Third Sunday in Lent 7 March 2021

Noel Smith's Farewell Party last week was, among other things, pleasant, heartwarming, nostalgic and sufficiently attended. The young at heart came out of the woodwork and took care of the event in its entirety - from planning to cleaning up, something which they used to do fairly regularly (although with gradually declining physical strength) during the pre-corona era.

The best part of the evening for me was when the man of the hour spoke. He started by praising those who were present, saying that many of them had done more than he had. Then he spoke in the most heartfelt manner about what a great community we had here at Regina Coeli.

I must admit that I felt conflicted as I listened to that last, most moving part of the speech. I knew that he meant what he said. And he was right. There has been a great community here at Regina Coeli. Noel Smith himself was an excellent example of someone who contributed to and benefitted from that community. So why did I feel conflicted?

Unfortunately, the legendary generation that constituted the core of the great community here at Regina Coeli has been diminishing over time. Last year alone we lost a good number of them. At one stage the men from St Vicent de Paul Society were jokingly remarking that it might be better for them to hold their meetings in heaven since the members up there seemed to clearly outnumber those down here!

The great community which Noel Smith spoke so fondly of was neither an accident nor a naturally occurring social phenomenon which could be taken for granted by every community; rather, it was a fruit born out of many years of faith development, communal worship, dedicated service and Christian fraternity. I believe I am being realistic when I say that, currently here at Regina Coeli, we are yet to be on track toward another era of being able to form a great community, or so says my conflicted conscience.

This is a complex issue, but I take responsibility for a large part of the problem. I do not wish to say too much on this at the moment because, after all, it is a whole another topic perhaps for another day, suffice it to say that I have been appointed Parish Priest of Regina Coeli for a term of 6 years. It probably hasn't helped that the first of these has coincided with, shall we say, a very unusual time in human history. But I do hope to do at least a little bit better in each of the remaining five years. On the bright side, no matter what happens, you'll see light in the end!

In times of confusion and uncertainty, it would seem especially important to start everything with gratitude. I am grateful for the fact that enough people attend Mass here at Regina Coeli so as to make our spacious church seem much more half-full than half-empty. I am grateful for the dedicated volunteers who are heroically supporting the continuation of parish life. I am grateful for the fact that, even though we have been operating at below full capacity ever since the pandemic, financial contribution from parishioners has remained so strong that the parish hasn't qualified for government subsidies since the last quarter of 2020 (even then, barely).

First Reading Ex 20:1-17 (or shorter form Ex 20:1-3, 7-8, 12-17)

The Law was given through Moses.

God spoke all these words. He said, 'I am the Lord your God who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery.

'You shall have no gods except me.

You shall not make yourself a carved image or any likeness of anything in heaven or on earth beneath or in the waters under the earth; you shall not bow down to them or serve them. For I, the Lord your God, am a jealous God and I punish the father's fault in the sons, the grandsons, and the great-grandsons of those who hate me; but I show kindness to thousands of those who love me and keep my commandments.

You shall not utter the name of the Lord your God to misuse it, for the Lord will not leave unpunished the man who utters his name to misuse it.

'Remember the sabbath day and keep it holy. For six days you shall labour and do all your work, but the seventh day is a sabbath for the Lord your God. You shall do no work on that day, neither you nor your son nor your daughter nor your servants, men or women, not your animals nor the stranger who lives with you. that all who believe in him might have eternal life.



Gospel Jn 2:13-25

Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up.

Just before the Jewish Passover Jesus went up to Jerusalem, and in the Temple he found people selling cattle and sheep and pigeons, and the money changers sitting at their counters there. Making a whip out of some cord, he drove them all out of the Temple, cattle and sheep as well, scattered the money changers' coins, knocked their tables over and said to the pigeon-sellers, 'Take all this out of here and stop turning my Father's house into a market.' Then his disciples remembered the words of scripture: Zeal for your house will devour me. The Jews intervened and said, 'What sign can you show us to justify what you have done?' Jesus answered, 'Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up.' The Jews replied, 'It has taken forty-six years to build this sanctuary: are you going to raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the sanctuary that was his body, and when Jesus rose from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the scripture and the words he had said.

During his stay in Jerusalem for the Passover many believed in his name when they saw the signs that he gave, but Jesus knew them all and did not trust himself to them; he never needed evidence about any man; he could tell what a man had in him.

Israel believed that the temple was built over the navel of the universe, the axis mundi, that spot where the world above and the world below met the world of history, thus enabling the three worlds to communicate. When Jesus called himself the new temple, he was claiming to be the centre of the universe, the spot where three-way cosmic communication occurs, the presence of God in the midst of the community. When we accept him in faith, we are accepting these claims. We may profess this belief, but do our lives reflect it?

Although some consider the law a rigid set of precepts, it is really more a collection of directives that have grown out of the experience of life. To say that Jesus is the wisdom of God means that God's wisdom is made known in him and that he is the way that points to While laws often distinctive cultural values or customs, as wisdom of God, Jesus crosses cultural boundaries and breaks down cultural distinctions. As the wisdom of God, Jesus fulfils the expectations of any and all codes of law.

Both the law and the temple witness to the power of God in the lives of believers. However, both institutions pale in the light of Jesus who is identified as the power of God. This divine power is not revealed in lofty precepts or in magnificent stones, but rather in the broken and pierced body of Jesus Christ. How willing are we to accept him?

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
