The following is one of the short essays written by our parishioners in preparation for the Archbishop's Pastoral Visitation in July/August:

"I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." (Philippians 4:13)

Dear Archbishop,

It is with great pleasure that we welcome you to the humble Parish of Regina Coeli, Beverly Hills. When I reflect on my life as a Catholic I soon realise that the road has not been without its twists and turns or trials and tribulations. However with all this, my faith and connection with God has been like the pillars of the colosseum ...strong and steadfast and have stood the test of time. Life is far from easy, all you have to do is extend your eyes and ears to what is portrayed on the news, radio and social media. There is so much turmoil and suffering in this world and even in our own lives and I often think how can it all be resolved and where is God when all this is happening? But then I am drawn back to Jesus' life and the suffering and mockery he endured and in the face of all adversity He remained positive, humble and showed nothing but love even to his enemies. Jesus remained true to His word, that His resurrection would be the key to our new life and salvation.

There are so many questions as a Christian that I am unable to answerwhy is there so much human suffering? Wars? Young, innocent people abused, tortured or killed? WHY? Yes in short my faith is put to the test more often than not. It is in these times that I turn to prayer for it is only through prayer that I find peace and comfort in God's presence and trust that He will carry us through these difficult times. We may not have all the answers but we must believe that goodness, truth, love and above all our faith conquers and triumphs over evil and hate. We must allow God's love to bind us all regardless of race, religion or personal circumstances and we must not let our personal prejudice or judgement separate us. Living as a Christian should be the way that Jesus wanted us to live... no judgement, no hate and no criticism just showing love and humility. In a recent real life Netflix series I watched called "When They See Us" the screams of injustice were so evident as 5 boys ranging from 14-16 years of age were wrongly convicted for the assault of a 28 year old woman in 1989 in New York city. They spent between 9 to 14 years in jail where they were tortured and abused for nothing they did wrong and were finally exonerated in 2002 when the quilty person admitted to his crime. This was a case of gross injustice in the US legal system and although their lives will never be the same...in the end truth and justice prevailed for these men. This is a lesson that we as Catholics must stand together for truth and justice and no matter what roadblocks we may face, our faith in God is what will keep us going and help us move forward in our life! Naaman returned to Elisha, the prophet, and acknowledged the Lord.

Naaman the leper went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, as Elisha had told him to do. And his flesh became clean once more like the flesh of a little child.

Returning to Elisha with his whole escort, he went in and stood before him. 'Now I know' he said, 'that there is no God in all the earth except in Israel. Now, please, accept a present from your servant.' But Elisha replied, 'As the Lord lives, whom I serve, I will accept nothing.' Naaman pressed him to accept, but he refused. Then Naaman said, 'Since your answer is "No," allow your servant to be given as much earth as two mules may carry, because your servant will no longer offer holocaust or sacrifice to any god except the Lord.'


Gospel Lk 17:11-19

It seems that no one has returned to give thanks to God except this foreigner.

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus travelled along the border between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered one of the villages, ten lepers came to meet him. They stood some way off and called to him, 'Jesus! Master! Take pity on us.' When he saw them he said, 'Go and show yourselves to the priests.' Now as they were going away they were cleansed. Finding himself cured, one of them turned back praising God at the top of his voice and threw himself at the feet of Jesus and thanked him. The man was a Samaritan. This made Jesus say, 'Were not all ten made clean? The other nine, where are they? It seems that no one has come back to give praise to God, except this foreigner.' And he said to the man, 'Stand up and go on your way. Your faith has saved you.'

The leprosy of Naaman and the ten men in the gospel serves as a metaphor for sinfulness, the condition that makes us unfit for the presence of God and despicable in the eyes of others. Separated from God and alienated from society, we are truly in a deplorable state, a state out of which we are unable to extricate ourselves. Into these seemingly hopeless conditions step the prophet Elisha and Jesus. Each in his own way brings the healing power of God, the saving grace of God. Paul is such a mediator as well. He brings the gospel to those who are in need of salvation. When people are open to his preaching, they are transformed and made ready to receive eternal glory.

After healing come gratitude and praise. Both Naaman and the lone Samaritan are so filled with gratitude that they return to the one responsible for their healing. They are not so preoccupied with their good fortune as to forget that it came to them as a gift. Their response is the kind of thanks and praise that is proclaimed in the psalm and that is also celebrated at each Sunday Eucharist. We have been saved from our alienation from God and from each other so let us give thanks to the Lord.

Those who know that they have been healed, who realize that this was a gift freely given to them, and who return to give thanks have, by these acts of devotion, stepped over a threshold into a new way of living. Their thanks and praise usher them into a new age, the age of eschatological promise.
