Mary, the Holy Mother of God 1 January 2023



2020 was welcomed with apprehension a few years ago because it had sounded at the time like a *distant* future which was not meant to come around so soon. Little did we know what a *dystopian* future it was going to feel like! 2021 turned out to be more or less a continuation, even a consolidation, of the trauma of 2020 and, some would argue, unnecessarily so. 2022 has been by far the best year in over three years, at least for me personally. My personal reasons aside, here are some of the highlights of 2022 at the parish level (listed in an alphabetical order):

Alpha. The first ever Alpha group at Regina Coeli went fantastically! My hope is that there will usually be at least one Alpha group (or an Alpha-like group) running at Regina Coeli at any given time. This is so that the faith of parishioners, both new and old, can undergo affirmation and renewal in a highly fraternal environment. Let's also be on the lookout for other faith-formation opportunities.

BBQ. I am fairly certain that the record has been broken in 2022 for the most number of BBQs held in one year at Regina Coeli. This would have happened in 2020 if not for, you know, the pandemic. Granted, all of the BBQs happened only after the 10am Mass but at least that is a start. With enough interest (and support of volunteers) even the monthly morning tea after mass, or something equivalent, could be reintroduced but I need a sign!

Christmas Party in 2022 was one for the history books. But it is also worth noting that, unlike in the past, there are now two major parties each year - one at Christmas and another at Pentecost. Just to give everyone a heads-up, the midyear party in 2023 is to be held around the Coral Sea Sunday (instead of Pentecost), to commemorate 60 years since the opening of the beautiful church of Regina Coeli! I am also looking for helpers to organise another parish dinner, like the one in 2019, around the feast of Regina Coeli (22 August).

Garden at the parish centre has undergone a remarkable transformation over the past 12 months. A saintly man by the name of George Cooley had given us a beautiful garden of noble simplicity. After he passed away the garden quietly fell into disarray with ever increasing menace. Then the story of three peters emerged: Kay Peters and Peter Johnson were heroic in rescuing what seemed almost irredeemable! The third Peter now mows the lawn. Hopefully the transformation of the garden is a sign of other transformations in parish life still to come!

Words of Remembrance for June Coyle 30th March 1931 - 11th December 2022

From Stephen (son)

She was born June Margaret Miller on the 30th March 1931 at a small private hospital in Bellevue Hill to Francis and Doris Miller...When she was 17 her father was taken to hospital suffering from Tuberculosis and was away from the family for a long time, so she was responsible for helping her mother look after the house and her brothers and sister during this time...it was through the dances at the CYO that she would meet our father, Keith Reginald Coyle...After a few years living in the Eastern Suburbs they had saved enough money for a deposit on a house in Beverly Hills, which they moved into in 1954.



In the coming years they produced four children – myself (Stephen) and my three beautiful sisters, Jane, Linda and Susan. As we all grew up Mum was always there with a kind and calming voice and we knew we could always depend on her. She was a very talented lady, she was good at sewing, knitting, porcelain painting and especially her cooking. I will always remember some of our parties and our Christmas dinners and wondered how she fed so many people in such a small kitchen – it reminded me of the loaves and fishes story!!

We are glad that we could have the funeral here at Regina Coeli because this was her Parish that she loved very much and its also the school that my sisters and I started our school life at! Many happy times!

Mum led a life of generosity. A kind and most giving lady who reached out to all who knew her. Whether it was the members of the Church, St Vincent De Paul, her neighbours, her family, her brothers, sisters and their families, mum gave so generously of her time and always with the purest of heart...Mum gave us all advice, helped us all through our difficult and uncertain times. Liturgically, the Octave of Christmas commemorates: the Solemnity of the Mother of God; the day designated for prayers for global peace; and the beginning of the New Year. Though the shepherds gain insight into the presence of God by seeing this holy family, it is Mary who holds all these things in her heart. She is the one who ponders the significance of these mysterious events. becomes for Christians an inspiration of contemplation and reflection. She inspires us to consider deeply the significance of events, lest we go blandly through life without meaning or direction. She inspires us to fidelity to the practices of our faith, practices which are the disciplines of soul that lead the community to a clearer focus on God's presence in human affairs.

The theme of peace appears today on many levels. Its meaning, 'fullness of life', bursts forth in every one of the readings. The ancient prayer or blessing of peace is an appropriate start for the New Year. It resonates well with the angels' wish for people of good will. Peace is also our inheritance in Christ. As adopted children of God, we have been given the freedom to live in a godly manner, calling God our Abba. Right relationships in the covenant activity of God are the pathways of peace. The beginning of a New Year is a good time to reach out to others and to pray for God's blessing of peace for each dimension of human encounter.
