## 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time 16 September 2018

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Peter gets it right and then he gets it wrong, within a matter of seconds. Granted, this sounds rather extreme, but it really happened, and probably will happen many more times. Apparently, this also happened to St Peter the Apostle, and not just to me. Our Gospel account tells us that one moment he was affirmed for correctly identifying Jesus as the Christ and then the next moment he was denounced in the harshest of terms - with one of the most quotable sayings from Jesus, namely, 'Get behind me, Satan!' But what was Peter's crime? He seemed sincere and well-intentioned when he 'remonstrated' - when he passionately argued that Jesus, whom he loved, should not be allowed to be suffer and die so tragically. Humanly speaking, Peter seemed innocent of any wrongdoing, if not even worthy of some merit. Nevertheless, Jesus made it unambiguously clear that how Peter thought and spoke was deeply wrong; it was an error of diabolical proportions.

Whatever else the story tells us it tells us that we ought not to be overlyconfident about our own thoughts, words and actions. Even if we were right at times, we could be seconds away from being catastrophically wrong. But being humble about one's own position is not a virtue easily found in our world shaped by instant communication and 24-hour news cycles. So many are eager to assert their dubiously "certain" opinions by judging and condemning others, and pontificating about what exactly needs to be done, for example, in response to the abuse crisis in the Catholic Church. Horrific and sinister numbers are being reported, although rather indiscriminately, in my opinion, without necessarily clarifying the most truthful content of those numbers. But does anyone understand even the problem, let alone the remedy? What was it that blinded the Church, especially the leaders, to the abuse crisis when it was actually harming those most directly impacted by it? Personally, I do not believe that the same type of abuse is occurring today, except very rarely, in the places where it certainly did happen before. But I do worry that the same problem of blindness may still be debilitating the Church and allowing other types of abuse - other types of corruption - to go unchecked, thereby undermining God's precious people quietly from underneath the surface. At its root, this is a spiritual problem - the problem of pride - and we can only overcome it in authentic spiritual communion. Pope Francis said:

If, in the past, the response was one of omission, today we want solidarity, in the deepest and most challenging sense, to become our way of forging present and future history. And this in an environment where conflicts, tensions and above all the victims of every type of abuse can encounter an outstretched hand to protect them and rescue them from their pain. Such solidarity demands that we in turn condemn whatever endangers the integrity of any person. A solidarity that summons us to fight all forms of corruption, especially spiritual corruption. The latter is "a comfortable and self-satisfied form of blindness. Everything then appears acceptable: deception, slander, egotism and other subtle forms of selfcenteredness, for 'even Satan disguises himself as an angel of light' (2 Cor 11:14)" (Gaudete et Exsultate, 165).

#### **ST MATTHEW - EVANGELIST**

1<sup>st</sup> Century Feast Day – 21<sup>st</sup> September Patron Saint – bankers, accountants, bookkeepers, tax collectors, custom officers, security guards

Attributes - gospel, money box, glasses

Matthew, the Evangelist who wrote the Gospel that appears first in the New Testament, was not a popular man; he worked for the Romans as a tax collector. Many of the tax collectors cheated the people by charging more taxes than required and keeping the extra money for themselves. According to the Gospels Matthew gave up everything to follow Jesus. St Matthew's symbol is the winged man because he starts his gospel with the genealogy of Christ. Of all the evangelists he was the most conscious of the humanity of Jesus, and most of the details of the Christian story came to us from St Matthew. His Gospel makes it clear Jesus is the fulfilment of everything said by the prophets in the Old Testament. Matthew is the only Evangelist who shares the eight Beatitudes with his readers.

Matthew is the patron saint of bankers, but anyone who reads Matthew's Gospel knows that money was not important to him. What was important was believing in and living as a follower of Christ. Matthew helps us remember it is our faith in Jesus that makes us truly rich!

#### First Reading Is 50:5-9

I gave my body to those who struck me.

The Lord has opened my ear.

For my part, I made no resistance, neither did I turn away. I offered my back to those who struck me, my cheeks to those who tore at my beard; I did not cover my face against insult and spittle.

#### Second Reading Jas 2:14-18

Faith without good works is dead.

Take the case, my brothers, of someone who has never done a single good act but claims that he has faith. Will that faith save him? If one of the brothers or one of the sisters is in need of clothes and has not enough food to live on, and one of you says to them, 'I wish you well; keep yourself warm and eat plenty,' without giving them these bare necessities of life, then what good is that? Faith is like that: if good works do not go with it, it is quite dead.

This is the way to talk to people of that kind: 'You say you have faith and I have good deeds; I will prove to you that I have faith by showing you my good deeds – now you prove to me that you have faith without any good deeds to show.'

#### Gospel Mk 8:27-35

You are the Christ ... the Son of Man was destined to suffer much.

Jesus and his disciples left for the villages round Caesarea Philippi. On the way he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say I am?' And they told him. 'John the Baptist,' they said, 'others Elijah; others again, one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he asked, 'who do you say I am?' Peter spoke up and said to him, 'You are the Christ.' And he gave them strict orders not to tell anyone about him.

And he began to teach them that the Son of Man was destined to suffer grievously, to be rejected by the elders and the chief priests and the scribes, and to be put to death, and after three days to rise again; and he said all this quite openly. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. But, turning and seeing his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said to him, 'Get behind me, Satan! Because the way you think is not God's way but man's.'

He called the people and his disciples to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it.'



**Reflection** by Dianne Bergant CSA

There are several messianic traditions, each one characterising the anointed one of the future in a unique way. Do we expect a prophetic figure who will enter our world and reform the structures of society, or a strong leader who will overturn these structures and establish a new order? Are we waiting for a teacher who will transform our minds and hearts, or a judge who will punish us for our infidelities? Are we expecting someone who will renew the face of the earth, or someone who will come in fire and brimstone to destroy it? What kind of a messiah do we expect? For what kind of a change are we preparing ourselves?

overturn Jesus seems to our expectations. We look for one who will save us from the predicaments in which we find ourselves, and he comes to us as one who seems to be a victim of his own predicament. God's thinking seems to be the reverse of ours: Those who save their lives, lose them: those who lose their lives, save them: the seed must die before it can bear fruit; Jesus will be killed, but will then be raised from the dead.

Can we claim to understand Jesus? Or are we more like the people in James' community: people who profess faith in Jesus, but who do not live it out; people who speak pleasant words to others, who say the right things, but who do not back up their words with good works? Is our faith really living?

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
