There is a group at Regina Coeli who are currently undergoing a program known as *Alpha*. Please keep them in your prayers. One of the themes which have emerged thus far has to do with the *reasonableness* of believing in the Christian faith. Yes, Christianity begins with what can seem like the most unbelievable claim, namely, that God became human in Jesus, only then to suffer, die and rise from the dead. There are two questions we can ask here: *Could* God have done this? The answer is self-evidently yes. But, even more importantly, *why* might God have done it? The reasons are so breathtakingly profound and beautifully coherent that one cannot help but exclaim, 'Only God could have done this!'

Furthermore, there are other factors which support the central claim of Christianity. For a start, Jesus himself made the claim, the fact of which became the ultimate justification for his crucifixion. And the claim had not been pulled out of thin air, as evidenced by the fact that Jesus fulfilled Scripture, in particular via the hundreds of instances of direct fulfilment of the Old Testament. The Resurrection authoritatively confirmed that the claim had been true, hence the reason why even the most timid of the disciples, now irrevocably convinced of the Good News, had the courage to evangelise even at the cost of martyrdom. There can be no doubt that, on the basis of historical evidence, the first Christians truly believed the central claim of Christianity, as have countless others since then.

Therefore it is *more than reasonable* to believe in Jesus Christ as the Son of God. Nevertheless, it is easy for us to forget this and to dismiss the Christian faith without having given it the prayerful thought and study which it deserves. A great thinker by the name of G.K. Chesterton once explained that it is almost never the case that the Christian faith has been tried and found wanting; instead, it is almost always the case that it has been found difficult and left untried. Yes, the Christian faith, when tried or practised, has the power to inspire in us infinite love and wisdom; but if we leave it untried or unpractised, just because it seems "difficult," then, we might forget just how right and just it is to believe.

If the central claim of Christianity is true, then, it would not make sense for us to merely agree to it in some detached manner; instead, the only reasonable option would be for us to surrender to the reality of that claim, namely, the person of Jesus Christ! *Sunday worship is essential but mere Sunday worship is not enough.* The point here is to make the Christian faith not more burdensome but truly empowering - something which transforms our whole lives with the truth, beauty and mercy of Christ. After all, Jesus said, 'For to him who has will more be given, and he will have abundance; but from him who has not, even what he has will be taken away.' (Matthew 13:12) What have we left untried or unpractised, due to fear of difficulty or inconvenience, which, if embraced, could actually improve and sanctify our lives a hundredfold and more?

Gospel Lk 16:19-31

During your life good things came your way just as bad things came the way of Lazarus. Now he is being comforted while you are in agony.

Jesus said to the Pharisees: 'There was a rich man who used to dress in purple and fine linen and feast magnificently every day. And at his gate there lay a poor man called Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to fill himself with the scraps that fell from the rich man's table. Dogs even came and licked his sores. Now the poor man died and was carried away by angels to the bosom of Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried.

'In his torment in Hades he looked up and saw Abraham a long way off with Lazarus in his bosom. So he cried out, "Father Abraham, pity me and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am in agony in these flames." "My son," Abraham replied "remember that during your life good things come your way, just as bad things came the way of Lazarus. Now he is being comforted here while you are in agony. But that is not all: between us and you a great gulf has been fixed, to stop anyone, if he wanted to, crossing from our side to yours, and to stop any crossing from your side to ours."

'The rich man replied, "Father, I beg you then to send Lazarus to my father's house, since I have five brothers, to give them warning, so that they do not come to this place of torment too." "They have Moses and the prophets," said Abraham "let them listen to them." "Ah no, father Abraham," said the rich man "but if someone comes to them from the dead, they will repent." Then Abraham said to him, "If they will not listen either to Moses or to the prophets, they will not be convinced even if someone should rise from the dead."

Both the reading from the prophet Amos and the gospel narrative pointedly condemn the lifestyles of the rich. It is not wealth itself, but the complacency and the disregard for others that it too frequently generates, that is denounced. Biblical covenant is a communal concept. It emerges from a society that insists on mutual responsibility. Today's readings invite us to consider the covenant bond we have with others. How do we measure up?

The fundamental image of God reveals mercy and compassion. However, we cannot disregard the fact of judgment. Amos pronounces a woe against his own people; Abraham declares that there is an unbridgeable chasm between the saved and the condemned. Paul speaks here of the appearance of the Lord Jesus Christ who will bring judgment when he comes. Judgment will be determined not primarily in terms of our obedience to law, but in view of our fidelity to covenant commitment.

Righteousness is a covenant term. It is a quality of God that is shared with us by means of our covenant bond. Paul admonishes Timothy, and us, to pursue this righteousness, along with devotion, faith, love, patience and gentleness. Some of these virtues focus on our relationship with God, but most of them are directed toward our relationship with others. Those who are less fortunate are our sisters and brothers. If we take lightly our covenant obligations and allow them to languish at our gates, we will have only ourselves to blame when we find ourselves facing the harsh judgment of God.
