# slette **Fifth Sunday of Easter** 19 May 2019

There was a phase, not at all long ago, when it had become noticeable that my bulletin front-pages, and even the homilies, had turned quite po*litical*, almost to the point of putting myself at the risk of, as it were, losing the plot. Well, just when I thought that the more-than-usuallypolitically-charged phase was behind me, I realised that the federal election was at our doorstep at the same time as when there was nothing in particular I felt moved to write about.

Believe it or not, I think that I am one of the more relaxed voters at this election. A part of me may be tired. Another part of me may have become too cynical to care: Coalition or Labour, what difference does it really make, especially given the general state of chaos our politics seems to have fallen into? It is also possible that there is yet another part of me which feels, with quiet conviction, that the kind of reform we need is one that runs deeper than a mere change or not of government.

I could be wrong, especially since I have not been following it closely, but I get the impression that this election is driven, perhaps more than in a long while, less by policies and more by ideologies: it has become, perhaps in a more than usually pronounced way, a battle between the Left and the Right, or Liberalism and Conservatism. Now, it would be a mistake for anyone to assume that one was *ipso facto* better than the other. As a wise professor by the name of Jordan B. Peterson put it, a healthy balance between the two is always necessary. Conservatism pursues order and excellence. But a system driven by conservative values can become ossified over time such that it gives unfair advantages to some whilst leaving many others disengaged and marginalised, in which case liberalism would be needed to find new ways of creating a more meaningful and participatory society. Nevertheless, liberalism without the structures and values of conservatism devolves into chaos and, in spite of all good intentions, ends up exposing the society to the tyrannical rule of the mob.

It has been observed that the power structures of our society (a.k.a. the Establishment) have been dominated more by the Left than by the Right for quite some time and we have been witnessing some of the negative consequences of the imbalance; hence the reason why we have also been witnessing certain signs of a conservative pushback which the Establishment is desperately attempting to undermine. I imagine that the pendulum of our politics is bound to swing right sooner or later, as a matter of "social/political restoration." In the meantime my hope is that the Church will do a much better job this time in the role of being the light of Christ for the world and helping to renew/Christianise our culture.

## Fifth Sunday of Easter, Year C

#### 19 May 2019

#### First Reading Acts 14:21-27

They assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them.

Paul and Barnabas went back through Lystra and Iconium to Antioch. They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith. 'We all have to experience many hardships' they said 'before we enter the kingdom of God.' In each of these churches they appointed elders, and with prayer and fasting they commended them to the Lord in whom they had come to believe.

They passed through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. Then after proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia and from there sailed for Antioch, where they had originally been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now completed.

On their arrival they assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith to the pagans.


I shall not be with you much longer. I give you a new commandment: love one another;

**Reflection** by Greg Sunter

The passage from the Gospel of John actually comes from the Last Supper account, as is indicated by the opening line: 'When Judas had gone'. However, the passage is being used during the post-resurrection Easter season. The passage about being glorified can be read in this context as referring to the crucifixion that was, rather than the crucifixion that is still to come in the original setting. The reference that Jesus will not be with the disciples much longer can also be read as an indicator towards the Ascension. It is a clever liturgical use of a gospel passage out of its intended context.

The second half of the gospel passage is perhaps the more familiar section. It is a common text for marriage ceremonies. However, sometimes its selection is purely based on the use of the term 'love'. Earlier in his ministry, Jesus was asked which commandment was the most important. He replied that you must love the Lord your God with all your heart and that you must love your neighbour as yourself. (Mt 22) The 'new' commandment that he issues at the Last Supper is not so much a new commandment as a variation on a theme. The newness highlights the changes that are occurring in the small group of friends. His language conveys an imperative: you must love one another, 'just as I have loved you'. He tells the disciples - and us - that the way they behave towards one another must be with the same love that Jesus treated them. And the love that Jesus gave was the love of God for all the world. So the love that Jesus commands the disciples (us) to show one another is nothing less than the powerful love of God.
