2nd Sunday in Lent 17 March 2019

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Perhaps I am hopelessly biased and incapable of seeing the truth. Or perhaps the others are. Either way one thing is for certain: there seem to be severe cases of "perception disorder" among us. How is it possible that people can have such contrasting perceptions about the same event? First convicted. Now sentenced. The sentencing of Cardinal Pell was broadcast live practically to the whole world via the internet. It was asked if doing so might inflict further punishment upon the Cardinal (and also upon the whole Church, I imagine). The judge dismissed the concern and said that the decision had been made for the sake of 'transparency.'

The conviction was made solely on the basis of one person's testimony without any corroborating evidence. The law says we will never know his identity; we will never get to hear his testimony. Not even the jury got to meet him in person; they watched a recording of his testimony. The only other person who knows the truth with certainty continues to maintain his innocence. As the Cardinal was walking out of the court, it was reported that a bystander yelled out, 'You are saying that the kids are lying, are you?' I am afraid that it was the bystander who was not being completely honest. Firstly, there were no kids at the trial. The one who was afforded almost complete anonymity in making a life-ruining accusation against another person was in fact in his late thirties. Secondly, the other "kid" died about five years ago - in his early thirties - and his only testimony had been that he had never been abused (verified by his mother).

At the sentencing the judge determined that what the Cardinal did during the 5 minutes of horror in 1996 was a 'reasoned' and 'reflected upon' act. But how could a "reasonable" person, no matter how malicious, act so impulsively and recklessly as to invite, as it were, every chance of getting caught? The judge postulated that it was because of his 'breathtaking arrogance.' I agree that arrogance blinds us, but in order to commit such an unintelligent (for lack of a better word) crime one would have be "blind-drunk" with a form of madness - the kind of madness which would inevitably bring selfdestruction upon anyone rather *immediately*. But the Cardinal had a "career" which steadfastly continued to flourish over the next 20 years. Even the judge agreed that the Cardinal has led an otherwise 'blameless life' and that therefore he must have been 'effectively reformed' - somewhat miraculously if you ask me. So, what can explain all the inconsistencies? What has caused the spread of "perception disorder" among us?

First Reading Gn 15:5-12, 17-18

God made a covenant with Abraham, his faithful servant.

Taking Abram outside the Lord said, 'Look up to heaven and count the stars if you can. Such will be your descendants' he told him. Abram put his faith in the Lord, who counted this as making him justified.

'I am the Lord' he said to him 'who brought you out of Ur of the Chaldaeans to make you heir to this land.' 'My Lord, the Lord' Abram replied, 'how am I to know that I shall inherit it?' He said to him, 'Get me a three-year-old heifer, a three-year-old goat, a three-year-old ram, a turtledove and a young pigeon.' Gospel Acclamation Mt 17:5


Glory and praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ! From the shining cloud the Father's voice is heard:

The Second Sunday of Lent celebrates the epiphanies of God, the ways in which God's divine presence is revealed. The first divine epiphany is the manifestation of God as one who initiates a covenant, an intimate relationship with human beings. Not only does God initiate this agreement, but God also seals it with blood, making it official. Although we ritualise our relationship with God in a religious setting, the call to enter into the covenant can come in the ordinary events of life. The important thing to remember about this covenant is that God enters into our lives and initiates the relationship. No life is too simple; no life is too busy. Human history in all of its contours is the setting for the encounter with God.

The glory of God is revealed in the transfigured Jesus, the one who discussed his suffering and death with Moses and Elijah. Lent is a time for us to enter into this suffering, not merely though reflection, prayer and penance, but concretely, by sharing in the suffering of the body of Christ. We see this suffering all around us.

God is revealed through women and men who live lives of Christian commitment. In those whose integrity strengthens us, in those whose religious sentiments inspire us, in those whose endurance gives us confidence. God is revealed in those who get involved in bettering the lives of others. God is revealed in very ordinary ways, if we but open our eyes to see.

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
