Every year around this time our scripture readings at Mass tend to take on a tone which might be best described as being 'apocalyptic.' For the past few years at least, I have been commenting on the apocalyptic genre and its application to our lives at present. 2020 was a "game-changer" for all things apocalyptic - we were given a real taste of apocalyptic sentiments as life took the most unusual of turns.

Yet another Batman movie came out earlier in the year, which I am not proud of having watched, but there was one aspect which I thought excellent and timely, namely, the apocalyptic milieu and tone in which the story was set and told: a strong sense that the Gotham-society was crumbling due to profound corruption, the root cause of which was revealed to be...the problem of lying!

There is no shortage of *strangeness* when it comes to the signs of our times. But it seems to me that nothing is stranger—nothing more disturbing—than the fact that there is incredible prevalence of lying in our society and quite publicly so. Here is a glimpse into the height of lying to which our society has reached:

A few months ago a Pfizer executive was asked by a member of the European Parliament: 'Was the Pfizer COVID vaccine tested on *stopping the transmission of the virus* before it entered the market?' The answer was: 'No...You know, we had to... really move at the speed of science (?) to know what is taking place in the market.' But weren't we told practically by all authorities that *my vaccination* stops transmission and therefore *protects others*? Wasn't this how the vaccines were so often coerced and the unvaccinated deemed dangerous?

But our own ABC News then published an article in defense of Pfizer (and the ruling class who pushed universal vaccination), purporting to "fact-check":

Julie Leask, a social scientist specialising in immunisation, told CheckMate the claim made by [the aforementioned member of the European Parliament] "heavily distorts the facts"...the before-market trials of COVID-19 vaccines had a "primary outcome of reducing risk of any disease and severe disease, but not transmission".


You be the judge: Who's really distorting the facts or obfuscating? Only, be careful what you *recall* because, allegedly, it didn't happen!

Ours is an apocalyptic era. And no, the word 'apocalyptic' does not mean 'end of the world'; rather, it means 'to reveal.' The strangeness of an apocalyptic era reveals to us the fact that certain deep-seated problems have reached a level which cannot be sustained much longer. The greatest threat to our way of life - a way of life founded upon Christian values - comes from within before it comes from without. It turns out that the signs were there even before the notorious year of 2020. For example, on 1 December 2019 I wrote the following, incidentally, on the occasion of my installation as parish priest:

Purchases can be made by visiting the Piety Stall, with money raised used to assist the needy in our Parish area.


Christmas Cards of high quality will be selling for \$5.00 for a pack of 10 cards.

Second Reading 2 Thes 3:7-12

Do not give anyone food who refuses to work.

You know how you are supposed to imitate us: now we were not idle when we were with you, nor did we ever have our meals at anyone's table without paying for them; no, we worked night and day, slaving and straining, so as not to be a burden on any of you. This was not because we had no right to be, but in order to make ourselves an example for you to follow.

We gave you a rule when we were with you: not to let anyone have any food if he refused to do any work. Now we hear that there are some of you who are living in idleness, doing no work themselves but interfering with everyone else's. In the Lord Jesus Christ, we order and call on people of this kind to go on quietly working and earning the food that they eat.

Gospel Acclamation Lk 21:38

Alleluia, alleluia! Lift up your heads and see; your redemption is near at hand. Alleluia!

Gospel Lk 21:5-19

Your endurance will win you your life.

When some were talking about the Temple, remarking how it was adorned with fine stonework and votive offerings, Jesus said, 'All these things you are staring at now – the time will come when not a single stone will be left on another: everything will be destroyed.' And they put to him this question: 'Master,' they said, 'when will this happen, then, and what sign will there be that this is about to take place?'

'Take care not to be deceived,' he said, 'because many will come using my name and saying, "I am he" and, "The time is near at hand." Refuse to join them. And when you hear of wars and revolutions, do not be frightened, for this is something that must happen but the end is not soon.' Then he said to them, 'Nation will fight against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be great earthquakes and plagues and famines here and there; there will be fearful sights and great signs from heaven.

'But before all this happens, men will seize you and persecute you; they will hand you over to the synagogues and to imprisonment, and bring you before kings and governors because of my name and that will be your opportunity to bear witness. Keep this carefully in mind: you are not to prepare your defence, because I myself shall give you an eloquence and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to resist or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, relations and friends; and some of you will be put to death. You will be hated by all men on account of my name, but not a hair of your head will be lost. Your endurance will win you your lives.'

The Day of the Lord was believed to be the time when God would come in majesty and power to set all things right. We must remember that descriptions in today's readings metaphoric or symbolic in nature. As with all metaphors or symbols, we miss something of their profound meaning if we merely understand them literally. It is not helpful to relate elements of the description with particular aspects of the contemporary world. Belief in the Day of the Lord is a way of testifying to our faith in the righteousness of God.

Although the narrative readings for today concentrate on the disruptions that will accompany the coming of God, they also contain hints of the salvation that will finally arrive. Malachi speaks of the sun of justice that comes with healing rays; Luke promises that the faithful disciples will escape without a hair of their heads being destroyed. Just as the descriptions of the upheavals should not be understood literally, neither should these descriptions. It may be that the faithful followers of Jesus will suffer terrible agonies. The point here is that even in the midst of their pain, they will be protected. The healing rays of justice and the rescue of the lives of the upright are references to salvation. God does not come at the end to condemn, but to save. Furthermore, the suffering that precedes the end is intended for purification refinement, not punishment. Christians are exhorted to live in this endtime with patient endurance of difficulties.

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
