## 11th Sunday in Ordinary Time 12 June 2022

One of the most marvellous sights to behold in parish life is an organic body of people who take responsibility and build up community. I wasn't sure how the Pentecost BBQ would go this year but judging by the faces of those who were present I think it more than fair to call it a good success! On Saturday (the day before Pentecost) I felt slightly disappointed by the clear blue sky. I thought to myself, 'No, not yet! Please, save the best for tomorrow!' Fortunately, however, the sun showed up again on Pentecost Sunday, enough to inspire lots of gratitude.

Some came on previous days to ensure that we were well stocked or to set up tables and chairs. Others turned up on the day with salads, desserts, etc., and/or with the readiness to help generously. One mother still came by herself, even though it turned out that her young family had another commitment, just so that she could help out as she said she would. The spirit of joyful service with which our volunteers were operating was so contagious that other spontaneous volunteers inevitably followed. By the end of the event, with everything packed and cleaned, the entire place looked better than before we started.

I kept hearing from those who were there comments to the effect of 'Father, you have a beautiful parish here; this is a lovely parish!' Of course, a large part of what inspired such comments was what the community consisted of, namely, the people. In particular, I think that those who made the event possible set the right tone for the whole day - one which spoke of care and respect. A group of elderly parishioners were touched by how well they felt looked after. I could sense that they were quietly proud of the "new guard" who were emerging.

I sensed that many of us were united in our conviction that the faith was to be treasured, especially for the sake of our children. Our young generations might stand little or no chance against the tsunami of chaos coming their way, that is, without the firm anchor of the Christian faith. Perhaps the best and most worthwhile project we could be working on right now might be that of forming our young people spiritually and intellectually, so as to help them grow into 'salt of the earth and light of the world.' (C.f. Matthew 5:13-14)

Whichever way one looks at it, Pentecost Sunday was a day of hope. Yes, we are faced with formidable challenges, the worst of which are probably still to come. But we can definitely be sustained by hope precisely because our hope is founded on what is transcendent. I imagine that what everyone was trying to tell me at the BBQ were slight variations of mostly the same thing: they were touched by joy and felt their hope renewed, for which they wanted to express their gratitude. In other words, the person they really wanted to thank was the Holy Spirit! The Pentecost celebration might have given us a glimpse of what becomes possible when we are united in faith, hope and love. Pope Francis once wrote, '...[we] are called to unite as a family that is stronger than the sum of small individual members. For the whole is greater than the part, but it is also greater than the sum of its parts.' (*Fratelli Tutti* 78)

On Friday, the celebration begins at parishes with the Feast of the Sacred Heart; followed by Saturday, where families join in a pilgrimage to sites and shrines throughout the Archdiocese; and culminating with celebrating the Eucharist with His Grace at St Marys Cathedral on Sunday with 10:30 am Mass, after which families participate in the 'Festival of Families' beside the cathedral with food, coffee, music, stalls and activities for children.

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## Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

Both the first reading and the psalm response celebrate the marvels of creation and the marvelous creator brought them into being. Proverbs states that God created all of these things through Wisdom. While later theology will identify Wisdom with both the Word of God, the second person of the Trinity, and the Holy Spirit, the third person, the reading itself does not suggest this.

Paul credits God with our justification through faith. Justification salvation is accomplished by God through our Lord Jesus Christ. The love of God is poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit. Paul does not clearly state that the love of God that we receive through the Holy Spirit sanctifies us, but one could certainly understand it in this way.

John's theology resembles verv closely that of Paul. In it, Jesus the intimate connection reveals between himself and the Father as well as himself and the Spirit. The Spirit continues the mission of Jesus, neither adding anything to his teaching nor omitting anything from it.

While this is a feast that glorifies the central mystery of our faith, a mystery that is based on the way the three divine persons relate to each other, the readings all address ways that God relates to us. If we concentrate, as the texts for today suggest that we do, on all of the ways that our Triune God has blessed us, we may be more inclined to cry out with the psalmist: 'O Lord, our God, how wonderful your name in all the earth!'
