# Weekly Newsletter

## Second Sunday of Advent 6 December 2020

The Day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then with a roar the sky will vanish, the elements will catch fire and fall apart, the earth and all that it contains will be burnt up. (2 Peter 3:10)

What a strange description, not least because the Day of the Lord is said to be coming in the manner of a thief! And yet the "thief motif" is repeated numerous times in the New Testament, including by Jesus himself who, as a matter of fact, seems to have started it. So, the question is, what does Jesus have in common with a thief?

Blindspots are, as it were, the paradise of thieves. The success of their "craft" depends on not being seen or caught. Therefore, as long as there are blindspots to be exploited, there is a future for the thieves of this world. What about Jesus? What could possibly explain his close identification with blindspots? Needless to say, Jesus does not want to hide himself as such; instead, what he desires is to reveal himself but in a proper manner - in the manner of God! How we see the world can be quite different from how God sees the world. Our ways can be quite different from God's ways. Therefore the rule of thumb seems to be that Jesus reveals himself in such a manner as to bring us closer to God's vision and God's ways. This means that Jesus is present especially where we haven't reached yet, namely, our blindspots.

Last Thursday I had to travel to Tahmoor in order to be available for reconciliation and Mass at a Year 12 retreat. I knew that my car was low on fuel as I left Sydney but felt confident that there would soon be a gas station on Hume Motorway. Perhaps I was distracted/tired and missed the first gas station, but a bad feeling came over me as I drove past the Campbeltown exit and the fuel gauge appeared to be crashing. Finally, there was a rest area in sight. But, alas, this was a rest area without a gas station! I pulled in anyway because, according to the dashboard display, my poor car had less than 7km left in it. Just then I saw a sign on the road which announced that the next gas station was...15km away!

A nightmare seemed to be unfolding in slow motion. Not only was I going to be late, it also seemed possible that I would never make it to the retreat. Fortunately, I was not stranded alone; there were plenty of cars, 4WD's and trucks in the rest area. Forcing myself to overcome awkwardness/embarrassment, I approached the other drivers to see if they could help. To be honest, I was a little taken aback by the promptness with which they all said 'no.' After the 5th or 6th rejection, I decided to call the NRMA Roadside Assistance whose automated system failed to inspire in me any hope for urgent response. Just then a small truck drove into the rest area. It was the kind of truck you probably wouldn't buy even if it were offered to you for free old, rusted and barely running as though by some ancient, mechanical miracle. Furthermore, it was carrying all kinds of junk whose mysterious purpose was beyond anyone's guess. Inside were two blokes who, to be frank, looked as though they had not showered in a few days and could never be suspected of being, let's say, "overeducated." Thinking myself devoid of anything to lose, I explained my situation to these blokes who, without a moment of hesitation, descended from the vehicle to help, like some angels in disguise.

Robert James Henderson, born on the 10<sup>th</sup> February 1937 in Tamworth NSW to George and Vera Henderson the proud youngest son of 12 children.

As a young Man he attended a CYO social gathering at Dulwich Hill with some National Service friends, these were very popular back in the day. Where believe it or not he saw the love of his life Janice Currie...Bob firstly had to convert to a catholic to which he did, they were married and for 60 years they have remained so, AMAZING!



Dad knew Mum was a dedicated and enthusiastic Irish dancer and...he was her support and ear about all things Irish dancing. He was the voice and stage manager for many of the early Australian Irish Dancing championships. He produced by hand the art that would adorn the back of the stage. He would man the broom at the end of every competition and help clean the hall as did many other fathers and sons.

In 1969 Dad's support of MUM was again demonstrated when they had saved enough money to go around the world...When they got back home Mum told me when they were seated on the aircraft he turned to Mum and said, how does a bloke from Tamworth who had nothing, get to travel the world with the love of his life.

Dads greatest pride were his boys Robert, Michael, Andrew and Craig and a little angel that never made it to the field of play our brother Peter.

As you all know in recent times Dad was not a well man, but he still always had words of love and care for his family. He was a little frustrated with his health but you could call him and he asked how you were, he cared more about you than his own situation, such was the man a father and Husband.

If it wasn't for the silly mistake which put me in such a predicament, hearts of gold like theirs might have remained in my blindspot, entirely overlooked. We wait for new heavens and a new earth.

There is one thing, my friends, that you must never forget: that with the Lord, 'a day' can mean a thousand years, and a thousand years is like a day. The Lord is not being slow to carry out his promises, as anybody else might be called slow; but he is being patient with you all, wanting nobody to be lost and everybody to be brought to change his ways. The Day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then with a roar the sky will vanish, the elements will catch fire and fall apart, the earth and all that it contains will be burnt up.

Since everything is coming to an end like this, you should be living holy and saintly lives while you wait and long for the Day of God to come, when the sky will dissolve in flames and the elements melt in the heat. What we are waiting for is what he promised: the new heavens and new earth, the place where righteousness will be at home. So then, my friends, while you are waiting, do your best to live lives without spot or stain so that he will find you at peace.

#### Gospel Acclamation Lk 3:4. 6

Alleluia, alleluia!

Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths:

all people shall see the salvation of God. Alleluia!

#### Gospel Mk 1:1-8

Make straight the paths of the Lord.

The beginning of the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Son of God. It is written in the book of the prophet Isaiah:

Look, I am going to send my messenger before you;

he will prepare your way. A voice cries in the wilderness: Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight,

and so it was that John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. All Judaea and all the people of Jerusalem made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. John wore a garment of camel-skin, and he lived on locusts and wild honey. In the course of his preaching he said, 'Someone is following me, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to kneel down and undo the strap of his sandals. I have baptised you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit.'

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#### Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

In the wilderness God's salvation comes to a broken people. In the midst of what is seemingly an impossible situation, hope emerges with vigour. In this context, hope is an openness to surprise, the surprise that God is in no way limited to the imaginings of human minds and the consequences of human history. This is the kind of hope that is proclaimed in the wilderness by John; it is the kind of hope that trusts that from the impossible, God can work a new creation.

There is something of a time warp in Christianity. What is future is made present. The prophetic oracle announces the future as if it is already happening. This sense of the future-present prompts new ways of living. As the future takes root in human lives, the present is transformed into a new creation and the Day of the Lord appears.

God's future comes through the wilderness into the broken city and inspires a broken-hearted people. The contrite heart is a broken heart, an emptied-out heart, a hope-filled heart. It is a heart that is unencumbered by the past and that lives currently in the passing of time and the fragility of being alive. The contrite, broken heart can be filled only by what is promised in the future. This is the paradox of Advent. In the middle of the wilderness, God works the impossible in those whose hearts are ready for the surprise of hope.
