The following is a reflection by one of our parishioners –Geraldine Zacka – on her recent pilgrimage to France and Italy. Enjoy!

I recently had the good fortune to participate in the Graces of France and Italy Pilgrimage which was organised by Sydney Catholic Schools. I would like to acknowledge Father Peter and Peter Busch the Assistant Principal of Regina Coeli school who both endorsed my application for the Pilgrimage. I joined 38 other pilgrims for this amazing trip and by the end of our time together we were well and truly friends for life. Our Spiritual Directors for this Pilgrimage were Father Michael McLean and Father Josh Miechels. Each day we gathered for Morning and Evening Prayer and our Masses were joyous occasions with amazing singing. Initially when the trip was advertised I was curious but not particularly interested but as time went on I was drawn into the idea of going to Lourdes and Assisi in particular. I realised that I had a yearning to go to these two places which are not usually on everyday tourist itineraries. Lourdes is a place you are called to go to and it did not disappoint!

Our journey commenced in Brussels, Belgium where we embarked on an extremely interesting tour of the Somme including Hamel, Villers Bretonneux, Albert, Pozieres and Amiens. Our Mass for the day was held at the Cathedral in Villers Bretonneux where an Australian flag was draped across the altar in honour of our visit and in recognition of the Australian Armed forces who sacrificed their lives to save the town from annihilation during the War. On to Paris where we stayed for 4 days discovering the beauty of the French Cathedrals, a visit to the Convent where St Catherine Laboure received the vision of the Miraculous Medal, St Vincent de Paul's resting place, Mass in Sacre Coeur Cathedral and a visit to the Louvre and the magnificent stained glass windows of St Chappelle. Time was allocated for some sightseeing which included a night trip to the Eiffel Tower, a Seine River night cruise and a walking tour of Paris. Mass was celebrated in the crypt of the majestic Cathedral of Chartres which was stormed by the German troops during the War, thinking it was occupied by the Americans! The Palace of Versailles didn't disappoint with its halls and ceilings rich with embellishments. Our guide told us of the suffering of the French and the inequality of the Class System prior to the French Revolution. The pace then began to slow as we boarded a train for Lourdes. This place is truly special and immediately on our arrival the spirit of St Bernadette was captured by all with prayer, Mass, reflection, Rosary and Reconciliation opportunities.

Our priests celebrated Mass in the main Cathedral in Lourdes and on the second day we were privileged to hear Father Michael say Mass in the Grotto. On that occasion the recessional hymn was Hail Queen of Heaven so I felt very connected to our Parish and our School! The under ground Cathedral of St Pius X was an engineering masterpiece with a capacity of 22 thousand! Suspended around the walls of the Cathedral are the portraits of the Saints including St Mary of the Cross MacKillop, St John Paul II, St Teresa of Calcutta, St Maximilian Kolbe (wearing the striped prison uniform of Auschwitz and of course St Bernadette to name a few. It was in Lourdes that I experienced the true meaning of Pilgrimage - a powerful journey of faith and prayer. I carried the prayer requests of many friends and family and sought intercession in this special place.

The Candlelight procession was attended by thousands who flock daily to the Grotto and seek an answer to their prayers and pray for healing. Many pilgrims, myself included, were immersed in the baths near the Grotto - an experience I will not forget - life changing! Assisi is another special place and of course is where St Francis and St Clare rejected their privileged lives and lived simply in the service of the poor. The guide explained in detail the life of St Francis and we saw all the special places including the Cathedral of the Angels where Pope John Paul held a meeting of all world Spiritual Leaders during his Pontificate to pray for peace. The town of Assisi is so beautiful with its magnificent views over the countryside. Mass was celebrated in the Woods on a stone altar near the Hermitage where St Francis lived and worked. We attended evening Vespers at the Cathedral of St Clare where her body lies in state. There was a lock of her hair on display and the garment of hessian worn by St Francis!

Rome was calling us! We traveled via the Catacombs and heard of the early Romans and their burial practices. We stayed at Domus Australia during our visit to Rome and on the first evening I bumped into a familiar face - Father Paul Smithers! He was enjoying a well earned rest and was happy to see me and hear of our Pilgrimage. The pace picked up and over the next few days we saw the Vatican Museum, the Sistine Chapel, St Peters Basilica, Mary Major Cathedral and St John Lateran Cathedral. Whilst at St Peters we celebrated Mass and a Confirmation as one of the pilgrims had not been confirmed so Father thought there was no better place to have Confirmation than in the crypt of St Peters! The next day was special as we had tickets to attend the Wednesday Papal Audience in St Peters Square. We had very good seats and saw Pope Francis up very close as he was driven past our group. In the afternoon we had a tour of the Coliseum learning of the martyrdom of the early Christians. We also visited the Cathedral of St Paul Outside the Walls, a beautiful cathedral dedicated to St Paul. The last stop in Rome was a visit to Cavi under St Peters Basilica where St Peter's bones are said to be laid. The inside was truly magnificent with century old frescoes adorning the walls.

My Pilgrimage experience was something I will always remember. We were fortunate to be led by the very experienced personnel from Harvest travel and a representative from Sydney Catholic Schools who from the start emphasised that we were pilgrims, not tourists. We learned of the history of the Church and how martyrdom was so common, not only in Ancient Rome but during two World Wars, Revolutions and even in our world today.

You know how you are supposed to imitate us: now we were not idle when we were with you, nor did we ever have our meals at anyone's table without paying for them; no, we worked night and day, slaving and straining, so as not to be a burden on any of you. This was not because we had no right to be, but in order to make ourselves an example for you to follow.

We gave you a rule when we were with you: not to let anyone have any food if he refused to do any work. Now we hear that there are some of you who are living in idleness, doing no work themselves but interfering with everyone else's. In the Lord Jesus Christ, we order and call on people of this kind to go on quietly working and earning the food that they eat.

Alleluia, alleluia! Lift up your heads and see; your redemption is near at hand. Alleluia!


Gospel Lk 21:5-19

Your endurance will win you your life.

When some were talking about the Temple. remarking how it was adorned with fine stonework and votive offerings, Jesus said, 'All these things you are staring at now - the time will come when not a single stone will be left on another: everything will be destroyed.' And they put to him this question: 'Master,' they said, 'when will this happen, then, and what sign will there be that this is about to take place?'

'Take care not to be deceived,' he said, 'because many will come using my name and saying, "I am he" and, "The time is near at hand." Refuse to join them. And when you hear of wars and revolutions. do not be frightened, for this is something that must happen but the end is not soon.' Then he said to them, 'Nation will fight against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be great earthquakes and plagues and famines here and there: there will be fearful sights and great signs from heaven.

'But before all this happens, men will seize you and persecute you; they will hand you over to the synagogues and to imprisonment, and bring you before kings and governors because of my name and that will be your opportunity to bear witness. Keep this carefully in mind: you are not to prepare your defence, because I myself shall give you an eloquence and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to resist or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, relations and friends; and some of you will be put to death. You will be hated by all men on account of my name, but not a hair of your head will be lost. Your endurance will win you your lives.'

The Day of the Lord was believed to be the time when God would come in majesty and power to set all things right. must remember that descriptions in today's readings are metaphoric or symbolic in nature. As with all metaphors or symbols, we miss something of their profound meaning if we merely understand them literally. It is not helpful to relate elements of the description with particular aspects of the contemporary world. Belief in the Day of the Lord is a way of testifying to our faith in the righteousness of God.

Although the narrative readings for today concentrate on the disruptions that will accompany the coming of God. they also contain hints of the salvation that will finally arrive. Malachi speaks of the sun of justice that comes with healing rays; Luke promises that the faithful disciples will escape without a hair of their heads being destroyed. Just as the descriptions of the upheavals should not be understood literally, neither should these descriptions. It may be that the faithful followers of Jesus will suffer terrible agonies. The point here is that even in the midst of their pain, they will be protected. The healing rays of justice and the rescue of the lives of the upright are references to salvation. God does not come at the end to condemn, but to save. Furthermore, the suffering that precedes the end is intended for purification refinement, not punishment. Christians are exhorted to live in this endtime with patient endurance of difficulties.

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
