Dear parishioners,

As promised earlier, I wish to present you with a report on the last financial year (July 2017 - June 2018). After all, this is 'our' parish. I do hope you will stay engaged with all important matters, including the financial, so as to help the parish to become not only vibrant but also 'transparent and accountable' - not just in words but also in practice.

When it comes to **Parish Income** for the last financial year, you will notice a clear decline compared to the previous year. Nevertheless, there are a few things to keep in mind:

- The privilege of 100% tax deductibility for Planned Giving has been lost. There can be no doubt that this has had a detrimental impact on Parish Income, at least for the time being. For complex reasons to do with "church accounting", it is difficult to make fair comparisons between the eras 'before' and 'after' the loss of tax deductibility.
- Perhaps the new priest (that's me!) has been somewhat uninspiring, since his arrival halfway through the last financial year, not least when it comes to engendering a spirit of 'giving'. There may be other reasons too, one of which is that our base of committed parishioners has been diminishing due to natural causes.
- Please remember that the first collection does not go to the parish, not quite; instead, the second collection does (and becomes Parish Income)!

When it comes to **Parish Expenditure** for the last financial year, even though there was less spending in general, one major item left a significant mark, namely, 'Relocation of the Parish Centre to 5 Tarilli Street.'

Therefore, **on the whole, the parish operated at a deficit of \$59,933 in the last financial year.** Nevertheless, we can reasonably hope that, all things being equal, the parish will be able to operate at a surplus in the new financial year, unless, of course, we were inflicted with unexpected items of major expenditure. But if that were to happen I am confident that there will be an appropriate response from parishioners of good will. Unaccounted for in the report are some of the circumstances resulting from the 'land-swap' last year. I do hope to make this aspect also transparent when time is right. Well, I think that's enough from me. I will let the numbers finish the rest! Please turn to the third page for more.

PIOUS CUSTOMS

To kneel in prayer: to stand for praise: to sit for instruction. Kneeling and standing testify humility and resolution. St Basil considered kneeling and standing to symbolise sin and grace, "We bend the knee, and this represents our fall by sin; we afterwards rise again, and this is a type of the divine mercy that raises us again, and gives us assurance to look up to heaven." We sit for instruction; but an exception is made whilst the Holy Gospel at the Eucharist is read, at which we stand. The reason for this exception appears to be, because, in the Holy Gospel, the very words and actions of our Lord are set forth in the course of the one divinely ordained service of the Church. An old writer says, "All the congregation stand up at the reading of the Gospel, as being the words of the Master; whereas, at the reading of the Epistle, they are indulged the posture of sitting, as being the words of the servants."

Second Reading Jas 2:1-5

Has not God chosen the poor of the world to inherit the kingdom?

My brothers, do not try to combine faith in Jesus Christ, our glorified Lord, with the making of distinctions between classes of people. Now suppose a man comes into your synagogue, beautifully dressed and with a gold ring on, and at the same time a poor man comes in, in shabby clothes, and you take notice of the well-dressed

man, and say, 'Come this way to the best seats'; then you tell the poor man, 'Stand over there' or 'You can sit on the floor by my foot-rest.' Can't you see that you have used two different standards in your mind, and turned yourselves into judges, and corrupt judges at that?

Listen, my dear brothers: it was those who are poor according to the world that God chose, to be rich in faith and to be the heirs to the kingdom which he promised to those who love him.

Gospel Mk 7:31-37

He makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.

Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way of Sidon towards the sea of Galilee, right through the Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha,' that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'

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Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

Jesus opens our eyes to the reality of God's presence in our midst, in the goodness of people and in the tenderness of life, even in its vulnerability. He opens our ears to hear the word of God spoken to us by others, revealed to us through the created world.

There is an eschatological dimension to being open to the word of God, because we are opened to hear something from the future. The prophets always speak about this future in the present tense. They see happening already. Isaiah proclaims, 'Here is your God!' and the world is transformed. Jesus says 'Be open.' The good news always opens us to future possibilities, to personal and communal transformation, to a new creation. With the word of God, the future invades our present.

Although the eschatological future is already present to us, it is only unfolding, it has not yet opened completely. We still judge each other by appearances. We still miss the presence of God in the poor and the dispossessed, in those who suffer from disease or war or loneliness. We still shun those of another race, or those who have been shaped by another culture, or those who worship God in a different way. Although the eschatological future is already present, we have not yet put aside all of the biases of the past, we have not yet been fully transformed. But God has spoken, God has come to save us. God is trustworthy; God keeps faith forever.
