A mother once told me that being a mother was the most difficult thing she ever had to do. So I decided to put the claim to the test by asking around a little during the week. On Thursday I asked a mother who was 83 years old, 'Was being a mother the most difficult thing you ever had to do?' She seemed a little dissatisfied with the question as she replied, 'Excuse me! I am *still* being a mother. You never stop being a mother. You are a mother until the day you die!'

On Friday the school held a liturgy for Mother's Day and I asked a young mother with children at the school, 'Is being a mother the most difficult thing you have ever done?' She said, 'Yes, absolutely! You change when you become a mother. You are never the same. I never knew I was capable of making so many sacrifices. But being a mother is also the most rewarding!'

On Father's Day in previous years the school mothers used to prepare lovely breakfast for the school fathers.

So, naturally, for Mother's Day, a big table of pastry with coffee and tea was prepared by the mothers themselves! Ever

coffee and tea was prepared by...the mothers themselves! Even then almost everything ended up being eaten by the children who couldn't resist free sweets just waiting to be consumed. Even on Mother's Day, mothers could not help but put children first and remain true to who they were: heartfelt devotees to the sacrificial act of laying down their lives for their beloved children!





The 60 year celebration of the church of Regina Coeli turned out to be a great success but in ways I could not have imagined! Let's start with some facts: over 400 dinner plates were used; 95kg of meat and 200 pieces of KFC were consumed; an abundance of salads, hot noodles and rice, fruits and desserts continued to flow in from generous parishioners. Our "professional" balloon-maker went through all of his 300 balloons. Even the jumping castle ended up being bounced on for recording-breaking 4 hours!

But in order for the real depth of the success to be conveyed we need to start from the beginning. At 7am volunteers started to gather in order to move tables and chairs from the hall and set them up on the playground. Someone asked, 'Should we go for it, in spite of the forecast of rain?' I said, 'Yes,' because, in my wishful thinking, it seemed as though we might just escape rain. So, the volunteers got busy, setting up for a big outdoor celebration!

When the 8.30am Mass started, it should have been easy for anyone to guess what I was praying for. About halfway through the Mass, I noticed that some people were walking in and out of the church with umbrellas in their hands. Surely, they were just being cautious and it wasn't actually raining? When the Mass ended and I processed out of the church, what greeted me was a totally different world: drizzling, gloomy and hostile to any attempt to have an outdoor celebration.

I walked toward the playground, in the rain, which also started to seep into my heart. All the tables and chairs, even the BBQs, had been crammed into the narrow under-croft areas in order to avoid rain.

Continued from Page 1 At that moment a truck arrived, carrying the jumping which, ironically, was named 'Noah's Ark.' The delivery man told me that he had to unload the jumping castle immediately but, if the jumping castle got wet, then it could not be used. He explained this to me literally as it rained all around us!

As I came back into the church to be ready for the 10am Mass, I ruminated on the real possibility of the jumping castle being wasted as well as the huge amount of food, for, we had planned to cater for 300 people. I wasn't sure how I was supposed to pray: in clear recognition of the disappointment, or with joyful trust? I hoped for the latter and announced, 'Let's pray that the weather will be good enough and we will be joyful enough to celebrate this day in some meaningful way!' I was pleasantly surprised that the church was filling up with much more vigour than usual. Before the Mass ended the church was full - with a fullness worthy of a 60 year celebration! The ambience seemed brighter and my body felt warmer, but I still wasn't sure what the weather was like outside. Needless to say, I was overjoyed when I processed out and was greeted this time by large patches of blue sky!

Within the next 15 minutes or so the sun came out and the sky turned almost entirely blue. Some people even attributed the change of weather to my prayers! I did not get to tell them about the little St Joseph whom I had put out earlier, who must have been working overtime. The tables and chairs were spread out once again, the BBQs were running at full speed and a large crowd of people congregated on the playground. Everything was coming together for what seemed an impossibility earlier - a big outdoor celebration, and a joyful one at that!

Speaking of joy, it was very appropriate that Joy Vincent - a parishioner of over 73 years - was given the honour of cutting the cake (which was magnificent!). The jumping castle, if it had got wet at all, was probably now all mopped up by the children who had overtaken it. There were two long queues for an impressive range of quality food. Many others were content to get a cuppa first and chat with one another while waiting. Over the next two hours the festivities were in full swing and, if you ask me, no one seemed to be in a rush to be anywhere else!

Once the desserts were served the rain came back but, by this time, I believe, we had felt so blessed about the whole day that it bothered us no more. Many people left with faces radiant with gratitude and joy. Some happily acknowledged that it really had been *premium* BBQ. Just as the volunteers started to clean and pack up, the sun came back out. By the time when the last of the volunteers left, with looks of contentment and little or no signs of fatigue on their faces, it was about 4pm. Our coordinator had been deeply moved when she said to me, 'I cannot believe how helpful everyone has been, especially when help was needed the most. We have the best parish!'

A girl asked me during the week the most difficult of all religious questions, to which only the Christian faith in its entirety can be the answer: 'Why is there evil in our world?' I gave her the example of our 60 year celebration which started under very challenging weather conditions; but when we trusted patiently and the weather improved delightfully, our hearts were brimming with gratitude and joy in ways which might not have been possible, had we got everything exactly when we wanted it. God permits evil, but only because He is capable of bringing out something even greater out of it. After all, the Cross was followed by the Resurrection, and the forty days of Lent is followed by the fifty days of Easter! With this in mind, we need not be afraid, ever! - Fr Peter -

















First Reading Acts 8:5-8, 14-17

They laid hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit.

But give it with courtesy and respect and with a clear conscience, so that those who slander you when you are living a good life in Christ may be proved wrong in the accusations that they bring. And if it is the will of God that you should suffer, it is better to suffer for doing right than for doing wrong.

Why, Christ himself, innocent though he was, had died once for sins, died for the guilty, to lead us to God. In the body he was put to death, in the spirit he was raised to life.

We live in hope because we have been blessed with the opportunity of participating in the exaltation of Jesus. This hope is based on promises: the promise that we will not be left orphaned when Jesus returns to his Father; the promise that we will be comforted by the Spirit whom Jesus will send. It is trust in God that enables us to live in this world as if the promises have already been fulfilled, for in fact, it is precisely such living that fulfils them.

We have not celebrated the Ascension, and yet all three readings speak of the Spirit. The same Spirit, who quickened the resurrected life of Jesus, enlivens us. This Spirit strengthens, comforts, guides and inspires us. Life in the Spirit requires that we conform our lives to the commandments of God, not in a legalistic or constraining way but out of love. The love that comes to us through the Spirit will then overflow into the lives of others, and we will be agents of God's love in the world.

The Spirit given by Christ is mediated through the laying on of hands. This still happens in our day in the gentle touch of friends, in the loving touch of parents, in the healing touch of those who cure both the body and the spirit. The liturgical year is preparing us for the Ascension of Jesus into heaven, and Jesus is preparing us for life in the Spirit here on earth. This is the reason for our hope.

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
