About the "mystery" of collections. It's probably not what you think. When it comes to collections - yes, I am speaking of money collections at Mass - there is a pretty good chance that some of your assumptions about them have been slightly off the mark. But it is not your fault. The current system of church collection has been decided and approved by the boards and archbishops from the past. We are bound to follow it according to some rules whose exact nature I cannot quite define at the moment. And the basic gist of it is this: **The first collection does not go to the parish, not quite; instead, the second collection does!** 

So, if you ever put into the first collection a decisive amount of financial contribution, with a heartfelt desire to support the local parish, your kind generosity would have been, although admirable, somewhat misplaced. Would that it were so simple!' (From the movie *Hail Caesar*) It would have been advisable for you to exercise patience, start gently perhaps with a smaller sum at the first collection and then work your way toward a larger finale at the second collection because, once again, it is the latter that goes to the parish and stays there:

Money from the second collection supports the maintenance of the parish buildings and pastoral programs. The parish must work within its own budget and is unable to draw funds for expenses from any source other than its own parish income. Loans for church works are permitted as long as they can be serviced.' (*Parish Finance and Administrative Guidelines*, Sydney Archdiocese).

What then is the first collection (usually taken at the offertory) for? Firstly, it covers the priest-related expenses such as monthly stipends, superannuation, housekeeping and mass supply, etc. But then *whatever* is in excess does not stay in the parish; instead, it is sent to a central body known as the Clergy Remuneration System whose function it is to manage a common fund and supplement those parishes whose first collections happen to be insufficient for their priests.

A few things to consider:

- Currently, there is only one priest (that's me!) in *Regina Coeli*. Therefore all priest-related expenses have been halved, generally speaking. At the moment, over 50% of our first collections is in excess and being sent over to the Clergy Remuneration System. Whilst this may be seen as a "positive act of generosity", whether it is 'intended' is another question.
- By contrast, we do not have such surplus when it comes to second collections which support parish operations. In fact, we have been in deficit for the past few years (more of this later). Although I am optimistic that our deficit can be managed without too much difficulty, there is a danger of being seen as a parish which is unable to become self-sufficient.

All I wish to say for the time being is, let's become better informed and more intentional when it comes to giving. Please stay tuned for more to come!



#### First Reading Jos 24:1-2, 15-18

We will serve the Lord God, because he is our God.

Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel together at Shechem; then he called the elders, leaders, judges and scribes of Israel, and they presented themselves before God. Then Joshua said to all the people: 'If you will not serve the Lord, choose today whom you wish to serve, whether the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are now living. As for me and my House, we will serve the Lord.'

The people answered, 'We have no intention of deserting the Lord and serving other gods! Was it not the Lord our God who brought us and our ancestors out of the land of Egypt, the house of slavery, who worked those great wonders before our eyes and preserved us all along the way we travelled and among all the peoples through whom we journeyed. We too will serve the Lord, for he is our God.'

### Responsorial Psalm

Ps 33:2-3, 16-23, R. v.9

- (R.) Taste and see the goodness of the Lord.
- I will bless the Lord at all times, his praise always on my lips; in the Lord my soul shall make its boast. The humble shall hear and be glad. (R.)

#### Second Reading Eph 5:21-32

This is the great mystery, it applies to Christ and the Church.

Give way to one another in obedience to Christ. Wives should regard their husbands as they regard the Lord, since as Christ is head of the Church and saves the whole body, so is a husband the head of his wife; and as the Church submits to Christ, so should wives to their husbands, in everything. Husbands should love their wives just as Christ loved the Church and

sacrificed himself for her to make her holy. He made her clean by washing her in water with a form of words, so that when he took her to himself she would be glorious, with no speck or wrinkle or anything like that, but holy and faultless. In the same way, husbands must love their wives as they love their own bodies; for a man to love his wife is for him to love himself. A man never hates his own body, but he feeds it and looks after it; and that is the way Christ treats the Church, because it is his body - and we are its living parts. For this reason, a man must leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two will become one body. This mystery has many implications; but I am saying it applies to Christ and the Church.

#### Gospel Acclamation See Jn 6:63. 68

Alleluia, alleluia! Your words, Lord, are spirit and life: you have the words of everlasting life. Alleluia!

#### Gospel Jn 6:60-69

Lord, whom shall we go to? You have the words of everlasting life.

After hearing his doctrine many of the followers of Jesus said, 'This is intolerable language. How could anyone accept it?' Jesus was aware that his followers were complaining about it and said, 'Does this upset you? What if you should see the Son of Man ascend to where he was before?

'It is the spirit that gives life, the flesh has nothing to offer. The words I have spoken to you are spirit and they are life.

'But there are some of you who do not believe.' For Jesus knew from the outset those who did not believe, and who it was that would betray him. He went on, 'This is why I told you that no one could come to me unless the Father allows him.' After this, many of his disciples left him and stopped going with him.

Then Jesus said to the Twelve, 'What about you, do you want to go away too?' Simon Peter answered, 'Lord, who shall we go to? You have the message of eternal life, and we believe; we know that you are the Holy One of God.'

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#### Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

The decisions called for in today's readings are life decisions. The people at the time of Joshua had to decide which god they would worship. The disciples of Jesus had to decide if he was the one who would fulfill their messianic expectations. We have life decisions to make as well. How will we choose?

The choices we make determine the character of our union with God. God called us out of the slavery of sin and protected us throughout the journey of our lives. Jesus walked with us through the challenges of life and performed wonders for us. Why should we look elsewhere? Because we face new challenges. The new demands placed on us may be so great, or the commitment required of us may be so demanding that we feel that we can no longer walk with him. The church may be changing in ways we do not appreciate, or it may not be changing in the ways we believe it should, and so we may feel that we can walk with him no longer.

If we decide to commit ourselves, we will enter into a union with God that is deeper than anything we have previously known. However, this union will be based on faith. We may understand no more than we did in the past, things may be no more to our liking. But, 'to whom shall we go?' Jesus is God's holy one; he has the words of eternal life.
