# 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time 2 October 2022

Last Thursday was the feast of Sts Michael, Gabriel and Rafael (the Archangels). The Christian view of creation is informed by the idea of *ex nihilo* by which is meant that God has created everything *out of nothing*. Can we imagine nothingness? The best we can conjure up is probably a vacuum - an empty space - which would not have existed prior to creation. Therefore to imagine nothingness is to recall the state of affairs when neither time nor space existed - something which might be impossible for us to do! When God created everything *ex nihilo*, some things were made to be visible and others invisible - some things to have physical dimensions and others to be purely spiritual. Angels are part of the invisible (or purely spiritual) realities created by God.

For example, God is invisible. What are we doing when we are praying? One way of describing prayer is that it is *coming into contact with the invisible presence of God.* Needless to say, such contact is absolutely important. The simple fact is that we are lost, troubled and hopelessly incomplete; we are a mere shadow of what we could be, etc., when we lack meaningful contact with the invisible presence of God. And yet it is so easy for us to forget this simple fact, partially due to the invisibility of God's presence, hence the reason why we tend to become complacent, especially when times are "good," acting as though neglect of prayer has no detrimental consequences for our truest wellbeing. Therefore the key to an effective prayer life is to treasure the invisible. And angels are a great reminder to us of the importance of the invisible.

Another example has to do with *enlightenment*, without which we cannot see aright. Sometimes what is good can seem undesirable while what is bad can seem compelling; what is wise can seem contemptible while what is foolish can seem like glamorous. Therefore, without the benefit of enlightenment, we are bound to make poor choices which will cause unnecessary pain, sorrow and regret in our lives. Of course, what enlightens us is not the visible light but the invisible light of God's grace, which illuminates us from within. When we are enlightened we see the whole world anew; we see things as they really are, more like how God sees them. Therefore the key to navigating our way wisely through the visible world is to treasure the invisible. And angels are a great reminder to us of the importance of the invisible.

Yes, the concept of angels might seem rather far-fetched at first, kind of like the central claim of Christianity, namely, the fact that God became human, only then to suffer, die and rise from the dead. But engaging in prayerful thought processes or reverently following the logic of what God has done makes a world of difference to whether or not we come to recognise the beautiful truth of the Christian faith. Nevertheless, the issue at hand is not purely intellectual in nature; it is also a spiritual issue, perhaps even more so. The more we grow in our heartfelt appreciation of the power of God's invisible grace the more it seems right and just to give intellectual assent to Christian beliefs, including about angels. After all, the workings of God's grace can feel like...being touched by an angel! - Fr Peter -

# **ROSARY OPPORTUNITIES**


#### MONTHLY ROSARY

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## Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

In our struggles to be faithful disciples, we frequently must endure periods when we feel abandoned by God. When we have been intent on serving God with genuine devotion, such times are particularly trying, for one would expect that God would not withdraw consolations. When this happens, the broken heart and the strained spirit cry out to God in complaint: How long? Why? We have all been worn down by life, tempted to give up, too weary to go on.

Faith in God is a gift for which we pray. It enables us to accomplish marvellous feats; with it we can move mountains. As unprofitable servants, we do not earn it; we have no right to claim it as our own. We are the ones from whom faithful service will be expected. We will be sent to plough the fields and tend the sheep. We will be called to serve at table.

The faith that is ours has been mediated to us through community. We have heard about God and about Jesus from others, from our parents and families, from our teachers and those who preach, from those with whom we work and play. Faith comes from God, but through the mediation community. Timothy received faith from his mother and grandmother. It was strengthened in him through the imposition of Paul's hands and through his preaching of the word of God. Furthermore, what Paul taught had first been handed down to him from those who preceded him.
