Christ, King of the Universe 21 November 2021

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Yes, I am a king. I was born for this, I came into the world for this: to bear witness to the truth; and all who are on the side of truth listen to my voice. (John 18:37)

What's truth got to do with it?

We live in a world where the importance of truth has been hugely underrated for quite some time. First came individualism. The individual was said to be, allegedly, 'autonomous,' which meant that they were 'law unto themselves.' Every time there was a conflict between what the individual wanted and, for example, the commandments, it was claimed that the individual was always in the right. When put so bluntly it sounds rather absurd. And yet that is precisely how so many people have thought for so long especially in relation to certain hot button issues, the latest of which is euthanasia.

Then came collectivism. Once the importance of truth had been sufficiently undermined by individualism, there were groups or movements claiming that theirs was the right way. The collective were said to be, allegedly, on the right side of history if they were loud enough or powerful enough. Every time there was a conflict between what the collective wanted and individual conscience it was claimed that the collective were always in the right. Again, when put so bluntly it sounds rather absurd. And yet we have well and truly entered the age of such collectivism. For example, it seems that these days one cannot disagree with the dominant narrative without being demonised for it and dishonestly so!

Individualism and collectivism might have much more in common than what their names suggest. What is missing in both is reverence for truth. The subjective feelings and thoughts of a person (or a group), allegedly, always trump objective truth or objective morality, the existence of which is doubted by default. This means that there is no reliable point of reference by which we can be guided outside the domain of our own feelings and opinions which, by the way, can be as whimsical as the weather! In individualism it is the individual who acts like an "unaccountable brat." In collectivism it is the collective who do the same. Both are driven, not by truth, but by insatiable hunger for power - the power to do "my will" (or the will of the elite) over and against that of the Creator.

In the absence of the anchor of truth, power becomes a curse rather a blessing - a tool for self-destruction. What good is money to an alcoholic who will only spend it on one thing? Think of the Prodigal Son whose undeserved and premature share of the inheritance only accelerated his own demise. Power without humble and uncompromising dependence on truth will eventually devour all things which are precious in life. Only truth will set us free, by helping us remember from within the way we are supposed to be! And thanks be to Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, who died and rose from the dead to bear witness to the saving grace of truth! - *Fr Peter* -

Under the new rule of 2 square metre per person rule, the church of Regina Coeli can accommodate about 260 people at any given time. There is no need to make a booking for Mass because the numbers always seem to work out.

When Californian mother of four Stephanie Packer was admitted to an intensive care unit in June, and put on a ventilator, her children were told she wasn't going to come home again. In 2015, Packer's insurance company told her that chemotherapy drugs prescribed by her doctors were denied under her health cover. Yet a week after California enacted its End of Life Option Act her insurance company informed her that her physician-assisted suicide medication would be available, for only \$1.20.

"They don't see the purpose behind the suffering. There's so much honour and beauty behind being able to spend time with someone at the end of their life...Today and tomorrow could be the worst days of your life. And the next day could be the best day you could ever experience...They're consumed by fear...And they've got a lot of money behind them. So, no matter how loud our voice is, theirs ends up being louder. People aren't hearing the message and they're not being educated...If we lose this particular battle, you don't stop. You don't stop. We lose these battles because of a lack of education...I mean, we've lost here in California, but you haven't lost there yet. And just because the law passes doesn't mean there aren't lives to save."

Each one of the readings depicts the enthronement of Christ who is revealed as the messiah-king. Until his trial, Jesus himself refused to be identified as king. The royal messianic expectations that prevailed during his lifetime were predominantly political. lf he assumed them, his followers might have instigated a rebellion against the Roman occupiers. When finally he did acknowledge his royal identity, he insisted that his rule was not like that of other kings.

Enthroned in heaven, Christ is revealed as the faithful witness to all that God has done and will continue to do. As first-born from the dead, his resurrection is the promise of our own resurrection. The dominion that he received from God is universal and exclusive and it will last forever. When he comes again on the last day, he will be revealed in all his glory.

Christ's kingdom is a kingdom of truth and life, of holiness and grace, of justice and love and peace. We need not stand at a distance from him. afraid to approach because of our human vulnerability. He is the one who loved us so much that he handed himself over to suffering and death so that we might live. He has already brought us to birth in this kingdom through Baptism and he has taught us how to live in it. Today we look to that time when his glory will be revealed, when we will all be gathered into the embrace of God, there to sing praise to that glory forever.
