The Epiphany of the Lord 2 January 2022

Joy came under threat this Christmas, with confusion in the minds of many regarding in what spirit they ought to celebrate Christmas, if it was appropriate at all to *celebrate*. If the case numbers were an absolute measure of how well we were doing (which, I believe, they are not), then, we might never have been in greater trouble. Still fresh in our memory was the long lockdown which, at first, set out to achieve zero cases, before evolving into a conditional lockdown based on vaccination rates. With the rise of the double-vaxxed ("fully-vaxxed" in those days) the case numbers seemed to decline, although they were far from eliminated when the lockdown ended. It was ok then to talk about 'living with the virus.'

However, many still felt uncomfortable. After all, it wasn't all that long ago when the premiers used to say things like, 'Stay home unless it is absolutely necessary' or 'You only get one chance to go hard and go fast. If you wait, if you hesitate, if you doubt, then you will always be looking back wishing you had done more earlier.' So, many felt a sense of incongruity about being out of lockdown when the case numbers were higher than ever before. No doubt, all this caused anxiety, even fear, in their hearts, placing serious strain on the joy of Christmas. Consequently, for two years in a row, cancellation or minimisation became fashionable at Christmas, which inevitably felt somewhat subdued.

The 6PM Vigil Mass, which used to be "standing room only," did not fill up. Was this now the new "normal"? Nevertheless, a good number of children were involved in acting out the nativity story. As a matter of fact, there were new actors and enhanced confidence from those who were more experienced. The 8PM Vigil Mass was attended well enough for me to conclude that putting on this extra Mass had been definitely worth the effort. The midnight Mass was a little different this year, going even dimmer than in previous years, by minimising the use of electrical lights and relying mostly on candles. No one fell over.

First Reading Is 60:1-6

The glory of the Lord shines upon you.

Arise, shine out, Jerusalem, for your light has come.

the glory of the Lord is rising on you, though night still covers the earth and darkness the peoples.

Above you the Lord now rises and above you his glory appears. The nations come to your light and kings to your dawning brightness. Lift up your eyes and look round: all are assembling and coming towards you, your sons from far away and your daughters being tenderly carried.

At this sight you will grow radiant, your heart throbbing and full; since the riches of the sea will flow to you; the wealth of the nations come to you;

camels in throngs will cover you, and dromedaries of Midian and Ephah; everyone in Sheba will come, bringing gold and incense and singing the praise of the Lord.

Gospel Mt 2:1-12

After Jesus had been born at Bethlehem in Judaea during the reign of King Herod, some wise men came to Jerusalem from the east. 'Where is the infant king of the Jews?' they asked. 'We saw his star as it rose and have come to do him homage.' When King Herod heard this he was perturbed, and so was the whole of Jerusalem. He called together all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, and enquired of them where the Christ was to be born. 'At Bethlehem in Judaea,' they told him, 'for this is what the prophet wrote:

And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, you are by no means least among the leaders of Judah,

for out of you will come a leader who will shepherd my people Israel.'

Then Herod summoned the wise men to see him privately. He asked them the exact date on which the star had appeared, and sent them on to Bethlehem. 'Go and find out all about the child,' he said 'and when you have found him, let me know, so that I too may go and do him homage.' Having listened to what the king had to say, they set out. And there in front of them was the star they had seen rising; it went forward and halted over the place where the child was. The sight of the star filled them with delight, and going into the house they saw the child with his mother Mary, and falling to their knees they did him homage. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts of gold and frankincense and myrrh. But they were warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, and returned to their own country by a different way.

The Christmas season reaches an apex with the Epiphany. In some liturgical traditions, it is the central celebration of Christmas. commemorates not only the birth of Christ and the visit of the Magi, but also his baptism in the Jordan and the manifestation of his glory at the wedding feast of Cana. In the Roman Catholic tradition, the focus is on the visit of the Magi and the implications that visit for the glorious manifestation of God to all the peoples of the world.

There is a wonderful summons to alertness and presence of mind and heart, a call for all the nations to witness the marvellous works of God that shine as light in the midst of the surrounding darkness. The light of God is known in the ways in which the most vulnerable in the city are cared for and acknowledged. In just action and righteousness, the city becomes the beacon of God, and all the nations are attracted by this light. The quality of the light leads the way through the darkness and sustains the world in goodness and peace.

The manifestation of God among us changes the ways in which we perceive each other. Christ's birth provides us with the light by which we see a new criterion for relating. The Magi represent the multi-ethnic and cultural diversity in civic and parish situations, as well as the many religions of the world. All people, regardless of race or ethnic origin, can be co-heirs with Christ.
