Ordinary Time 10 June 2018

Last Tuesday Chris Gordon from the Archdiocesan Life, Marriage and Family Office came to our parish to give a talk titled 'God's Design For Marriage - Celebrating 50 years of Humane Vitae.' It was probably the worst day of the week in terms of weather, with near-constant pouring down of solid rain all throughout. My worst fear was on the brink of being realised when, at first, there was just me and the speaker in the parish hall. Fortunately, some other people started to arrive, although not enough to require two hands for them to be counted. Not that I was overly surprised by such minute response, but I was sorry that the talk was not heard by more people because, honestly, it edified me with the beauty of church teaching which shone through the prophetic voice of Pope Paul VI.

As some of us might know, the pope's encyclical Humane Vitae was highly controversial when it came out in the unforgettable year of 1968, for the simple reason that it defied the expectation of an overwhelming majority who thought that contraception would now be declared 'permissible' by the Catholic Church. Given the sexual revolution of the 1960s, Humane Vitae probably seemed to many like an impossible teaching to accept. Even today, especially today, the idea of having 'as many children as physically possible' would seem horrifying to many couples who are under tremendous pressure on account of the fragile nature of existing in a world where nothing seems certain anymore. But, of course, that is not quite what Pope Paul VI actually taught. He merely re-articulated, perhaps with stunning clarity, the perennial principle that manipulations of the marital act could not be in accord with the Creator's design; there had to be another way - a far better way for the couples themselves - if only we could...trust! (Enter 'Natural Family Planning') He predicted four consequences of using artificial methods: increased marital infidelity, a general lowering of moral standards, objectification especially of women and, finally, civil authorities' imposition of unsound sexual ethics on the whole society (think of how dangerous it is now to publicly disagree with what is being "legalised"). Pretty indisputable, if you ask me.

We are not arbiters in the matters of truth; we are merely its humble guardians and interpreters. Therefore 'it could never be right for [the Church] to declare lawful what is in fact unlawful, since that, by its very nature, is always opposed to the true good of man.' (Pope Paul VI) Compromising on the matters of truth, for whatsoever reason, can only lead to the demise of all, no matter whom it might please for a short while. Nevertheless, that is not to say that Christians are to be harsh on those who are struggling to live by the light of truth, for, by doing so, they would compromise the integrity of the very truth they supposedly stand for. Jesus ate with sinners; and so the Church is called to mercifully reach out to the "weak" - those on whom the splendour of truth is yet to dawn - and to love them 'until it hurts.' (C.f. St Mother Teresa)

Carlton Parish—Fifth Talk on Forum Series

The Church as a Community of Dialogue is the topic of the next talk in the Carlton Parish Forum – "The Challenges of the Times". The speaker will be Father Gerard Kelly, who was until recently President of the Catholic Institute, He continues to lecture at the Institute. He is the Editor of the "Australian Catholic Record".

As a community of dialogue, the Church can be a model of what is possible when people learn once again the art of dialogue. In this way the Church will be an instrument in God's plan for one new humanity (Cf. Eph 2:15-16).

First Reading Gen 3:9-15

I will make you enemies of each other: your offspring and her offspring.

The Lord God called to the man after he had eaten of the tree. 'Where are you?' he asked. 'I heard the sound of you in the garden;' he replied 'I was afraid because I was naked, so I hid.' 'Who told you that you were naked?' he asked. 'Have you been eating of the tree I forbade you to eat?' The man replied, 'It was the woman you put with me; she gave me the fruit, and I ate it.' Then the Lord God asked the woman, 'What is this you have done?' The woman replied, 'The serpent tempted me and I ate.'

Then the Lord God said to the serpent, '

Because you have done this, 'Be accursed beyond all cattle, all wild beasts.
You shall crawl on your belly and eat dust every day of your life.
I will make you enemies of each other: you and the woman, your offspring and her offspring. It will crush your head and you will strike its heel.'

Second Reading 2 Cor 4:13-5:1

We believe, and therefore we speak.

As we have the same spirit of faith that is mentioned in scripture – I believed, therefore I spoke - we too believe and therefore we too speak, knowing that he who raised the Lord Jesus to life will raise us with Jesus in our turn, and put us by his side and you with us. You see, all this is for your benefit, so that the more grace is multiplied among people, the more thanksgiving there will be, to the glory of God.

That is why there is no weakening on our part, and instead, though this outer man of ours may

be falling into decay, the inner man is renewed day by day. Yes, the troubles which are soon over, though they weigh little, train us for the carrying of a weight of eternal glory which is out of all proportion to them. And so we have no eyes for things that are visible, but only for things that are invisible; for visible things last only for a time, and the invisible things are eternal.

For we know that when the tent that we live in on earth is folded up, there is a house built by God for us, an everlasting home not made by human hands, in the heavens.

Gospel Acclamation Jn 12:31. 32

Alleluia, alleluia!

The prince of this world will now be cast out, and when I am lifted up from the earth I will draw all to myself, says the Lord.
Alleluia!

Gospel Mk 3:20-35

It is the end of Satan.

Jesus went home with his disciples, and such a crowd collected that they could not even have a meal. When his relatives heard of this, they set out to take charge of him, convinced he was out of his mind.

The scribes who had come down from Jerusalem were saying, 'Beelzebul is in him,' and, 'It is through the prince of devils that he casts devils out.' So he called them to him and spoke to them in parables, 'How can Satan cast out Satan? If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot last. And if a household is divided against itself, that household can never stand. Now if Satan has rebelled against himself and is divided, he cannot stand either - it is the end of him. But no one can make his way into a strong man's house and burgle his property unless he has tied up the strong man first. Only then can he burgle his house.

'I tell you solemnly, all men's sins will be forgiven, and all their blasphemies; but let anyone blaspheme against the Holy Spirit and he will never have forgiveness: he is guilty of an eternal sin.' This was because they were saying, 'An unclean spirit is in him.'

His mother and brothers now arrived and, standing outside, sent in a message asking for him. A crowd was sitting round him at the time the message was passed to him, 'Your mother and brothers and sisters are outside asking for you.' He replied, 'Who are my mother and my brothers?' And looking round at those sitting in a circle about him, he said, 'Here are my mother and my brothers. Anyone who does the will of God, that person is my brother and sister and mother.'

The first way to reject the real Jesus is to domesticate him, and that is what members of his blood family were trying to do. They thought he was 'out of his mind', madly putting himself [and them] in harm's way and he had to be restrained.

Have you or I tried to domesticate Jesus Christ, to reduce him to a non-threatening Jesus-meek-and-mild? If so, we are closer to the family of Nazareth standing just outside his circle, ready to run for cover, than to the new family seated around him, really listening to him and therefore vulnerable.

The second way is to misconstrue all the evidence of Jesus' mission on earth and to claim that he must be in league with the devil, 'He has an unclean spirit'.

If you do this publicly, as did these religious leaders, then you have deliberately put God's plan for the salvation of others at risk, and it is this which is unforgivable. This is real blasphemy.

We might pause for a moment, implore the grace of God, determine to really hear the Gospels, discern the will of God for our lives, and so come back within the ultimate family allegiance of those who dare to call God 'our Father'.
