Second Sunday in Lent 28 February 2021

'As they came down from the mountain [Jesus] warned them to tell no one what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. They observed the warning faithfully, though among themselves they discussed what 'rising from the dead' could mean.' (Mark 9:9-10)

The Gospels are replete with stories about Jesus doing amazing works then telling people not to talk about them. Of course, the people cannot help themselves; they "super-spread," unable to contain the excitement. At the Transfiguration, Peter, James and John probably witnessed by far the most incredible event in their lives up until that point in time. So how was it that they were apparently able to do what no one else could, namely, 'tell no one what they had seen'?

Two reasons come to mind. Firstly, the Transfiguration was so otherworldly that the disciples were at loss as to how to describe it; how does one "gossip" when no one else can relate to it? So Peter rambled because 'he did not know what to say; they were so frightened.' (Mark 9:6) Secondly, it was probably the phrase 'rising from the dead' which had the effect of profoundly silencing them. Not bypassing or jumping over death but 'rising from the dead,' as in emerging from complete submersion in the sea of death!

The unknown tends to command us into reverent silence. Jesus, by 'rising from the dead,' has shown us that the way to the unknown of heaven is through the unknown of death. We need reverent familiarity with both, just like the *glorious Mary standing on the sea of death* (or troubles of life). Speaking of which, a new stain glass has been installed!

'Mary was a good mother,' said the mystery parishioner who has donated the beautiful window. The three angels are meant to represent the three persons who have been like angels in her life: her mother, her father and, last but not least, Fr William Evans, the first Parish Priest of Regina Coeli!

The son of the mystery donor said, 'Mum has always had an affection and deep reverence for Mary and her role. Before marriage she had a lot to do with the Children of Mary group of Beverly Hills. It is all very important to mum.'

About Noel Smith

Noel was born on 25 December (!) 1926 and has been a model Christian ever since, attending daily Mass whenever possible from a young age. He and his wife had two sons. One died in a tragic accident. The other became a priest - Fr Peter Smith. His wife was one of the pioneering catechists in the Archdiocese under Fr Freeman (who later became Cardinal Freeman) in Surry Hill and was subsequently given the honour of being a 'Lifetime Catechist;' she passed away in 2008. Noel's eldest brother was a priest - Fr Cecil Smith, S.J.

Noel has been a member of St Vincent de Paul Society since 1954 when he joined the Bondi conference. Several times he has been President of the Beverly Hills conference. Currently he is the Vice President. He has represented the Beverly Hills conference numerous times at the regional level.

Noel was a member of the Serra Club from 1960s until it closed in 1990s. He was District Governor of NSW and QLD. Bishop Terry Brady's father worked alongside Noel as a fellow member of the Serra Club. Noel represented the Serra Club and sat on the Archdiocesan Vocations Committee which was chaired by Cardinal Freeman. Noel was one of the organisers for the 'Daybreak 80' project which was a concert at the Opera House, showcasing musical talent among priests and religious.

Noel was a member of the Movement which was set up to counteract the Communist movement in Sydney. He was a founding member of Life Ascending - a spiritual movement for Catholic retirees - for which he was Treasurer for 10 years. The movement received official approval from Cardinal Pell. In 1981 Noel was one of the four who were installed as first ever acolytes in the parish. He continued to serve in this role until 2008 when his wife passed away. Since then he has been helping out in various ways, most commonly as a collector/warden at Mass.

These are just some of the ways in which Noel has contributed to the life of the parish and beyond. We shall miss him as he moves into a nursing home but our affection and gratitude for him will remain for a long time!

The sacrifice of Abraham, our father in faith.

We all have dreams for the future. dreams about success and well-being. We all want a better world for our children and grandchildren. religious tradition sets before us aspirations that call for personal transformation. However, sometimes when we follow the inspiration of our most devout aspirations, obstacles are thrown in our path preventing us from following our dreams. Still, God does not call us out of our dreams into a vacuum. If we are asked to relinquish a possible future, it is only to be offered God's future. Our aspirations may be noble, but the possibilities that God offers will outstrip them in excellence. Abraham was promised an heir; he relinquished his hold on his heir, and he was granted heirs beyond counting. Jesus came as a Rabbi; he allowed himself to be handed over to death, and he was revealed as the beloved Son of God.

Those preparing for Baptism might be asked to relinquish the dreams that they previously held in order to embrace the future God has in store for them. We who are already joined to Christ will be asked to recommit ourselves to this transformative experience. Do we have faith, or do we need a glimpse of Christ's transfiguration in order to believe in his resurrection? Do we have to see and touch Jesus, or are we able to believe because we have heard his message? God's future in Christ is open to us, but we must accept it in faith, even when we do not fully understand what it means.
