Sorry, I clearly remember now that collections used to take place at the offertory and then after holy communion. There was a time when collections were done differently at Regina Coeli but that was a long time ago. So, let's return to the latest pre-corona practice which would also seem to make more logistical sense. Thank you!

Last week I got to watch a live comedy show, at the courtesy of a kind parishioner who obtained for me a few tickets. I was excited more about the novelty of such an experience than about the comedy itself, the content of which was found to be, shall we say, not recommendable, definitely not for ladies! Come to think of it, there was probably not a single joke which might be appropriate for me to share with you. Nevertheless, it was a valuable experience to be among the capacity crowd of 15,000, all of whom had congregated for some professional hilarity.

Traditionally speaking, stand-up comedies are performed in underground comedy clubs which, according to the comedians themselves, are the ideal place for their performance, due to the sense of intimacy which can be created in such tightly-held, enclosed spaces. Intimacy is conducive to the formation of communion - a communion of intellect and emotion - among both performers and audiences, who begin to think and feel alike even at the level of subtlety. Such communions seem capable of enriching every human experience!

This particular comedy show, however, was going to be different by virtue of its grand scale. The huge arena had for me the effect of replacing the sense of intimacy with that of anonymity. I often unsure about whether to follow the performers via direct sight or to watch them on the gigantic screens above the stage. I also started to wonder from the outset, 'Would the comedy show itself really be funny enough to captivate an audience of 15,000 for over a few hours? Or would the audience, who were seriously invested in having a great time, speaking both financially and emotionally, laugh and cheer all too readily?' Needless to say, my verdict leaned toward the latter rather than the former.

The most memorable part of the night for me came toward the end when the show finally concluded and there were torrents of people racing to go home, as though they had been either secretly bored or in desperate need to get home for work the next morning. What amazed me was the sight of so many *young people* who, in my line of work, tend to be a rare species. My guess is that the biggest demographic were those in their late 20s and early 30s who were not yet married. I could not help but wonder: Were they in search of some great happiness which kept eluding them, especially as cynicism started to set in with age? Coming to an overrated comedy show at no small cost, what were they looking for? A song came to mind: *Tell me something...Are you happy in this modern world? Or do you need more? Is there something else you're searching for?* But I suppose that they could have just as easily asked me, 'What are *you* doing here?'

iation Program. The Information and Enrolment letter is available on parish website, or you may contact the parish office for more details. Thank you.







Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year A

First Reading Eccl 15:15-20

He never commanded anyone to be godless.

If you wish, you can keep the commandments,

Second Reading 1 Cor 2:6-10

God in his wisdom predestined our glory before the ages began.

We have a wisdom to offer those who have reached maturity: not a philosophy of our age, it is true, still less of the masters of our age, which are coming to their end. The hidden wisdom of God which we teach in our mysteries is the wisdom that God predestined to be for our glory before the ages began. It is a wisdom that none of the masters of this age have ever known, or they would not have crucified the Lord

of Glory; we teach what scripture calls: the things that no eye has seen and no ear has heard, things beyond the mind of man, all that God has prepared for those who love him.

These are the very things that God has revealed to us through the Spirit, for the Spirit reaches the depths of everything, even the depths of God.

you have revealed to little ones the mysteries of the kingdom.

Gospel Mt 5:20-22. 27-28. 33-34. 37 (or longer form Mt 5:17-37)

Jesus said to his disciples: I tell you, if your virtue goes no deeper than that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never get into the kingdom of heaven.

'Again, you have learnt how it was said to our ancestors: You must not break your oath, but must fulfil your oaths to the Lord. But I say this to you: do not swear at all. All you need say is "Yes" if you mean yes, "No" if you mean no; anything more than this comes from the evil one.'

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Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

Jesus continues to instruct the disciples in the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven. The readings for today focus our attention on the nature of true wisdom. It is this true wisdom which prompts us to choose the right course of action. It is true wisdom that directs us in our interpretation of the law.

The longer we live, the more we realise that life experiences open up for us a series of choices. With these choices we chart the path that we will take. Circumstances might be thrust on us, but we can still make choices about how we will deal with them. Obedient people do what they are told: wise people choose what good they will do. True wisdom calls us to choose life and whatever enhances life. If we are truly wise, we will come to realise that what was acceptable and life-enhancing in one situation may not be appropriate in another. Life is fluid, and our thinking and acting must be flexible enough to adapt when necessary.

True wisdom, which comes to us through the Spirit, will enrich us with insight into life in ways we never thought possible. We will realise where and how we fit into the vast and interrelated ecosystems of the universe, and we will be overawed with the majesty and intricacy of its workings. We will understand once and for all that the value of anything is determined by its capacity to enrich life, and we will commit ourselves to and cherish every manifestation of that life.
