Second Sunday in Advent 8 December 2019

How astonishing it is that something so free can turn out to be so incredibly precious and critical to our wellbeing! When I was in the seminary, an overly enthusiastic seminarian filled the chapel with so much incense one morning that we could *taste* it in the air (or so we thought). Well, this past week, Sydney has been filled with so much bushfire-smoke that it was definitely more than our sense of smell that reacted to it. I think we had at least a small taste of what a post-apocalyptic world might feel like - a world in which fresh air can no longer be taken for granted.

On Thursday I helped out with a Year 12 retreat in Tahmoor. This allowed me the strange experience of, after driving for 40 minutes or so, actually breaking out of the cloud of smoke and beholding the delightful sight of blue sky for what seemed like the first time in a while. When I got out of the car and breathed in what reminded me of the fresh air of old, tears were nearly brought to my eyes. I started the Mass by saying that a retreat is like climbing to a mountain top where we can breathe in God's fresh air - something which was also literally true for those who left Sydney in order to participate in the retreat. I added: Let's remember not to take fresh air for granted!

The parish Christmas party is now less than a week away. Food is being organised, tables & chairs have been ordered and the booking for a jumping castle is all but confirmed. Weather-permitting, it will be held under the shade cloth between the church and the school. But in case of uncleared smoke or rain - we will be quite happy if the latter were the case - the event will still go on in the hall. Now may be a good time to ask, 'why do we have a parish Christmas party?' Certainly not because there is any shortage of Christmas parties! Rather, I think it is a meaningful way for us to come together as a faith community and socialise! As a naturally shy person, I have to intentionally counter, over and over again, my tendency to remain only where I feel comfortable; it would be detrimental to me as a priest and a human being to succumb to the desire not to venture out of my comfort zone (I must admit though that I do succumb to it more often than I should).

We could say that a parish that no longer works on connecting to one another in ever new ways is a poor parish. No amount of cosmetic improvement can change the fact that such a parish is in fact dying. Our forebears worked hard to build up the parish as many of us have come to know it. But one of the things we really cannot afford to take for granted these days is...parish life! Let's not wait until we miss it in order to start caring about it!



First Reading Is 11:1-10

He judges the poor with justice.

A shoot springs from the stock of Jesse, a scion thrusts from his roots: on him the spirit of the Lord rests, a spirit of wisdom and insight, a spirit of counsel and power, a spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord. (The fear of the Lord is his breath.) He does not judge by appearances, he gives no verdict on hearsay, but judges the wretched with integrity, and with equity gives a verdict for the poor of the land.

His word is a rod that strikes the ruthless,

his sentences bring death to the wicked. Integrity is the loincloth round his waist, faithfulness the belt about his hips. The wolf lives with the lamb. the panther lies down with the kid, calf and lion cub feed together with a little boy to lead them. The cow and the bear make friends, their young lie down together. The lion eats straw like the ox. The infant plays over the cobra's hole; into the viper's lair the young child puts his hand. They do no hurt, no harm, on all my holy mountain, for the country is filled with the knowledge of the Lord as the waters swell the sea. That day, the root of Jesse shall stand as a signal to the peoples.

Second Reading Rom 15:4-9

Christ, the hope of all people.

Everything that was written long ago in the scriptures was meant to teach us something about hope from the examples scripture gives of how people who did not give up were helped by God. And may he who helps us when we refuse to give up, help you all to be tolerant with each other, following the example of Christ Jesus, so that united in mind and voice you may give glory to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

It can only be to God's glory, then, for you to treat each other in the same friendly way as Christ treated you. The reason Christ became the servant of circumcised Jews was not only so that God could faithfully carry out the promises made to the patriarchs, it was also to get the pagans to give glory to God for his mercy, as scripture says in one place: For this I shall praise you among the pagans and sing your name.

Gospel Mt 3:1-12

Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.

In due course John the Baptist appeared; he preached in the wilderness of Judaea and this was his message: 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.' This was the man the prophet Isaiah spoke of when he said:

A voice cries in the wilderness: Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight.

This man John wore a garment made of camel-hair with a leather belt round his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then Jerusalem and all Judaea and the whole Jordan district made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. But when he saw a number of Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism he said to them, 'Brood of vipers, who warned you to fly from the retribution that is coming? But if you are repentant, produce the appropriate fruit, and do not presume to tell yourselves, "We have Abraham for our father," because, I tell you, God can raise children for Abraham from these stones. Even now the axe is laid to the roots of the trees, so that any tree which fails to produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown on the fire. I baptise you in water for repentance, but the one who follows me is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to carry his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fan is in his hand; he will clear his threshing-floor and gather his wheat into the barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire that will never go out.'

Today's readings are like Chaucer's Canterbury Tales. The biblical authors sketch profiles of individuals after whom we can model our lives as we embark on our pilgrimage to eschatological fulfilment. Isaiah depicts the righteous messianic king; Paul provides us with a glimpse of Jesus, the one who ministers to all; and Matthew describes John the Baptist, the prophet who prepared for the Advent of Christ.

The gifts Isaiah attributes to the messianic king are the same gifts that we receive with the anointing of the Spirit: wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety and fear of the Lord. The image of the messianic king may have been fulfilled in Jesus, but it is also offered to us as a model after which we can pattern our lives.

Paul declares that Christ came for all. Just as the Canterbury tales describe pilgrims of all backgrounds and characters, so our companions on the pilgrimage come from diverse circumstances. Since the invitation was extended to all, we are expected to welcome all. Some of Chaucer's characters were quite unpleasant, but they were part of the group. Many of the people to whom Jesus ministered were quite unpleasant, but this did not deter him. His example is set before us today.

John the Baptist lived a life of radical self-denial, but he did not require this of others. He preached repentance or change of heart, not a rejection of the circumstances of life. He called for a return to righteousness, to relationships rooted in honesty and respect. He condemned presumption and arrogant reliance on one's religious origin, complacency and the shirking of responsibility, disinterest in the welfare of others.

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
