Why is Confirmation important? This is a question that requires another question: Why is faith important, in particular faith in Jesus Christ? The trouble with faith is that it is like a mustard seed - seemingly small, insignificant and therefore easily overlooked. However, faith, once planted like a mustard seed in the depth of our soul and then properly nurtured, grows into a tree of gentle strength on which others can depend. *Interiority* is vitally important for recognising the value of the "mustard seed." Interiority seems tricky to define: a sense of our own inner-being or our self-awareness as personal beings who are capable of relationships; it could be as simple as self-knowledge or knowing that we have a conscience in which meaningful dialogues can be held. Without interiority the utter importance of faith could not be grasped. For example, we would be unable to identify with St Augustine's claim that we are restless until we find rest in a marriage-like relationship with God; we would also struggle to see the exhilarating truth behind the parable of the Good Shepherd, namely, God's "crazy" love for us.

Interiority has become a great challenge for our contemporary society. *Busyness* has become the business of life and *distraction* the name of the game. With the advent of so called "smart" devices, being connected to the internet 24/7 has become the rule rather than the exception. Being flooded with inessential information about what other people are doing, saying or watching seems to have done something awful to our psyche: we have come to believe, quite unconsciously, that being connected to the internet is as good as having interiority itself. Consequently, when a sense of emptiness arises within us, we tend to take that as a cue for spending even more time online, instead of recognising it for what it really is, namely, the inner cry of our impoverished interiority.

Interiority is like the "wifi" of spiritual life. Every device connected to a network has an IP address. Of course, our "IP address" can never be reduced to just a series of numbers. Like the tip of an iceberg, there is always more to us than meets the eye, far beneath the surface. At the root of human misery is our fractured communion with God and with one another. Jesus has dived all the way to the bottom of the ocean of our sadness in order to heal the primordial fracture and to re-create us from within. Interiority or honesty allows the divine network to connect to us, at the moment of which we are surprised by the joy of realising that the divine network too has an identifiable IP address, namely, the human heart of Jesus, the Sacred Heart! The coming together of the two hearts - ours and his - seems to be the essence of spiritual life, the most profound of all connections.

The Sacrament of Confirmation "upgrades," as it were, the divine connection established in us at Baptism. Whatever "technology" it was which enabled us to connect to the objective of our inmost desire, namely, God, becomes confirmed or strengthened when the gift of the Holy Spirit is given to us at Confirmation. But just like any upgrade of the communicative kind, it isn't really an upgrade unless it is actually used for the purpose of communication. Unused, the marvellous potential of the upgrade remains sadly dormant. The disciples had the privilege of being formed by Jesus in an intensive manner, by being inseparable with him during the three years of his public life. They heard what he uttered and witnessed how he moved, without even remotely comprehending their full meaning. In other words, they had raw data or hands-on experience which needed to be unpacked and unleashed as life-giving energy; they had oil which awaited ignition. Enter the Holy Spirit, who came upon the disciples at Pentecost and gave birth to the Church!


Gospel Mt 25:14-30

Because you have been faithful over a few things, enter into the joy of the Lord.

Jesus spoke this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a man on his way abroad who summoned his servants and entrusted his property to them. To one he gave five talents, to another two, to a third one; each in proportion to his ability. Then he set out. The man who had received the five talents promptly went and traded with them and made five more. The man who had received two made two more in the same way. But the man who had received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. Now a long time after, the master of those servants came back and went through his accounts with them. The man who had received the five talents came forward bringing five more. "Sir", he said "you entrusted me with five talents; here are five more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Next the man with the two talents came forward. "Sir." he said "you entrusted me with two talents; here are two more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Last came forward the man who had the one talent. "Sir," said he "I had heard you were a hard man, reaping where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered; so I was afraid, and I went off and hid your talent in the ground. Here it is; it was yours, you have it back." But his master answered him, "You wicked and lazy servant! So you knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered? Well then, you should have deposited my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have recovered my capital with interest. So now, take the talent from him and give it to the man who has the five talents. For to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away. As for this good-for-nothing servant, throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth."

It is not enough that we wait patiently. We are expected to be industrious as we await the advent of the reign of God. We have all been entrusted with talents that really belong to God, and we must use these talents to the best of our ability in the interim between the Lord's departure and his final return. The ideal wisdom figure in the first reading is a model of such industriousness.

Fidelity to the reign of God requires that we be willing to take risks. We do not know the time of the Lord's coming, and so there will have to be a kind of tentativeness to all of our plans. We will never be able to be certain that they will be brought to fruition. We must spend and be spent without the assurance that we will be able to reap the rewards of our investment. To refuse to risk is to refuse to trust.

If we have been wise and have industriously employed the Lord's talents, which were entrusted to us, we will be richly rewarded. However, if we have not realised the potential that is possessed by our talents, and if we have not employed them as they were meant to be employed, we will be punished. The foolish man in the gospel knew that the householder was exacting. He had some idea of what to expect. He made his choice and he had to accept the consequences of that choice.
