First Sunday in Advent 1 December 2019

By a surprising coincidence I once came across a person of utmost prominence at a retreat centre. Unbeknownst to the rest of the world, he was quietly making a retreat in preparation for being installed in a role of utmost magnitude (hint: this person visited us in August). That and the fact that I was yet to make a retreat this year prompted me to go away for a few days of "retreat" in the lead-up to my own installation as Parish Priest (PP). I was not a very good retreatant though, breaking silence by writing numerous emails and making phones, etc. But I still hoped that God's grace would somehow crack through the hardened shell of my habitualised chaos.

When I finally started to feel a little more settled, I asked myself, 'Why am I being installed, especially when I am already PP on paper, in a parish I am already familiar with?' Then a joke came to mind: Why did the priest ask to be installed? Because he was hoping that the bishop might bring along a user's manual - 'Parish Priesthood for Dummies!' One of the things I have come to realise since being appointed PP is just how little I seem to have in terms of *vision* for the parish. But it is famously written in Scripture, 'Without vision people perish!' (Proverb 29:18)

This brings me to the next uncomfortable point: What kind of PP keeps telling his parishioners such uninspiring things? Does he not understand leadership? Is he in trouble and crying out for help? Or is he...just an idiot? I am afraid that all of the above are at least partially true. But the primary reason for me - the one I am most conscious of anyway - is this: I wish there to be as little discrepancy as possible (within reason) between where I am and where my parishioners think I am. Unconventional, I know, to start a relationship on such unflattering grounds. But something tells me that the final outcome might be better in this way.

We live in a highly sophisticated world. But with sophistication comes sophisticated dangers. For example, even liars are using so called "fact -checking" in order to convince others that they are telling the truth! And it is deeply unsettling to be surrounded by the milieu of sophisticated corruption - it is like seeing the cracks appear on apartments built in haste during the boom. I believe that in order for us to build something truly great there is need to return to basics first, for example, something as basic as me telling you how things really are and...you doing the same for me too! Here is something Pope Francis wrote to young people but I think it applies to all parishioners of good will: 'If you see a priest at risk, because he has lost the joy of his ministry, or seeks affective compensation, or is taking the wrong path, remind him of his commitment to God and his people, remind him of the Gospel and urge him to hold to his course.' (Christus Vivit 100) —>Pge 3

Not having even thought about the need for a vision until recently, my strategy thus far has been to try to be consistent in regard to the basic virtues of truth and justice - what I hoped would be the fertile ground on which things of substance could grow someday. There are two other things that seem indispensable for any real growth in our parish: the first is YOU! Parishioners! Any vision in which you don't have a main role is inconceivable. *Growing together* is going to be the underlying essence of what I envision. The other - the deficiency of which always haunts me deep down - is love. Ever since my ordination in 2010/2011, I have been moving to a new post at least once every two years. And so the idea of longterm commitment has come as a greater surprise than I expected. But I think I am happier now than ever before about the possibility of a longterm commitment growing into a loving one and feel privileged that my first experience of this might start here at Regina Coeli.

Archdiocese of Sydney Safeguarding Training and WWCC

The Archdiocese of Sydney Safeguarding Office requires all parish volunteers to complete the "Online Safeguarding Induction Training for Volunteers". A number of our volunteers have completed this Archdiocese Safeguarding training in 2017. If you are a new volunteer or did not complete the training in 2017, it is essential you complete the training.

Also, all volunteering in liturgical and child related ministries in the parish must provide a "Working With Children Check" (WWCC) number to the parish, together with your name and date of birth so that the parish can verify the status of the clearance. This includes Acolytes, Ministers of the Word (readers), Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion and children's liturgy. First Reading Is 2:1-5

The Lord will gather all nations in eternal peace in the kingdom of God.

The vision of Isaiah son of Amoz, concerning Judah and Jerusalem.

In the days to come
the mountain of the Temple of the Lord
shall tower above the mountains
and be lifted higher than the hills.
All the nations will stream to it,
peoples without number will come to it;
and they will say:

'Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the Temple of the God of Jacob that he may teach us his ways so that we may walk in his paths; since the Law will go out from Zion, and the oracle of the Lord from Jerusalem.'

He will wield authority over the nations and adjudicate between many peoples; these will hammer their swords into ploughshares, their spears into sickles.

Nation will not lift sword against nation, there will be no more training for war.

O House of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the Lord.

Second Reading Rom 13:11-14

The time has come, our salvation is near.

You know 'the time' has come: you must wake up now: our salvation is even nearer than it was when we were converted. The night is almost over, it will be daylight soon – let us give up all the things we prefer to do under the cover of the dark; let us arm ourselves and appear in the light. Let us live decently as people do in the daytime: no drunken orgies, no promiscuity or licentiousness, and no wrangling or jealousy. Let your armour be the Lord Jesus Christ.

Gospel Acclamation Ps 84:8

Alleluia, alleluia! Lord, show us your mercy and love, and grant us your salvation. Alleluia!

Gospel Mt 24:37-44

Stay awake, you must be ready.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'As it was in Noah's day, so will it be when the Son of Man comes. For in those days before the Flood people were eating, drinking, taking wives, taking husbands, right up to the day Noah went into the ark, and they suspected nothing till the Flood came and swept all away. It will be like this when the Son of Man comes. Then of two men in the fields one is taken, one left; of two women at the millstone grinding, one is taken, one left.

'So stay awake, because you do not know the day when your master is coming. You may be quite sure of this that if the householder had known at what time of the night the burglar would come, he would have stayed awake and would not have allowed anyone to break through the wall of his house. Therefore, you too must stand ready because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.'

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Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

We may be accustomed to think of Advent as the time when we prepare for the coming of God, but the readings also train our attention on our own journey to God. We see this most clearly in this first Sunday with readings that tell us the identity of the pilgrims, the destination toward which they travel, and the way of life that is required of them on their journey. As the Vatican Council has proclaimed: We are a pilgrim people.

Both the reading from Isaiah and the psalm response speak of the pilgrimage to the mountain of the Lord, the place where God can be found. Although the psalm speaks about Jerusalem and refers to the temple there, the broader theological significance of the mountain, the city and the temple is one and the same. They represent the presence of God in our midst, and this presence is the goal of our striving. There are clear directions about how we are to live while we are on this pilgrimage to God. In Isaiah we learn that we must put away our instruments of violence and hatred, our swords and our spears. Lest we pick them up again. we are told to convert them into lifeproducing implements, into ploughs and pruning hooks. Paul exhorts us to put away our deeds of darkness and self-indulgence and to clothe ourselves instead in the deeds of Jesus Christ. Matthew points out the need for alertness, attentiveness, a disposition that is open to a change of heart.
