'In honour of Australian-American friendship in war and peace'

It was the dream of Fr William Evans - the first Parish Priest of Regina Coelito build a church which was dedicated to Our Lady and served as a war memorial in honour of Australian-American friendship in war and peace. Perhaps it was not an accident that the name of our suburb changed from 'Dumbleton' to 'Beverly Hills' in 1940, as if to anticipate the connection between the two nations through the iconic church of Regina Coeli. The importance of Australian-American friendship was self-evident during times of war. But what about now - a time of relative peace (at least for AUS & US), although the notion of peace seems increasingly illusory and far from guaranteed? Some say that Australia is about 10 years behind the US, by which they mean that the sociopolitical trends which we see over there are likely to manifest themselves here as well, albeit 10 years later. This is a worrying prospect, especially given the fact that what we are currently witnessing over there isn't pretty!

Nevertheless, there is a silver-lining. For example, the myth of progress seems to be crumbling. Under the guise of "progress," a long series of radical ideas have been promoted and propagated, in contradiction to the Christian faith, with promises of a better future. But the ensuing chaos is becoming evermore difficult to ignore. The fabrics of society are disintegrating and those with common sense can see the causal link between rejection of traditional values and decline of society. Now, a promising sign from the US has to do with 'Roe versus Wade' - a 1973 decision by the US Supreme Court which ruled that, supposedly, there was a constitutional right to abortion. 'Roe v. Wade' had the effect of legalising abortion nationwide as a blanket rule and, since then, it is estimated that over 65 million abortions have been performed under the auspices of the US Constitution.

Finally, it looks as though 'Roe versus Wade' might be overturned, although not without ferocious resistance. The so-called "constitutional right to abortion" is a false concept invented for the purpose of excusing what human beings, in the darkest and lowest regions of nature, desire to do. What has been the ghastly impact of legalising and justifying millions of abortion on the soul of a nation? What horrible traumas and deadly blind-spots have been caused by the lies? How can Australia and America learn from the fatal mistakes of one another and embark on the path of renewal? The overturning of 'Roe versus Wade' will not mean a nationwide ban on abortion. But it does mean that each state will be able to decide for themselves through more democratic processes. It is hoped that debates surrounding the issue of abortion will become fairer and more transparent than they have been over the past 50 years and contribute positively to the moral and spiritual rebuilding of society.

St Augustine on the New Commandment

The Lord Jesus declares that he is giving his disciples a new commandment, that they should love one another: *I give you a new commandment: love one another*. But wasn't this commandment already part of the ancient law of God, where it is written *You shall love your neighbour as yourself?* Why, then, is it called a new one by the Lord, when it is really so old? Is it new because he has divested us of our old humanity and clothed us with the new? It is true that love renews those who listen to it (or rather, those who act in obedience to it) but it is that particular love which the Lord distinguished from all carnal affection by adding *love one another as I have loved you*.

This is the love that renews us, making us new men, heirs of the New Testament, singers of the new song...This is the love that is now renewing the nations, and from among the universal race of man, which overspreads the whole world, is making and gathering together a new people, the body of the newly-married spouse of the only-begotten Son of God...Because of this, the members of the people of God have a mutual interest in one another; and if one member suffers then all the members suffer with it; and if one member is honoured then all the members rejoice with it...They share with each other the love with which he leads them to the end that will bring them fulfilment and the true satisfaction of their real desires. For when God is all in all, there is no desire that is unfulfilled.

They assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them.

Paul and Barnabas went back through Lystra and Iconium to Antioch. They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith. 'We all have to experience many hardships' they said 'before we enter the kingdom of God.' In each of these churches they appointed elders, and with prayer and fasting they commended them to the Lord in whom they had come to believe.

They passed through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. Then after proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia and from there sailed for Antioch, where they had originally been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now completed.

On their arrival they assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith to the pagans.

Everything is new! There is a new law of love, a new heaven and earth that is established in the church, a new depth of communion there, and a new glory of God that shines forth from its members.

The new commandment that Jesus announces is more than tolerance or mutual respect. It requires self-sacrificing love. Perhaps the greatest obstacle to this love is the diversity discussed last Sunday. It is hard enough to love those who are like us; how can we possibly love those who are different? And how can we love those who do not love us? It is no wonder that the commandment is called new. It calls for something completely different.

The new commandment is the law of the new heaven and the new earth that are established in the new Jerusalem. Standards are entirely different there. The greater ones serve; the meek possess the earth; happy are the poor; woe to those who laugh. This is clearly a city that comes down from heaven, not one made by human hands. It is a city that embraces all who come to it. God dwells in the midst of this city, in the heart of this people. God dwells with them and they dwell with God.

Through this new love, this new heaven and new earth, this new depth of communion, the glory of God is manifested in a new way. The eschatological future is anticipated in the present. The age of fulfilment has dawned.
