Last weekend I had a retreat-like experience, over two days, at St Mary's Cathedral. At first there was an ordination to the priesthood for five young men. This happened on Saturday. A part of me hesitated to go because of the time-commitment such occasions tend to entail. Unsurprisingly, the ceremony itself went for three hours, not to mention another two hours for travel, etc. Nevertheless, I truly appreciated what felt like three hours of retreat. My eyes were often closed and my head occasionally nodding while my brain was attempting to recover from the poor sleep the night before. But whenever consciousness found me again I tried to surrender myself to the secret retreat. The very next day I was back at St Mary's Cathedral for the confirmations of around 40 children from Regina Coeli. Again, I sat through a long ceremony which evolved into an unexpected retreat of inexpressible value!

Patience is a necessary virtue when it comes to prayer. How could we discover the value of prayer unless we were patient enough to try, wait and see? Some say that it takes them at least one week just to fully unwind when on holiday. How long does it take, then, for the soul to relax its way into trust and to have intimate, even "raw," contact with the divine? Without patience we might be turning to "prayer" a thousand times, without true devotion, vaguely hoping that these acts would count for something but always rushing, glad to have them done and over with. A little bit of patience could go a long way in enabling us to enter a new depth of prayer which is waiting for us just around the corner. After all, the substance of prayer is meant to be, first and foremost, the work of God. The most important job in the project of prayer is done by the Holy Spirit and not by us. How tragic then to dismiss the importance of prayer due to being too impatient for the love of God (a.k.a. the Holy Spirit) who works from deep within - from underneath the surface of our consciousness!

Last week I wrote that the sacraments are concrete ways by which Christ reaches out to us and incorporates us into His Body the Church. There can be no doubt that contact is desired from above. But how can we respond to God's desire and optimise our contact with Him? If, after all my experiences with all things spiritual, I was to list top three priorities in spiritual life, then, I would name the following: silence, detachment and compassion. This is not to say that there aren't other things which are also worthy of mention. But, assuming that a Catholic is doing what a Catholic is basically supposed to do, I believe, that practising silence, detachment and compassion provides a booster to our spiritual life like nothing else! But none of this should come as a surprise because, after all, it was Jesus Himself who called us to pray, fast and give alms (c.f. Matthew 6:1-18). Silence, detachment and compassion are just anther names for describing the same spiritual exercises outlined by Jesus, and they all work! One of the reasons why they work is by creating room for God who wishes to accomplish so much in us and through us, far more than we could ever realise! - Fr Peter -

First Reading Jer 38:4-6, 8-10

You bore me to be a man of strife for the whole world.

The king's leading men spoke to the king. 'Let Jeremiah be put to death: he is unquestionably disheartening the remaining soldiers in the city, and all the people too, by talking like this. The fellow does not have the welfare of this people at heart so much as its ruin.' 'He is in your hands as you know,' King Zedekiah answered 'for the king is powerless against you.' So they took Jeremiah and threw him into the well of Prince Malchiah in the Court of the Guard, letting him down with ropes. There was no water in the well, only mud, and into the mud Jeremiah sank.

Ebed-melech came out from the palace and spoke to the king. 'My lord king,' he said, 'these men have done a wicked thing by treating the prophet Jeremiah like this: they have thrown him into the well where he will die.' At this the king gave Ebed-melech the Cushite the following order: 'Take three men with you from here and pull the prophet Jeremiah out of the well before he dies.'

With so many witnesses in a great cloud on every side of us, we too, then, should throw off everything that hinders us, especially the sin that clings so easily, and keep running steadily in the race we have started. Let us not lose sight of Jesus, who leads us in our faith and brings it to perfection: for the sake of the joy which was still in the future. he endured the cross, disregarding the shamefulness of it, and from now on has taken his place at the right of God's throne. Think of the way he stood such opposition from sinners and then you will not give up for want of courage. In the fight against sin, you have not yet had to keep fighting to the point of death.

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Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

As disciples we commit ourselves to values and principles that are not always cherished by others. We can be misunderstood for our beliefs, even ridiculed. Our lives may be a reproach to those who do not share our aspirations. There may be times when we must stand in opposition to others. All of this tends to alienate us. It could even place us at enmity with those whom we love. Yet, if we are genuinely committed, we realise that there is also a price to pay if we are not faithful. It is very difficult to live with ourselves when disregard our deepest convictions and ignore the promptings of God that we experience within ourselves. As difficult as a life of faith may be, we know that it is the only way to live in this world.

Faced with the cost of discipleship we are brought to the realisation that, by ourselves, we do not have the necessary resources. We need assistance. Like Jeremiah, we might find that this aid will come from places we may have never expected. The real support and assistance that we get is from Jesus who came to set the world and our hearts on fire. Paul assures us that there is a vast throng cheering us on as we run the race of discipleship. They are not merely spectators; they have already run or are still running their own race. We are not alone in our commitment, in our struggle. There are many witnesses, many examples for us to follow.
