Second Sunday Ordinary Time 19 January 2020

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There is something I have been meaning to talk to you about (hint: to do with the "landswap" of 2017 and what followed after) but it might have to wait another week or so, because I would like to get it right but this past week has been most unusual - quite miraculous actually - such that it might warrant some sharing. It all started with a totally unexpected tragedy. Around 5pm last Monday I received a call from a senior priest in the Archdiocese who informed me that a close friend of mine - a priest, only 42 years old - just had a heart attack. 'But how can this be,' I thought to myself, 'he was supposed to join me for dinner in a few hours! Stop everything and go.'

As I am driving to the hospital, I get phone calls from others. The news that weighs a ton is reaching ever-increasing circles of people. None of us can believe what is supposed to have happened. In a short time I am beholding my friend lying motionless in coma. He looks both familiar and heartbreakingly unfamiliar. He is anointed in the presence of three priests and his family. All are in shock and volatile grief. After several hours of consideration the doctors decide to perform a "rescue operation" - a high risk procedure which can go wrong in innumerable ways. But there is no alternative, none except the inevitable come too soon. I realise that the next few hours are going to be critical beyond description - destined to make a world of difference to so many. The three priests return to Regina Coeli to offer Mass, with strong emotions rearing their faces sporadically. Never has it been clearer that the offering of Mass is a prayer, a very heartfelt one at that.

On the third day after falling into a deep sleep - one from which he could so easily never have woken up - my friend wakes up. It is quite simply a miracle. Starting from a terrible situation, everything that could have gone right seems to have gone right for my friend. He happened to be with his family when he first started to feel unwell. They called the ambulance just as he fell unconscious. The hospital staff were ready for him precisely at the moments his life depended on their care. Each treatment seemed to have the desired effects on him, in whose motionless body amazing occurrences of healing were quietly unfolding.

The other miracle in all this has been the overwhelming response to the call to pray for my friend. It seemed like the entire world knew, with spontaneous efforts to come together and to pray for him springing from various places. The hospital itself was nearly turned into a hub of Catholic presence, with the strange sight of priests, religious and even bishops becoming ubiquitous. As the promising signs of recovery started to emerge, a consensus seemed to form among the devoted visitors: not yet, his time had not yet come. Sure enough, when my friend woke up and was updated on all that had happened to him, which he himself found to be unbelievable but eventually accepted, he wasted no time in reaching the simple conclusion: 'God must still have some work for me.' - *Fr Peter* -

Collection at all Australia Day Weekend Masses for the St Vincent De Paul bushfire appeal

Gospel Acclamation Jn 1:14. 12


Alleluia, alleluia! The Word of God became flesh and dwelt among us. He enabled those who accepted him to become the children of God. Alleluia!

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Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

Ours is an historical religion. It not only unfolds within the joys and disappointments of time and place, but it is rooted in actual events that took place in the lives of real people. The Christ to whom we commit ourselves is not a mythic character, a figment of communal religious imagination. He is someone who was born into history, at a specific period of time, in a particular place. He was known by real people like John the Baptist; he submitted himself to historical rituals like baptism. He had followers who testified to the truth of both his existence and his life. Jesus was a man of history.

Like Paul, we too have been called to be apostles. We received this call when we were baptised. The beginning of the year, with its custom of making new resolutions, is a wonderful time to remember to what we have committed ourselves. At times it seems that our own apostleship is no less daunting than was Paul's. However, it is no less immediate either. Whether the period of history is the first half of the first century, as was the time of Jesus, or the second half, as was the time of Paul, or the twenty-first century, as is our time, salvation unfolds within the events of time. Furthermore, the followers of Jesus always return to the events of his life in order to discover the meaning of the events in their lives. These past events are reinterpreted in the ongoing present. Discipleship is never otherworldly.
