Continuing from last week's bulletin on 'Mass intention' - not the most interesting of topics, I apologise! - there are some practical questions and other related questions which still need to be answered. Recently I discovered a big stack of professionally produced note slips which, I presume, were Fr Paul Smithers' work. I am not sure for what purpose they were made, but they seem ideal for Mass intentions. So, if you wish to request Mass to be offered for particular intentions, please find a note slip at the church entrance, write down your intentions on it and then either give it to me in person or place it on the altar just before Mass. Now, **here is an important principle**: if it is a weekday Mass I will be happy to announce the intentions (unless you indicate otherwise); however, if it is a Sunday Mass, then, I will be reluctant to draw attention to the particular intentions, except when, for example, there is evidence of special effort to gather as a family. In all of the cases, the best practice would be for you to actually be at that Mass, carrying the particular intentions in your heart!

In Loving Memory (bulletin): Names of recently deceased parishioners will automatically qualify. No stipend is required for a name to be included here. Simply let Margaret our secretary (or me) know. If you wish to make a donation to the parish, please place it in the second collection. It seems to me that the current list is rather long and may need to be refreshed more regularly. Please do the same for those who are sick in the parish.

Prayers of the faithful: Names of recently deceased parishioners will automatically qualify. Once again, no stipend is required for a name to be included here. Simply let Margaret our secretary (or me) know. If you wish to make a donation to the parish, please place it in the second collection. Please be mindful that we want to avoid ending up with too many names here on any given Sunday. So, if possible, please try to limit the names to those who are recently deceased or whose anniversaries occur very close to that particular Sunday. Exceptions can be made, of course, in cases of heartfelt need. Please do the same for those who are sick in the parish.

November Masses: A book will be placed on a stand in front of the altar. Please write down the names of holy souls in the book. All Masses in November will be offered for those whose names are written in the book. Feel free to be creative about what you write down. Also, rather than just remembering the same ones who are probably "well prayed for" why not try to offer Mass for those who may not have anyone to pray for them? Again, the best practice would be for you to actually be at the November Masses, carrying the particular intentions in your heart!

Whilst I want everyone to know that money is definitely not necessary for Mass intentions, it is not my "intention" (in the normal sense of the word!) to do away completely with the time honoured practice of Mass offerings - Mass intentions which come with a stipend. For those who wish to make a Mass offering, the usual envelopes will remain at the usual places. But please do indicate clearly what else you want (e.g. names in Loving Memory or Prayers of the faithful) other than that Mass be offered quietly for the particular intentions, at the slow~rate of one Mass offering per Mass. Hopefully, fingers crossed, it will be a long~time before the subject of Mass intention needs to be brought up again!

ALL SAINTS' DAY AND ALL SOULS' DAY

All Saints' Day (also known as All Hallows' Day or Hallowmas) is the day after All Hallows' Eve (Hallowe'en). A feast day celebrated on 1st November by Anglicans and Roman Catholics, it is an opportunity to remember all saints and martyrs, known and unknown, throughout Christian history. Remembering saints and martyrs and dedicating a specific day to them each year has been a Christian tradition since the 4th century AD, but it wasn't until 609AD that Pope Boniface IV decided to remember all martyrs. Originally 13th May was designated as the Feast of All Holy Martyrs. In 837AD, Pope Gregory IV extended the festival to remember all the saints, changed its name to Feast of All Saints and the date to 1st November.

All Souls' Day on 2nd November (or the 3rd if the 2nd is a Sunday) is an opportunity to commemorate the faithful departed. We remember and pray for the souls of people who are in Purgatory - the place (or state) in which those who have died atone for their less grave sins before being granted the vision of God in Heaven (called Beatific vision).

Reasoning behind this stems from the notion that when a soul leaves the body, it is not entirely cleansed from venial (minor) sins. Through the power of prayer and self-denial, the faithful left on earth may be able to help these souls gain the Beatific Vision they seek, bringing the soul eternal sublime happiness. A 7/8th century AD prayer, The Office of the Dead, is read out in churches on All Souls' Day. Other rituals include the offering of Requiem Mass for the dead, visiting family graves and reflecting on lost loved ones. In Mexico, on el dia de los muertos (Day of the Dead), people take picnics to their family graves and leave food out for their dead relatives.

Whilst praying for the dead is an ancient Christian tradition, it was Odilo, Abbot of Cluny (France) who, in 998AD, designated a specific day for remembering and praying for those in the purgatory. This started as a local feast in his monasteries and spread throughout the Catholic Church towards the end of the 10th century AD.

A plenary indulgence may be gained for the dead, once only, by visiting a church on 2nd November and praying the Lord's Prayer and the Creed. Three conditions are required for gaining the indulgence; sacramental confession, Eucharistic communion, and prayer for the Pope's intentions. http://www.bbc.co.uk/religion/religions/christianity/holydays/allsaints_1.shtml

'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.

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Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

Throughout this liturgical year we have examined several aspects of our faith. We have pondered the history of our salvation, the merciful compassion of God, God's willingness to lead us out of the bondage of our addictions. We have meditated often and long on the person of Jesus, on his life and death, on the meaning of his sacrifice, on his resurrection, on his influence in our lives today. We have considered our ongoing transformation disciples of Jesus, baptised into his death and resurrection, commissioned to bring the news of his love to all those with whom we come into contact. We have reflected on all of these wonderful deeds of God, and now we must ask the question: What difference has it made?

Have we merely acquired some information about the biblical readings. about our religious ancestors, about the ministry of Jesus and the life of the early church? Or have our eyes really been opened; have we been enabled to leave behind whatever prevents us from living the Christian life fully, to abandon our exiles or the trappings of our former lives? Have we accepted genuinely the Christian more responsibilities that are ours as baptised followers of Christ, in our own personal lives, in our families, in our relationships with others, at the workplace? To what degree have we been transformed into Christ? How open have we become to the action of the Spirit in our lives? Have we been made a new creation? And do we recognise Christ in our midst?
