Fourth Sunday in Advent 22 December 2019

When it comes to organizing events, it seems that I tend to err on the side of being a skeptic – someone who imagines the worst scenario rather than the best. Fortunately for everyone, I was not the key organizer behind last Saturday's Parish Christmas Party which was, all in all, a delightful success! Connie and Rita, with the help of other dedicated volunteers, expertly planned for the event and gracefully held it together. In spite of a last minute family emergency which took one of them out of action on the day – in regard to which we now offer our prayers – the "ship" which they had been preparing to launch sailed on with remarkable efficiency and glad tidings.

Having done very little, apart from saying 'yes, that sounds good, thank you,' I went out to the venue around 2pm in order to welcome the volunteers who were supposed to be arriving then. It was dead quiet. A skeptic or not, it was hard for me to believe that a communal party would come to life there before too long. Then a sign of hope appeared: three teenage boys – members of our Youth Group – who, at the encouragement from one of the mums, agreed to help with setting up! Other volunteers soon joined in and, with plenty of time left before the start of the vigil Mass, the pre-party preparation seemed all but done.

A noticeably larger than usual crowd at the 5pm Mass signaled that, yes, the party was definitely happening. The mass is ended, let's enjoy our Christmas party! As I led grace before meal, it seemed to me that the crowd was slightly smaller than last year's but, then again, someone else thought it was larger. Either way, it did not matter because there were not enough seats for everyone and (I was told) most of the food was gone without delay. Children attacking the jumping castle with endless fereocity made me feel proud in the knowledge that we might be getting our money's worth. They still had more than enough energy for an informal disco later on - something which might become part of the official program in our future parties.

My one regret was that I did not see the full view of the food/dessert tables (plates were brought to me instead while I was talking!) because I really wanted to thank all those who made beautiful efforts to add to our festivity by bringing something (not that they had to). The heartfelt solicitude toward the parish which was evident in so many of our parishioners was truly edifying! With amazing help from both signed-up and spontaneous volunteers we were flawlessly packed up by 9pm, roughly at which point I started to feel drops of rain falling on my face. I could not help but look up and say 'thank you!'

Second Reading Rom 1:1-7

Jesus Christ, a descendant of David, is the Son of God.

From Paul, a servant of Christ Jesus who has been called to be an apostle, and specially chosen to preach the Good News that God promised long ago through his prophets in the scriptures.

This news is about the Son of God, who, according to the human nature he took, was a descendant of David: it is about Jesus Christ our Lord who, in the order of the spirit, the spirit of holiness that was in him, was proclaimed Son of God in all his power through his resurrection from the dead.

Through him we received grace and our apostolic mission to preach the obedience of faith to all pagan nations in honour of his name. You are one of these nations, and by his call belong to Jesus Christ. To you all, then, who are God's beloved in Rome, called to be saints, may God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ send grace and peace.

Gospel Acclamation Mt 1:23

Alleluia, alleluia! A virgin will give birth to a son; his name will be Emmanuel: God is with us.

Gospel Mt 1:18-24

Alleluia!

Jesus was born of Mary, the betrothed of Joseph, a son of David.

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph: but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, decided to divorce her informally. He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son

and they will call him Emmanuel,

a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

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Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

Despite all of the excitement associated with eschatological fulfilment. despite all of assurance we have that it will be an experience of peace and abundant life, the mystery for which we long requires the risk of faith. Despite all of the times that we have celebrated the Nativity, we still do not have full comprehension and understanding. Still we are invited to enter deeply into the event that is before us. Will we step into a life of deeper faith and commitment, or will we merely participate in the external celebration of the feast? Only we can decide, and only we will really know the decision that we make.

The circumstances of our lives influence the way we live out our faith. As Christians, we are called to devote ourselves to the service of Christ. Our primary commitment must be to Christ and to the way of being human that he has shown us. We must be committed to what enriches life and not to what diminishes it. We must be committed to the good of people and not to the hoarding of things. We may not be official heralds of the gospel, but we proclaim our faith in the way we live our lives, in the kindness with which we treat others, in honesty of business transactions. proclaim the gospel when we stand for justice, when we forgive those who have offended us, when we show compassion to those who suffer. As we step into the eschatological age, we are called to recommit ourselves to genuine Christian living.
