Beverly Hills - In the Archdiocese of Sydney

14th Sunday in Ordinary Time 9 July 2023

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What I am about to write is NOT for the faint-hearted, as it centres on the issue of child trafficking and more. 'Sound of freedom' is a movie which has just been released and is based on a true story. Tim Ballard started out as a CIA agent but, after 9/11, joined the Department of Homeland Security where he was eventually assigned to the special division which dealt with child sex crimes. During 12 years of service he worked undercover to prosecute US citizens involved in crimes against children, including those who indulged in child-sex-tourism overseas. But the trouble was that, during his investigations, as soon as the cases no longer pertained to US citizens, he would be ordered to walk away, even when the victims were within the reach of his help. So, he courageously quit his government career and founded a private organisation - 'Operation Underground Railroad' - dedicated to rescuing victims of child sex crimes around the world.

Over 6 million children are estimated to be enslaved or trafficked for the purpose sex, labour or organ-harvesting. As we know, the internet, especially since the pandemic, has greatly facilitated the satisfaction of shallow desires for instant gratification. Unfortunately, the same has been true regarding the satisfaction of depraved sexual desires. The past several years have seen a 5000% increase (yes, that's a fifty-fold increase!) in the production and consumption of pornography involving children. Activities of such nature make up the fastest growing criminal trade in the world, almost equalling the financial magnitude of the drug trade. But abundance of supply implies abundance of demand. Who are the myriads of consumers responsible for the existence of millions of abused children? The US has consistently been the no.1 consumer in the diabolic market of commodified children. If so, then, who else has been a big consumer and how has this impacted upon the whole culture, especially those aspects which target our children?

What else is confounding about all this is the fact that the issue of child trafficking, whilst horrible beyond comprehension and astoundingly prevalent, is rarely talked about, for the same reason that most Australians probably have not heard about the movie 'Sound of freedom,' at least not yet. What explains the deafening silence on what is one of the greatest scandals in human history? No one becomes a child-abuser overnight. First come the thousands of small transgressions, all of which the perpetrators justify and then normalise by way of self-deception, such that even when the unthinkable transgression is committed they are ready and willing to excuse themselves. In other words, they have blinded their own con-

science. But what are the thousands of lies our society has told itself, to the point of blinding its own conscience, such that even when the most heart-wrenching truth cries out to be heard, our society is ready and willing to turn a deaf ear?

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Tim Ballard, in the early years of working for the government, did not want to have to deal with child sex crimes, for fear of possibly bringing the utter darkness of such work into his own home, where a beautiful wife and young children awaited him. But the wife - another true hero in the story - explained to him that the reason why he did not want the role was precisely why he should accept it: for the sake of the innocent and vulnerable children who were no less precious than their own! After all, the superiors had chosen him *for* being a Christian, wisely aware that, without faith, such work would be soul-crushing. When Tim was again tempted to choose comfort/security over doing what was right, his wife said to him, 'You're not going to jeopardise my salvation by leaving those children and then coming home!' After this, Tim himself never looked back, learning along the way that the only way he could bear the weight of fighting child trafficking was by giving the burden to a higher power - Jesus who said, 'my yoke is easy, my burden light' - to whom he would subject himself like a little child.

If a compromised conscience can become a conduit of evil, including evil of the most monstrous kind, then, the converse is also true: a cleansed and therefore courageous conscience can bring heaven down to earth, such that hearts and minds become transformed and the sound of freedom resounds in our world! - *Fr Peter* -


Newly refurbished apartments for over 70s

In fulfillment of Saint Scalabrini's mission to support elderly migrants, Scalabrini Villages is releasing 33 apartments, designed-specifically to provide low-cost rental accommodation for the Bayside and broader South Sydney elderly community.

The studio apartments are self-contained (each about 29 square metres), with a bedroom area, small kitchen, bathroom with shower and open plan living space. Residents will also be free to join activities and events at our adjacent aged care facility, helping to build community, alleviate loneliness and increase social interaction.

The weekly charge would be just \$185, inclusive of water and electricity.

Your interests are not in the unspiritual, but in the spiritual, since the Spirit of God has made his home in you. In fact, unless you possessed the Spirit of Christ you would not belong to him, and if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, then he who raised Jesus from the dead will give life to your own mortal bodies through his Spirit living in you.

So then, my brothers, there is no necessity for us to obey our unspiritual selves or to live unspiritual lives. If you do live in that way, you are doomed to die; but if by the Spirit you put an end to the misdeeds of the body you will live.

Gospel Mt 11:25-30

Everything has been entrusted to me by my Father; and no one knows the Son except the Father, just as no one knows the Father except the Son and those to whom the Son chooses to reveal him.

'Come to me, all you who labour and are overburdened, and I will give you rest. Shoulder my yoke and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. Yes, my yoke is easy and my burden light.'

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Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

The readings for today engage us in a reflection on the nature of the Trinity. as well as the ways that we are enriched by each of the divine Persons. The gospel acknowledges the sovereignty of God. This is followed immediately by mention of the handing over of all things to Jesus, making him a kind of viceregent of God. Paul speaks of the Spirit, clearly a divine reality, but different from Jesus and the one called God. According to Paul, this Spirit is the Spirit of Jesus and the Spirit of God, implying that somehow both Jesus and God claim the Spirit. It is this Spirit who raised Jesus from the dead, and it is this same Spirit who dwells in Christians.

The grace of this Triune God touches our lives in some ways that are tangible and other ways that demand faith. The most tangible manifestation of God is Jesus himself. God has been revealed to us through this Jesus. While Jesus was a tangible person, our accepting of him as the manifestation of God requires faith, and this faith is no easier today than it was at the time of Jesus himself.

The overriding disposition of these readings is humility. Jesus, the human manifestation of the divine, is meek and humble, and the true disciple is called to be humble. A second disposition is placed before us – grateful praise. In the psalm we praise and bless God; we extol God's holy name. In Jesus we have known the tender touch of God, and we are grateful.
