Ours has been officially known as the Catholic Parish of Regina Coeli for about 65 years. Of course, the parish has existed for longer than that, but initially under a different name (just like Beverly Hills itself!) - Queen of Peace or "Regina Pacis(?)" in Latin. Apart from the whole school Mass last Thursday, not much else has been done to celebrate the parish feast day, but understandably so, especially given that the Archbishop's pastoral visitation was only like "yesterday." Nevertheless, it might be resoundingly appropriate for us to give more attention and devotion to future celebrations of our feast day, for two reasons: liturgically speaking, parish feast days rank among the most solemn of feast days (as I found out with the help of the Archbishop's MC a few weeks ago), as they allow each parish community to commemorate what it treasures and to look toward the unknown horizon with an open heart so as to be ready for the sublime graces of God who never ceases to surprise us; the other reason is that the memorial feast of Regina Coeli is inextricably linked to another feast of greatest solemnity, namely, the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Our Lady looked the right way and therefore she ended up in the right place - exactly where she was meant to be, as the Queen Mother of Jesus in Heaven. Looking the right way is the most perfect thing for us to do and yet for some inexplicable reason we avoid it like the plague sometimes. I guess that at the root of the problem is the same distrust which let down Adam and Eve as they looked the wrong way, to the detriment of the integrity of the Garden of Eden. Apparently, an author by the name of Frances Hodgson Burnett once wrote, If you look the right way, you can see the whole world is a garden.' Jesus is the new Adam, Mary the new Eve; they made real, for the rest of us, the possibility of right orientation for the human heart - the kind of orientation which may feel like the 'narrow door' at first (for it bears the marks of silence, poverty and sacrificial love) but, ultimately, without fail, will prove itself to be the express way to the Heavenly Garden. Perhaps the fact that Our Lady tends to draw flowers to herself in our beautiful church is no accident!

Something which some of us have been waiting for so long that it has nearly petered out of our memory: the outcome of THE APPEAL! At some stage during the long wait, it dawned on me that by not shying away from controversies I ran the risk of causing division in our community, and unnecessarily so at times. I think that I have definitely been guilty of such follies, at least to some degree. Therefore I hope to be more prudent in the future (not that I am very reliable when it comes to such aspirations!). But I will probably still comment on the 2-1 verdict which upheld the conviction of Cardinal Pell something which has undoubtedly left me with an acute sense of disappointment. Only, the document produced by the Court of Appeal, titled 'Pell versus The Queen' (available online), is nearly 400 pages long and I think I ought to read more of it before commenting on the delicate matter. Maybe this is necessary, or maybe I am just incorrigible, but it seems that some controversy is going to be unavoidable!

STATEMENT FROM MOST REV. ANTHONY FISHER OP

ARCHBISHOP OF SYDNEY

The Victorian Court of Appeal has today upheld the verdict of historical sexual abuse allegations against Cardinal George Pell in a 2-1 decision.

From the outset the Cardinal has strenuously maintained his innocence. He continues to do so notwithstanding today's decision.

Today's split decision amongst the judges is consistent with the differing views of the juries in the first and second trials, as well as the divided opinion amongst legal commentators and the general public. Reasonable people have taken different views when presented with the same evidence and I urge everyone to maintain calm and civility.

As the Cardinal may yet decide to appeal the judgment to the High Court of Australia, I am limited in my ability to comment on today's outcome.

Matters of the Cardinal's status within the Church can only be determined by the Vatican, not the Church in Australia. I anticipate that the Holy See may well wait until the appeal process has been exhausted.

I recommit myself and the Archdiocese of Sydney to doing all we can to ensure that past crimes are never repeated and that Church environments are the safest possible for children and vulnerable adults.

I pray for and will continue to support survivors of child sexual abuse at the hands of clergy and other members of the Catholic Church so that they may find justice and healing. I again say how sorry I am that you were harmed by people you should have been able to trust. I am conscious how you and your loved ones have had to live with the consequences of abuse for a lifetime.

I know that there are many in the Catholic community and beyond who will find it difficult to come to terms with this judgment, especially those who know the Cardinal and will struggle to reconcile this outcome with the man they know. I thank them for persevering in faith, hope and love.

As we wait to hear whether the legal process will continue, I will seek to provide pastoral support to those Catholics who may have found their faith tested.

Financial Report: July 2018 to June 2019 (from *Daniel Portelli*, a member of the Parish Finance Committee)

Dear Parishioners, another Financial Year (July 2018 to June 2019) has passed and I wish to share with you the good news of the Parish financial affairs. After all this is "our" Parish and to remain vibrant it must be transparent and accountable. Firstly, I would like to thank all Parishioners that have supported our Parish and have made the generous contributions of both time and donations.

The Parish income for the recently ended Financial Year (2018/19) was \$100,640 higher than the previous year. This increase in income resulted in a larger than normal surplus of \$112,117 compared to a deficit of -\$62,828 in the previous Financial Year (2017/18) and it will be carried forward to help cover Parish Expenses in subsequent Financial Years. This year's surplus was a welcome relief as the increasing Parish administration and repair expenses continue to grow at a much faster rate than the regular source of weekly income from the *second* collection. The unusual increase in **Parish income** is a result of some new and non-recurring events, in particular:

- A temporary increase in demand to hire the Parish Hall for private events, including the return of the before-and-after school care facilities; and,
- donations to the church including for a new stain-glass window and possible renovations to the Chapel of Our Lady (\$20,000 from one donor); and,
- Rent and Interest income that resulted from the "land-swap"*.

*In late 2017 a transfer of properties occurred between SCS and the Parish as part of a 'land swap' arrangement to facilitate the development of Regina Coeli Primary Catholic School. Although we do not expect to have this property available for rent or the interest from the deposit much longer as more change is anticipated, it has given the Parish an important opportunity to recover much of the costs incurred to relocate the Parish Community Centre last year.

Parish Expenses have also declined by \$74,305 as there were no further relocation costs for the Parish Centre required this year and some building repairs to the Church were delayed. As you may have noticed, the Church requires some much-needed repair work and I am sure our newly formed Parish Repairs and Maintenance Committee will be eager to see some repairs performed shortly.

It has been a busy financial year that has seen many changes and I am pleased to see that our underlying Parish financial affairs have remained in good order, showing the Parish vibrancy and resilience. As the outlook of our future Parish sources of income remain uncertain, while our Parish Expenses continue to rise (particularly repairs), I would like to encourage all Parishioners to please continue to

The vision of a disciple must be the vision of God. Disciples must see with wide angled lenses that enable them to recognise that God offers the grace of salvation to all. The passages from both Isaiah and Luke are astounding in their inclusivity. They show that God's saving grace is unbounded. It reaches out to those whom the people of God may not only distrust but sometimes even despise. There is something very dangerous about being smugly convinced of one's own salvation. When we are so sure of ourselves, we can easily fall into the error of being as sure of the moral failure of others as well. The gospel warns us against such judgment.

Women and men are gathered into the community of the saved, primarily because others have been sent out to get them. The psalm refrain is the command to go out to the whole world. The first reading describes God sending fugitives back home to get their relatives. People come from all over because someone is sent to get them. Today that command is directed to us. We are the ones who are being sent out to bring others to God. Unfortunately there are many people who do not believe that they are fit to be evangelisers. They may think that the work that they do or the lives that they live do not lend themselves to the task of spreading the good news of the gospel. They do not realise that all Christians are called and sent. This is not an option; it is a responsibility.
