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3rd Sunday of Advent 11 December 2022

If the RSVPs are correct and everyone turns up as they said they would, then, we could have over 300 people at the Christmas Party, which starts with carols in the church at 4:30pm this Sunday! I wish to thank in advance all who are participating, in particular those who are contributing to all necessary works behind the scenes. Let's all pray now for good weather!

I tried to go quietly, hoping no one would notice. But for those who have please allow me to explain that I was away over the last weekend and some weekdays before and after. Unusual timing, I know, being so close to Christmas. Unfortunately all the arrangement had been made more than a year ago - so long ago that even I have questions for my past self who did it! Be that as it may, it is good to be back and to be looking forward the upcoming celebrations which are many. I sincerely thank all those who helped to hold the fort over the past week or so.

One lovely afternoon I found myself walking through a certain city. The cool breeze was perfectly balanced by the clear blue sky from which shone unimpeded sunlight. But the first sign of potential unpleasantness came from an amplified voice which echoed from a block or two away. My immediate thought was: 'There must be a protest. I had better stay away!' But what drew me toward the political gathering in the end was the music which sounded inexplicably comforting and inviting. I soon realised why: they were singing Christian praise & worship songs from a courtyard which was filled with balloons, banners, signs, stalls and, of course, people of all ages and ethnic backgrounds!

The event turned out to be their annual 'March for Life.' A woman who had been part of the praise and worship team surprised the audience by also giving a testimony. She was only 16 when she became pregnant. As the daughter of a Christian pastor she had felt immense pressure to have an abortion, among other reasons, in order to avoid public scandal. A cousin helped her leave the country so as to make possible a more discreet childbirth. She named the child 'Ezekiel' who, 16 years later, was now the main vocal for the praise and worship team. Needless to say, the sight of the mother-and-son-duo singing faith-filled songs of praise inspired in me (and, presumably, in many others) immense joy and gratitude!

I found myself to be so mesmerised by the unexpected encounter that I could not leave. As the song goes, it seemed like love really was in the air! So when the march started a short time later I became an "accidental marcher for life." But the march was met by a much smaller crowd of counter-protestors who seemed determined to mar the event with animosity and commotion. I felt I knew the "type" angry, provocative and calling out names like 'fascists, racists, Nazis, etc.' toward the pro-lifers who were, ironically, the most ethnically and socio-economically diverse group of people. In other words, their words were mere tools for demonising their opponents and not at all for engaging them in a dialogue, but are we not in serious trouble when our words no longer have truth-value? - Fr Peter -

First Reading Is 35:1-6, 10

God himself will come and save us.

Let the wilderness and the dry-lands exult, let the wasteland rejoice and bloom, let it bring forth flowers like the jonquil, let it rejoice and sing for joy. The glory of Lebanon is bestowed on it, the splendour of Carmel and Sharon; they shall see the glory of the Lord, the splendour of our God. Strengthen all weary hands, steady all trembling knees and say to all faint hearts, 'Courage! Do not be afraid. 'Look, your God is coming, vengeance is coming. the retribution of God: he is coming to save you.' Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, the ears of the deaf unsealed, then the lame shall leap like a deer and the tongues of the dumb sing for joy, for those the Lord has ransomed shall return. They will come to Zion shouting for joy, everlasting joy on their faces; joy and gladness will go with them and sorrow and lament be ended.

You also must be patient; do not lose heart, the Lord's coming will be soon.

Be patient, brothers, until the Lord's coming. Think of a farmer: how patiently he waits for the precious fruit of the ground until it has had the autumn rains and the

spring rains! You too have to be patient; do not lose heart, because the Lord's coming will be soon. Do not make complaints against one another, brothers, so as not to be brought to judgement yourselves; the Judge is already to be seen waiting at the gates. For your example, brothers, in submitting with patience, take the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord.

Gospel Acclamation Is 61:1 (Lk 4:18)

Alleluia, alleluia!

The Spirit of the Lord is upon me; he sent me to bring Good News to the poor. Alleluia!

Gospel Mt 11:2-11

Are you the one who is to come, or must we wait for someone else?

John in his prison had heard what Christ was doing and he sent his disciples to ask him, 'Are you the one who is to come, or have we got to wait for someone else?' Jesus answered, 'Go back and tell John what you hear and see; the blind see again, and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised to life and the Good News is proclaimed to the poor; and happy is the man who does not lose faith in me.'

As the messengers were leaving, Jesus began to talk to the people about John: 'What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed swaying in the breeze? No? Then what did you go out to see? A man wearing fine clothes? Oh no, those who wear fine clothes are to be found in palaces. Then what did you go out for? To see a prophet? Yes, I tell you, and much more than a prophet: he is the one of whom scripture says: Look, I am going to send my messenger before you; he will prepare your way before you. I tell you solemnly, of all the children born of women. a greater than John the Baptist has never been seen; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he is.'

Half way through Advent we pause for a moment to celebrate Gaudete Sunday, a Sunday for rejoicing. Isaiah paints a picture of regeneration. The desert that once seemed to be dead is now bursting with life; eyes that lacked sight, ears incapable of capturing and holding sound, limbs without strength, and tongues devoid of speech are all given new life. There will be no death in that age of fulfilment. no limitations, mourning. As we move deeper and deeper into the reality of God's presence in our midst, we will discover the meaning of true fulfilment.

John the Baptist is a standard for judging the privilege of entering here and now, the kingdom of heaven. He was the herald of the coming of Jesus. the one who prepared for him, but John himself died before the death and resurrection of Jesus opened the flood gates of the eschatological tide. By comparison, even the least in the kingdom of God is far greater than this prophetic herald. John also serves as a model of patience in suffering. His circumstances teach us that moving toward eschatological fulfilment is not without cost.

Just as Matthew presents us with the example of John the Baptist, so James describes the patience required of those who await the age of fulfilment. That age of fulfilment will dawn in its time; all we can do is discharge our responsibilities regardless of how demanding they might be, and wait for that day patiently, convinced that it will come in God's due time.
