1st Sunday of Advent 27 November 2022

It seems like only yesterday that November started with a bang (All Saints and All Souls). But the month of holy souls is all but ended, as a new liturgical year begins with Advent this weekend. 'Stay awake,' said Jesus in the Sunday Gospel reading because, if we don't, then, the very essence of life might pass us by! Speaking of "staying awake," please remember to RSVP if possible, for catering purposes, regarding the Parish Christmas Carols & Party via the signup sheet at every door. Volunteers are needed! The signup sheet for volunteers will only be at the back of the church. Please remember also that the ladies of St Vincent de Paul Society will be collecting donations over three weekends for the purpose of reaching out to the needy in our own area for this year's Christmas.

The first ever group at Regina Coeli to undertake *Alpha* has now completed the program. What is *Alpha*? It is a (roughly) ten week program. Each week consists of spending the first hour on sharing a meal, which is then followed by the second hour whereby a (roughly) 20 minute video is watched and discussed by the participants. The beauty of Alpha, as far as I can see, lies in its structure: a real sense of communion forms when a meal and intimate thoughts are shared, and then the ritual is repeated 10 times! Some of the participants initially felt daunted by the prospect of a 10-week-long commitment. In the end, however, they all seemed to want more!

A little bit of commitment can go a long way in making a remarkable difference. Last weekend I said something at the end of Mass which might be worth reiterating: We *could* merely turn up to Mass. Or we could turn up to Mass *after* having spent time in quiet prayer regularly during the week *and* having listened to the Word of God, especially by reference to the scripture readings for the upcoming Mass. The difference might be greater than we think, even exponentially so! After all, Jesus said, 'For to him who has will more be given, and he will have abundance; but from him who has not, even what he has will be taken away.' (Matthew 13:12)

Last week 100 free copies of 'Stay Awake' - a booklet produced by the Archdiocese of Sydney containing the Sunday Gospel readings/reflections for Advent and Christmas, were all taken. Electronic copies of the booklet can also be downloaded for free (more information Page 3). There are many other means by which we can reflect on the Word of God, so as to be formed by Wisdom itself, not least in preparation for receiving the Wordmade-flesh in the Eucharist. A little bit of commitment can go a long way in giving us a taste of the transformative power of God's grace, thereby revealing the fact that, no matter what, the best is yet to come! - Fr Peter -

Columban Art Calendars, highlighting Solemnities, Feasts & Memorials, are selling at the bargain price of \$7.00 per calendar.





First Reading Is 2:1-5

The Lord will gather all nations in eternal peace in the kingdom of God.

The vision of Isaiah son of Amoz, concerning Judah and Jerusalem.

In the days to come
the mountain of the Temple of the Lord
shall tower above the mountains
and be lifted higher than the hills.
All the nations will stream to it,
peoples without number will come to it;
and they will say:

'Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord,

to the Temple of the God of Jacob that he may teach us his ways so that we may walk in his paths; since the Law will go out from Zion, and the oracle of the Lord from Jerusalem.'

He will wield authority over the nations and adjudicate between many peoples; these will hammer their swords into ploughshares,

their spears into sickles.

Nation will not lift sword against nation, there will be no more training for war.

O House of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the Lord.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 121:1-2. 4-5. 6-9. R. see v.1.

(R.) Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord.

- I rejoiced when I heard them say: 'Let us go to God's house.' And now our feet are standing within your gates, O Jerusalem. (R.)
- It is there that the tribes go up, the tribes of the Lord.
 For Israel's law it is, there to praise the Lord's name.
 There were set the thrones of judgement of the house of David. (R.)
- For the peace of Jerusalem pray: 'Peace be to your homes! May peace reign in your walls, in your palaces, peace!' (R.)

Second Reading Rom 13:11-14

The time has come, our salvation is near.

You know 'the time' has come: you must wake up now: our salvation is even nearer than it was when we were converted. The night is almost over, it will be daylight soon – let us give up all the things we prefer to do under the cover of the dark; let us arm ourselves and appear in the light. Let us live decently as people do in the daytime: no drunken orgies, no promiscuity or licentiousness, and no wrangling or jealousy. Let your armour be the Lord Jesus Christ.

Gospel Acclamation Ps 84:8

Alleluia, alleluia! Lord, show us your mercy and love, and grant us your salvation. Alleluia!

Gospel Mt 24:37-44

Stay awake, you must be ready.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'As it was in Noah's day, so will it be when the Son of Man comes. For in those days before the Flood people were eating, drinking, taking wives, taking husbands, right up to the day Noah went into the ark, and they suspected nothing till the Flood came and swept all away. It will be like this when the Son of Man comes. Then of two men in the fields one is taken, one left; of two women at the millstone grinding, one is taken, one left.

'So stay awake, because you do not know the day when your master is coming. You may be quite sure of this that if the householder had known at what time of the night the burglar would come, he would have stayed awake and would not have allowed anyone to break through the wall of his house. Therefore, you too must stand ready because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.'

We may be accustomed to think of Advent as the time when we prepare for the coming of God, but the readings also train our attention on our own journey to God. We see this most clearly in this first Sunday with readings that tell us the identity of the pilgrims, the destination toward which they travel, and the way of life that is required of them on their journey. As the Vatican Council has proclaimed: We are a pilgrim people.

Both the reading from Isaiah and the psalm response speak of the pilgrimage to the mountain of the Lord, the place where God can be found. Although the psalm speaks about Jerusalem and refers to the temple there, the broader theological significance of the mountain, the city and the temple is one and the same. They represent the presence of God in our midst, and this presence is the goal of our striving. There are clear directions about how we are to live while we are on this pilgrimage to God. In Isaiah we learn that we must put away our instruments of violence and hatred, our swords and our spears. Lest we pick them up again, we are told to convert them into lifeproducing implements, into ploughs and pruning hooks. Paul exhorts us to put away our deeds of darkness and self-indulgence and to clothe ourselves instead in the deeds of Jesus Christ, Matthew points out the need for alertness, attentiveness, a disposition that is open to a change of heart.
