In last week's Gospel, Jesus told us a parable about the master who was returning from a wedding feast. In the homily, I pointed out that this would have been the perfect time for the servants to be in the presence of the master who would have been inexpressibly happy and eager to celebrate; it would have been like *Christmas*! And then it dawned on me that the parable seemed to bear an uncanny resemblance to what happened here at Regina Coeli on the Sunday before: the Archbishop was returning from an epic ordination of seven men to the priesthood; he himself said that he had been feeling like a child getting up excitedly on a *Christmas* morning! Was it pure luck that I caught him on a very good day?

Speaking of the epic ordination, one of the seven new priests was my godson (as the Archbishop himself mentioned a few times while he was here). His name is Fr John Jang whom I first met at the Korean Catholic Community about 18 years ago, back when neither of us had the faintest idea that we would one day become priests! This week I had the privilege of preaching at his First Mass - one of the most nerve-wrecking things I had to do as a priest because I had to preach in Korean practically for the first time ever! Fortunately, recounting a few of the most memorable stories formed a major part of the homily and made the task slightly easier. We all have a story. But the story is never merely mine - it is always part of a bigger story. Every now and then the indiscernibly subtle hand of God reveals itself and we cannot help but be amazed at its profound competency in bringing us to where we thankfully are.

I am very thankful for where I am. It is a great (and undeserved) honour to be appointed *Parish Priest of Beverly Hills* - something which seems to have a certain dignified ring to it, probably because of the great priests and parishioners who have gone before me. Or, maybe it is just the Hollywood factor! Either way, I hope to grow into the role (but not without your help!), especially now that there is no excuse for me to be, as it were, sitting on the fence. Other than that, I think it is mostly "business as usual" here at Regina Coeli. Speaking of *business*, the **annual parish financial report** has been published for your perusal on page 3. The numbers are looking good - almost too good that I am slightly worried that there might be less on collection plates henceforth! Jk, the matter is left to your thoughtful discretion. I wish to thank our finance committee for their wonderful work, and all of you for your steadfast generosity toward the parish. And before I forget, happy feast day (22nd August) everyone! - *Fr Peter* -

Financial Report: July 2018 to June 2019 (from *Daniel Portelli*, a member of the Parish Finance Committee)

Dear Parishioners, another Financial Year (July 2018 to June 2019) has passed and I wish to share with you the good news of the Parish financial affairs. After all this is "our" Parish and to remain vibrant it must be transparent and accountable. Firstly, I would like to thank all Parishioners that have supported our Parish and have made the generous contributions of both time and donations.

The Parish income for the recently ended Financial Year (2018/19) was \$100,640 higher than the previous year. This increase in income resulted in a larger than normal surplus of \$112,117 compared to a deficit of -\$62,828 in the previous Financial Year (2017/18) and it will be carried forward to help cover Parish Expenses in subsequent Financial Years. This year's surplus was a welcome relief as the increasing Parish administration and repair expenses continue to grow at a much faster rate than the regular source of weekly income from the *second* collection. The unusual increase in **Parish income** is a result of some new and non-recurring events, in particular:

- A temporary increase in demand to hire the Parish Hall for private events, including the return of the before-and-after school care facilities; and,
- donations to the church including for a new stain-glass window and possible renovations to the Chapel of Our Lady (\$20,000 from one donor); and,
- Rent and Interest income that resulted from the "land-swap"*.

*In late 2017 a transfer of properties occurred between SCS and the Parish as part of a 'land swap' arrangement to facilitate the development of Regina Coeli Primary Catholic School. Although we do not expect to have this property available for rent or the interest from the deposit much longer as more change is anticipated, it has given the Parish an important opportunity to recover much of the costs incurred to relocate the Parish Community Centre last year.

Parish Expenses have also declined by \$74,305 as there were no further relocation costs for the Parish Centre required this year and some building repairs to the Church were delayed. As you may have noticed, the Church requires some much-needed repair work and I am sure our newly formed Parish Repairs and Maintenance Committee will be eager to see some repairs performed shortly.

It has been a busy financial year that has seen many changes and I am pleased to see that our underlying Parish financial affairs have remained in good order, showing the Parish vibrancy and resilience. As the outlook of our future Parish sources of income remain uncertain, while our Parish Expenses

You bore me to be a man of strife for the whole world.

The king's leading men spoke to the king. 'Let Jeremiah be put to death: he is unquestionably disheartening the remaining soldiers in the city, and all the people too, by talking like this. The fellow does not have the welfare of this people at heart so much as its ruin.' 'He is in your hands as you know,' King Zedekiah answered 'for the king is powerless against you.' 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Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

As disciples we commit ourselves to values and principles that are not always cherished by others. We can be misunderstood for our beliefs. even ridiculed. Our lives may be a reproach to those who do not share our aspirations. There may be times when we must stand in opposition to others. All of this tends to alienate us. It could even place us at enmity with those whom we love. Yet, if we are genuinely committed, we realise that there is also a price to pay if we are not faithful. It is very difficult to with ourselves when we disregard our deepest convictions and ignore the promptings of God that we experience within ourselves. As difficult as a life of faith may be. we know that it is the only way to live in this world.

Faced with the cost of discipleship we are brought to the realisation that, by ourselves, we do not have the necessary resources. We need assistance. Like Jeremiah, we might find that this aid will come from places we may have never expected. The real support and assistance that we get is from Jesus who came to set the world and our hearts on fire. Paul assures us that there is a vast throng cheering us on as we run the race of discipleship. They are not merely spectators; they have already run or are still running their own race. We are not alone in our commitment, in our struggle. There are many witnesses, many examples for us to follow.
