The following is our annual financial report. I thank all our givers, as well as members of our finance committee - Daniel Portelli (author of the report) and Margaret Mitchell - who help me ensure responsible financial stewardship at RC. - *Fr Peter* -

Dear Parishioners, the Financial Year (July 2021 to June 2022) has ended, and I wish to share an update on the Parish financial affairs. I have summarised the Financial Results for This Year and Last Year for those that wish to see the detail.

It was another unusual Financial Year, but we are pleased to report that the Parish finished the year in surplus of 83,053. This is despite the Parish having been in various stages of Lockdown restrictions throughout the year ended 30 June 2022, which again affecting regular sources of revenue. Firstly, I would like to thank all Parishioners that have continued to support our Parish and have made the generous contributions of both time and money during these difficult times.

The Parish income from recurring sources for the recently ended Financial Year (2021/22) was \$45,152 lower than the previous year. Parish revenue would have been even lower without the assistance of the Government Subsidy, JobKeeper, which ceased for the Parish in December 2021. Without this Government support, total Parish income would have been \$30,885 lower than the previous year especially with a decline in the Parish's other sources of income of Donations, Hall Hire and Interest Income. As the Church was forced to either close or have limited attendance for significant parts of the year, the total collections and donations were \$37,589 lower than the prior year.

Fortunately, Parish Expenses were \$19,562 lower than the previous year. As the Parish was restricted from operating to its normal capacity, several ongoing Parish operating expenses reduced during the lockdown period since they were not required, including salary and wages. Additionally, there were several savings measures that were enacted before COVID19 that the Parish continues to benefit from, while some significant repairs and maintenance to the Church and other buildings were avoided during this Financial Year.

Consequently, the Parish was still able to generate a surplus of \$83,053 during this Financial Year largely due to Government Subsidies and the temporary reduction of several ongoing expenses that will increase as we continue to return to normal. This surplus will be used to support the Parish as external challenges persist, while Weekly Cash Donations remain lower than before COVID-19 started. While the Parish has been fortunate to avoid a deficit during this challenging year by showing restraint, I would like to encourage all Parishioners to please continue to support the Parish through continued Donations.

Please remember, if you prefer to contribute to the church electronically instead of using cash, The Parish now has an EFT machine at the middle of the Church, next to the Donation box, that can accept any amount you wish to donate using your preferred card. 


Conscientious Objection in Abortion and Euthanasia for Healthcare Students and Workers.

First Reading Ex 17:8-13

As long as Moses kept his arms raised, Israel had the advantage.

The Amalekites came and attacked Israel at Rephidim. Moses said to Joshua, 'Pick out men for yourself, and tomorrow morning march out to engage Amalek. I, meanwhile, will stand on the hilltop, the staff of God in my hand.' Joshua did as Moses told him and marched out to engage Amalek, while Moses and Aaron and Hur went up to the top of the hill. As long as Moses kept his arms raised. Israel had the advantage: when he let his arms fall, the advantage went to Amalek. But Moses arms grew heavy, so they took a stone and put it under him and on this he sat, Aaron and Hur supporting his arms, one on one side, one on the other; and his arms remained firm till sunset. With the edge of the sword Joshua cut down Amalek and his people.

Second Reading 2 Tm 3:14-4:2

This is how the people of God become equipped and ready for every good work.

You must keep to what you have been taught and know to be true; remember who your teachers were, and how, ever since you were a child, you have known the holy scriptures – from these you can learn the wisdom that leads to salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by

God and can profitably be used for teaching, for refuting error, for guiding people's lives and teaching them to be holy. This is how the man who is dedicated to God becomes fully equipped and ready for any good work.

Before God and before Christ Jesus who is to be judge of the living and the dead, I put this duty to you, in the name of his Appearing and of his kingdom: proclaim the message and, welcome or unwelcome, insist on it. Refute falsehood, correct error, call to obedience – but do all with patience and with the intention of teaching.

Gospel Acclamation Heb 4:12

Alleluia, alleluia! The word of God is living and active; it probes the thoughts and motives of our heart. Alleluia!

Gospel Lk 18:1-8

God will see those who cry to him vindicated.

Jesus told his disciples a parable about the need to pray continually and never lose heart. 'There was a judge in a certain town' he said 'who had neither fear of God nor respect for man. In the same town there was a widow who kept on coming to him and saying, "I want justice from you against my enemy!" For a long time he refused, but at last he said to himself, "Maybe I have neither fear of God nor respect for man, but since she keeps pestering me I must give this widow her just rights, or she will persist in coming and worry me to death."'

And the Lord said, 'You notice what the unjust judge has to say? Now will not God see justice done to his chosen who cry to him day and night even when he delays to help them? I promise you, he will see justice done to them, and done speedily. But when the Son of Man comes, will he find any faith on earth?'

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Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

The readings today offer various aspects of prayer for our consideration. There is the spiritual discipline of prayer itself, which is essential to the life of the disciple: there is the communal dimension of prayer; and there is the ministerial commitment that is born of praver. personal prayer must be Our persistent. Like Moses and the woman in the gospel reading, we must be ceaseless in our prayer, not discouraged by difficulties that we might have to face. Regardless of how strange the first reading may appear to be, it very strongly emphasises the communal dimension of prayer.

As minister of the word, Timothy is admonished to keep preaching the gospel, to keep spreading the good news, to allow the scriptures to continue to be a source of wisdom for himself and, through him, for all of the people who hear him. To have this kind of facility with Scripture requires that one enter into the deep meaning of the Scriptures and make them the basis of one's prayer. One must engage in what the monks call lectio divina, prayerful reflective reading of scriptures. This practice, or the spiritual discipline, gives us access to God and it also gives God access to us. It gives us the courage and the gentleness to teach, to refute, to correct. When our ministerial activity flows from prayer, it also flows from and strengthens right relationships with God and with the community. When this becomes a reality, the Son of Man will indeed find faith on earth.
