The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ 19 June 2022

About four months ago the National Church Life Survey was held here at Regina Coeli. We did not choose the NCLS; it chose us. The Archdiocese nominated Regina Coeli to become one of 3000 sample churches in Australia which participated in the survey this year. Our parishioners were encouraged to take the forms home and then return them later. But alas, "many were called but few were chosen," by which I mean that, although hundreds of forms were taken, only some of them were returned. To be exact, 109 forms from Regina Coeli were received and recorded by NCLS Research (the organisation responsible for the survey).

The "first results" have been published by NCLS Research (more might follow later). Therefore I hope to share these with you over the coming weeks (Page 3). If I could design the survey myself for the purpose of discerning the hearts and minds of our parishioners I might have done it a little differently. But such is the nature of a multiple-choice national survey - there is no one-size-fits-all set of questions! I could certainly see the dilemma for parishioners in answering questions e.g. about 'a clear vision, goals or direction' because, as the parish priest, I am quite sure that I have not spoken of them, at least not explicitly in those terms!

During the week NCLS Research ran a webinar to discuss some of the general trends (based on another survey). Apparently, 55% of Australians believe in God; 49% say that Jesus was a real historical figure; 44% think that religion is good for society. Around 50% of Australians identify as Christians and just above 20% are regular church goers. The practising rate ('those who go to church at least month-ly') varies depending on the age group: 19% among 35-49 year olds; 11% among 50-64; 19% among 65+. In other words, 50-64 year olds tend to be the least practising. Quite surprisingly, according to the presenters, the practising rate was found to be around 32% among 18-34 years old!

The presenters pointed out that there are discrepancies between perception and reality. The "movers & shakers" of our society at the moment tend to be of the most irreligious generation (50-64) and so perhaps it is not an accident that public perception created by them regarding religion, in particular Christianity, is often negative. But in reality there is much to be hopeful about. The practising rate is bouncing up, even if slightly, especially among the younger generations. In spite of bad publicity, people's actual encounters with Christianity or Christians tend to be positive. Perhaps we ought to encourage with confidence once again our friends and neighbours to practice the faith!

On a different note, I will be on annual leave for the next three weekends. I am pleasantly surprised to announce that no Mass will be cancelled during my absence (not even on weekdays). Several priests will be taking turns in coming to celebrate Mass for the faith community of Regina Coeli. Please make them feel welcome! I thank in advance those whose steadfast care toward the parish allows me to take a break with some peace of mind. - *Fr Peter* -

As requested by Pope Francis, and with the encouragement of Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP, the World Meeting of Families will be held locally in the Archdiocese of Sydney to celebrate the sanctity, beauty and vitality of family life from Friday 24 to Sunday 26 June.

On Friday, the celebration begins at parishes with the Feast of the Sacred Heart; followed by Saturday, where families join in a pilgrimage to sites and shrines throughout the Archdiocese; and culminating with celebrating the Eucharist with His Grace at St Marys Cathedral on Sunday with 10:30 am Mass, after which families participate in the 'Festival of Families' beside the cathedral with food, coffee, music, stalls and activities for children.



The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, Year C

First Reading Gn 14:18-20

Melchizedek brought bread and wine.

Melchizedek king of Salem brought bread and wine; he was a priest of God Most High. He pronounced this blessing:

'Blessed be Abraham by God Most High, creator of heaven and earth, and blessed be God Most High for handing over your enemies to you.'

And Abraham gave him a tithe of everything.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 109:1-4. R. v.4

- R. You are a priest for ever, in the line of Melchizedek.
- The Lord's revelation to my Master: 'Sit on my right: I will put your foes beneath your feet.' (R).
- The Lord will send from Zion your sceptre of power: rule in the midst of all your foes. (R).
- A prince from the day of your birth on the holy mountains; from the womb before the daybreak I begot you. (*R*).
- 4. The Lord has sworn an oath he will not change.
 'You are a priest for ever, a priest like Melchizedek of old.' (R).

Second Reading 1 Cor 11:23-26

Every time you eat this bread and drink this cup, you are proclaiming the death of the Lord.

This is what I received from the Lord, and in turn passed on to you: that on the same night that he was betrayed, the Lord Jesus took some bread, and thanked God for it and broke it, and he said, 'This is my body, which is for you; do this as a memorial of me.' In the same way he took the cup after supper, and said, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Whenever you drink it, do this as a memorial of me.' Until the Lord comes, therefore, every time you eat this bread and drink this cup, you are proclaiming to his death.

Gospel Acclamation Jn 6:51-52

Alleluia, alleluia! I am the living bread from heaven, says the Lord; whoever eats this bread will live for ever. Alleluia!

Gospel Lk 9:11-17

They all ate and were filled.

Jesus made the crowds welcome and talked to them about the kingdom of God; and he cured those who were in need of healing.

It was late afternoon when the Twelve came to him and said, 'Send the people away, and they can go to the villages and farms round about to find lodging and food; for we are in a lonely place here.' He replied, 'Give them something to eat yourselves.' But they said, 'We have no more than five loaves and two fish, unless we are to go ourselves and buy food for all these people.' For there were about five thousand men. But he said to his disciples, 'Get them to sit down in parties of about fifty.' They did so and made them all sit down. Then he took the five loaves and the two fish, raised his eyes to heaven, and said the blessing over them; then he broke them and handed them to his disciples to distribute among the crowd. They all ate as much as they wanted, and when the scraps remaining were collected they filled twelve baskets.

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Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

This Feast combines the previous feasts of Corpus Christi and the Precious Blood of Christ. It reminds us that the body and blood of Christ were offered as a sacrifice for us, and every time we re-enact this sacrifice, we renew his sacrifice. The Body and Blood of Jesus is the interim meal for the Christian community. We are to feed on it until the Lord returns. We see again the already-but-not-yet character of Christian eschatology, for the Lord has already returned. That means that the Eucharist meal is a reenactment of Christ's death, an anticipatory celebration of his coming, and a thanksgiving banquet with him present.

The multiplication of the loaves and the fishes prefigures the eschatological banquet of fulfilment. Its miraculous bounty assures us of the abundance of that future banquet.

Its miracle of multiplication prefigures the miracle of Jesus as he changed the bread and wine into his own body and blood. Jesus handed himself over as food and drink on the very night that he was handed over by others. The banquet that he prepared was a celebration of the new covenant; it was an eschatological banquet of thanksgiving. This feast invites us to enter through either the past, the present or the future, for each one will lead us to the mystery that we celebrate: the mystery of the sacrifice of Christ; the mystery of the sacred bread and wine of the future; the mystery of the eschatological banquet of the present.
