# The return of the collection plates from February 2023

This is an issue I have been reluctant to address for quite a while but I believe that the time has come. Almost all of our pre-corona liturgical practices have returned, with just a few exceptions, one of which is that we are still using the two stationary boxes instead of collection plates which are passed around, as used to be the custom, virtually "forever." All other parishes seem to have brought back their collection plates. So, why not here at Regina Coeli?

To be honest with you, what I was fond of were not so much the stationary boxes themselves as the fact that collection plates were no longer being passed around. I remember one person remarking in 2020 how much she appreciated the fact that, whilst in prayer during Mass, she was neither distracted nor disrupted by the traffic of collection plates. This left an impression on me and, for the sake of prayerfulness, I have been reluctant to bring back the collection plates ever since.

Furthermore, I was also fond of the fact that the nature of financial giving at Regina Coeli might've seemed *unambiguously voluntary*: 'Please don't feel obliged; instead, please give if and only if you have arrived at the decision to do so freely and happily, without the pressure of collection plates or watchful eyes, etc.' In an ideal world, there would be no need for collection plates (no need for financial giving itself!); however, an ideal world does not exist on this side of paradise.

So, here are the main reasons for the return of the collection plates:

- \* There have been directives from the Archdiocese stating that collection plates are to be used instead of stationary boxes. I guess the consensus is that the former tend to be significantly more effective than the latter.
- \* A number of parishioners have said to me that the collection plates ought to be reintroduced. I believe these tend to be faithful givers who also feel that the responsibility for financial support of the parish ought to be shared more than just among a faithful minority.
- \* Perhaps there is even some courtesy in bringing the collection plates to the people, instead of making them approach the middle of the church, where it might be crowded, before or after mass. Some might be happy to give but not enough to undertake such trouble at times.
- \* Finally, blessed though the parish has been by so much generous giving over the years, it is also true that our current income level is on the low side. One only has to look around the church to see that some major works of maintenance will be required in the near-distant future.

I wish to clarify one thing: the works of building and renovation happening at the school are entirely funded by Sydney Catholic Schools (and the government) and do not reflect in any way the finances of the parish - if we were that wealthy, trust me, I think I would have told you! Nevertheless, my intention at present is to raise awareness, not alarm, as well as to say, 'Thank you!' - Fr Peter -

# Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year A

He went to Capernaum, that the prophecy of Isaiah be fulfilled.


Hearing that John had been arrested Jesus went back to Galilee, and leaving Nazareth he went and settled in Capernaum, a lakeside town on the borders of Zebulun and Naphtali. In this way the prophecy of Isaiah was to be fulfilled:

Land of Zebulun! Land of Naphtali!
Way of the sea on the far side of Jordan,
Galilee of the nations!
The people that lived in darkness
has seen a great light;
on those who dwell in the land and
shadow of death
a light has dawned.

From that moment Jesus began his preaching with the message, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.'

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### Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

Discipleship is not something that we take upon ourselves. We are called to it. Some people are very conscious of this call. They are aware of it in their aspirations and dreams: recognise it in the events of their lives. They hear the call as clearly as Simon, Andrew, James and John heard the voice of Jesus. For others, the call to discipleship is not so clear. They may experience an undefined restlessness, a dissatisfaction with their lives. People can respond to the call in one of two ways. They can consider the mere suggestion of discipleship an intrusion into their plans, or they can drop what they are doing, leave their former concerns behind and follow Jesus.

There is a misunderstanding about being called and leaving everything behind. Although the gospel says that the four men left their occupation of fishing in order to follow Jesus, this kind of 'leaving behind' was not, and still is not, required of all, for it is in the ordinary events of life that our salvation unfolds. For most people, this is precisely where they are to function as disciples. Still, disciples of Jesus are called to leave behind certain ways of living as they follow him. They are called away from lives of pettiness and division. They are called away from the kind of factionalism that seems to have threatened the unity of the Corinthian community. They are called away from narrow-mindedness and meanspirited competition. It is much easier to leave nets than to leave the web of one's prejudices.
