For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.

- Matthew 6:18 -

We need to be careful about what we treasure because, depending on what we treasure, our heart could be uplifted or deflated; we could end up in a good place or a hellish place.

Some weeks ago I was at Vivid and what struck me was the fact that, whenever there was a show, so many people took out their phones and started recording it, almost as though they were less interested in the experience itself and more interested in, for example, telling everyone about it by uploading a picture or video on social media. But Jesus said, 'For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.' When the virtual world (or the online world) becomes our treasure, where will our heart be? In other words, what will be the effect of too much screen time on the human soul? I believe this to be a critically important topic which demands further reflection and analysis. But here is what comes to mind immediately:

As a general rule it seems true to say that the more we stay in the virtual world the less satisfied we become, although we are likely to become more addicted at the same time. After all, even though there seems to be infinite data in the virtual world, there isn't enough meaning or substance there; rather, too much meaningless data actually makes us feel more confused and scattered, empty and restless.

If we stay in the virtual world long enough, then, without realising it, we might even begin to identify ourselves with *data*, for example, the data which seems meaningless, the data which most people fail to notice or have forgotten about, or the data which the powerful can manipulate or even wipe out entirely! If the underlying values of the virtual world can influence and shape our outlook on life and self-understanding more insidiously than we tend to realise, then, it is no wonder that having too much screen time on a regular basis actually makes us feel more anxious, isolated and lonely, and at an alarming rate!

Recently I was talking to a lady who said that, without God, we have no foundation, and that is not a good place for us to be. She said that, for so many people of today, the screen has become their treasure; it has become their "god"! So, I suggested that this could actually be an opportunity for preaching the Gospel. After all, now that more of us can identify with the deflating effects of screen addiction on the human soul, more of us might be willing to make changes and try something different, for example, by disconnecting from noise and distraction and storing up treasures for ourselves in heaven! (c.f. Matthew 6:20)

St Paul said, 'Remember how generous the Lord Jesus was: he was rich, but he became poor for your sake, to make you rich out of his poverty.' (2 Cor 8:9)

When a person who is rich becomes poor for us, when a person who is beautiful loses his external beauty for us, when a person who is full of life empties himself and dies for us, we know that that person truly loves us. This is what God has done in the person of Jesus who died and rose from the dead for us. The question is, 'Does the love of God really make a difference to us? For example, does it really enrich us?

Of course, the Christian answer is a resounding 'Yes!' For us to exercise faith is to become *open* to the love of God, and being open to the love of God requires us to be humble and honest, as well as loving and forgiving toward our neighbours, hence the reason why Jesus also said, 'Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you.' (Matt 5:44)

Loving our enemies and praying for those who persecute us might be the definitive sign of our surrendering and becoming as open as possible to the love of God, which has been revealed to us through the death and resurrection of Christ. When we become open in this way, what we gain far outweighs what we think we might lose.

Granted, it is impossible for us to make ourselves perfect, even in a million years. But the infinite magnitude of the love of God makes our perfection a real possibility, hence the reason why Jesus also said, 'You must therefore be perfect just as your Heavenly Father is perfect.' (Matt 5:48)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

God's gift to us is nothing like our sin against him.

Sin entered the world through one man, and through sin death, and thus death has spread through the whole human race because everyone has sinned. Sin existed in the world long before the Law was given. There was no law and so no one could be accused of the sin of 'law-breaking', yet death reigned over all from Adam to Moses, even though their sin, unlike that of Adam, was not a matter of breaking a law.

Adam prefigured the One to come, but the gift itself considerably outweighed the fall. If it is certain that through one man's fall so many died, it is even more certain that divine grace, coming through the one man, Jesus Christ, came to so many as an abundant free gift.

Do not fear those who can kill the body.


Jesus instructed the Twelve as follows: 'Do not be afraid. For everything that is now covered will be uncovered, and everything now hidden will be made clear. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the daylight; what you hear in whispers, proclaim from the house-tops.

'Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; fear him rather who can destroy both body and soul in hell. Can you not buy two sparrows for a penny? And yet not one falls to the ground without your Father knowing. Why, every hair on your head has been counted. So there is no need to be afraid; you are worth more than hundreds of sparrows.

'So if anyone declares himself for me in the presence of men, I will declare myself for him in the presence of my Father in heaven. But the one who disowns me in the presence of men, I will disown in the presence of my Father in heaven.'

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#### Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

The demands of discipleship can be very difficult. The strength that is needed to continue on the chosen path despite its hardships can come only from God. We live in a world that desperately needs to hear the call to conversion, but it is a world that is subject to the death that entered it through the sin of Adam. Those who answer the call of God may have to face the hostility of this world, because their values and their righteousness commitment to threaten its moorings. To commit oneself to the reign of God is to challenge the reign of the world, and this can make one very unpopular. In the midst of this suffering we can find strength in the promises of God, and we believe that God is faithful to these promises.

Only half of today's picture is bleak. The other half is radiant with hope. Paul assures us that the gracious gift that God offers us is far greater that the transgressions brought on by sin. This gracious gift is Jesus Christ himself. The gift exceeds anything for which we might have hoped. He is the comfort that will carry us through our disappointments. He is the strength that will enable us to endure the misunderstanding and hardship that come with discipleship. We are called to acknowledge him before the world, and we are promised that if we do, he will acknowledge us before God. There is light even in the midst of darkness. There is hope even in the midst of suffering.
