Nativity Of St John The Baptist 24 June 2018

In last week's bulletin I made a rather bold claim that we lived in an age of dysfunctional conscience and that people could be disingenuous, even positively lying, without even realising that they were doing so. But how could this be even possible?! It is timely that we are celebrating the birth of John the Baptist, having also celebrated the feast of Sts John Fisher and Thomas More less than 48 hours ago. Of course, the common thread here is that they were all beheaded for telling the truth and refusing to act against their conscience. By contrast, the infamous Herod and Henry VIII appear to have been blinded by power and lust, to the point of justifying murders of innocents. But their conscience could not have fallen into such dysfunction overnight; it had to have been a product of continual dimming of their conscience. Each time we lie or act dishonestly our vision narrows; we block out a number of obvious contradictions in order to justify our action. When this is repeated often enough, we no longer notice it next time similar lies are uttered or dishonest actions performed. Dysfunctional conscience has become a chronic condition.

I once mentioned the brilliant psychologist and author Professor Jordan B. Peterson. In his book, 12 rules for life: an antidote to chaos, there is a chapter titled 'Tell the truth - or, at least, don't lie.' He writes: 'You can use words to manipulate the world into delivering what you want. This is what it means to "act politically." This is spin...It's what everyone does when they want something, and decide to falsify themselves to please and flatter. It's scheming and sloganeering and propaganda.' Later in the chapter he tells an Egyptian myth which we might find relevant (even liturgically so!). There are two gods: one (Osiris) turns a blind eye to looming danger and the other (Set) takes advantage of the situation and decimates him. Then there is a younger god (Horus, the son of Osiris) who learns from his father's mistake and decides to pay attention. He succeeds in avenging his father's misfortune but ends up with one of his eyes plucked out during the battle. He manages to regain that eye but then sacrifices it in order to restore his father's vision. Well, what can we make of this in our context? When fathers cannot 'see' - in the most profound sense of the word - they go awry and their hearts drift from what ought to be the object of their utmost concern, namely, children. John the Baptist was a man with eyes wide open the greatest prophet whose mission it was to restore Israel's vision so as to bring children to Jesus as the Lamb of God; hence it was written of him: With the spirit and power of Elijah, he will go before him to turn the hearts of fathers towards their children and the disobedient back to the wisdom that the virtuous have, preparing for the Lord a people fit for him.' (Luke 1:17)

World Youth Day Panama 2019 Subsidise on Offer

The Catholic Archdiocese of Sydney invites young adults to pre-register for the WYD 2019 Panama via Washington DC pilgrimage, which will be led by His Grace, Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP.

How does the subsidy work?

Pilgrims wishing to accept the offer of a subsidy need to pre-register by depositing a minimum, non-refundable deposit of \$1,000. The deposit will confirm your place on the pilgrimage. The Archdiocese of Sydney will then add \$1,000 to your account.

The indicative cost of the pilgrimage, provided by, is \$8,686. For pilgrims considering the optional Mexico extension, the indicative total cost is \$9,786. Note that, should the pilgrimage not go ahead as planned, all deposits shall be returned in full.

How do I make a deposit?

Step 4: Wait for an email confirming your deposit. Once registration officially opens, your deposit and subsidy will be transferred into your COSMOS account.

Before John ended his career he said, "I am not the one you imagine me to be; that one is coming after me and I am not fit to undo his sandal."

John is his name.

The time came for Elizabeth to have her child, and she gave birth to a son; and when her neighbours and relations heard that the Lord had shown her so great a kindness, they shared her joy.

Now on the eighth day they came to circumcise the child; they were going to call him Zechariah after his father, but his mother spoke up. 'No.' she said 'he is to be called John.' They said to her, 'But no one in your family has that name', and made signs to his father to find out what he wanted him called. The father asked for a writing tablet and wrote, 'His name is John,' And they were all astonished. At that instant his power of speech returned and he spoke and praised God. All their neighbours were filled with awe and the whole affair was talked about throughout the hill country of Judaea. All those who heard of it treasured it in their hearts. 'What will this child turn out to be?' they wondered. And indeed the hand of the Lord was with him. The child grew up and his spirit matured. And he lived out in the wilderness until the day he appeared openly to Israel.

Like the feast of the nativity of Jesus, this feast falls on one of the solstices, a hinge point in the cosmos. Some of the patristic writings tell us that the birth of Jesus was placed in the calendar when, in the northern hemisphere, the days began to lengthen. So this day was chosen to celebrate the birth of John precisely because the days were getting shorter. 'He must increase while I must decrease' (John 3:30). This is the time of seasonal change, of cosmic reversal. The entire universe has been alerted. Something new is about to happen.

John the Baptist is the hinge between the old age and the new eschatological age of fulfilment. John himself was never a disciple of Jesus; he did not enter the age that he heralded. He was the trumpet that sounded the coming of the king; he was the rooster that announced the dawning of the new day. He brought the people to the threshold of the new age, but he himself never stepped over into it. idiosyncratic character of his life caught the attention of the crowds, but he did not keep this attention upon himself. Instead, he used it to point to Jesus, who appears to have been so commonplace that he might have been overlooked had not John cried out. It was John's prophetic destiny to be the sharp-edged sword, the polished arrow. He was the voice that cried in the wilderness: Hear me! Listen! Behold, he is coming!
