One of the things mentioned at *Parish Dinner 2023* was the fact that Chris Egan, our school principal, will be moving to St John Bosco Primary School, Engadine, at the end of the year. The selection process for a new principal at Regina Coeli is currently underway. Please pray that a suitable candidate be found for this important role. Something else mentioned at the parish dinner was the fact that Fr Paul Hilder, a former parish priest of Regina Coeli, is retiring from active ministry and plans to move back into Beverly Hills, thereby becoming a member of our community once again! Performances. I was not exaggerating when I said, in the lead-up to the parish dinner, that what had been improving remarkably was not just the final number (285 people!) but also the program itself. The first recruit was a young girl - a natural performer - who agreed to dance. Then her mother also agreed, after some convincing, to surprise everyone by joining the daughter in the second part of the dance. Another girl in the parish, whose impressive busking I had unexpectedly witnessed once in the city, agreed to sing. Another singer was found - someone who is on her way to a career in musical theatre - when her grandparents offered to bring her to the parish dinner. Two sisters - one of them only in kindergarten - agreed to do a dance together. What I did not know, however, was how elegant, even acrobatic, their dance was going to be! A mother and son from the 10am choir also agreed to put on a show - the former on vocals and the latter on guitar!

All these performances turned out to be even better than expected! They were not only excellent in quality but also heart-warming due to the fact that they were all parishioners and, quite often, adorable variations of family duos, generously volunteering their talent and effort. There was one performance which was not by parishioners - the Higgins Academy of Irish Dancing - which was dazzling in the skills and spectacle displayed. But, even then, it was our own parishioner who, as a recipient of the Order of Australia for her contribution to Irish dancing, was able to "pull some strings" and arrange the high-quality Irish dancing to be performed at the parish dinner! On the whole, there was a magical quality to the performances on the night, including in the way that all the concepts emerged one after the other as though by inspiration and providence.

Club Central kindly supported the parish dinner with the waiver of room hire. Speaking of the room, it looked far more impressive once all set up, compared to the state of emptiness it was in upon my first visit during the planning stage. On the night itself, the room was dimly lit up with blue being the primary colour, so as to complement the parish logo which was on display around the room. A friendly technician was on standby the entire evening, ensuring the enhancement of our experiences with technological support. But the prettiest things in the room, which might have made the biggest difference to the ambience, were all prepared by Mia from the organising committee! So many people commented on the quality of the food, saying that it was actually quite delicious! There was even live music during the meal, thanks to our pianist from the 5pm mass. Joyful Gratitude! Both on the night and in the days that followed, so many people thanked me *profusely* for the parish dinner which turned out to be a surprisingly joyful experience for them. What they did not know, however, was that I too had been surprised almost as much as they had been. When the parish dinner was first announced and the uptake was rather slow, I had almost concluded that perhaps a dinner was not the brightest of ideas and was going to be content with anything over a hundred people. Even when the numbers started to rise and surpass expectations, I still had doubts, as though every conceivable reason for cynicism had to go through me for some reason. Mia might have been sleep-deprived due to overworking; I was sleep-deprived for no good reason! But on the night itself I felt so calm and able to enjoy whatever unfolded, and was immensely surprised by what seemed like a little miracle, namely, the coming together of all the elements which had been set in motion along the way.

How often should the parish dinner be held? Parish Dinner 2023 has felt so much like a gratuitous gift that I am hesitant to announce another one too rashly, not wishing to push our luck, so to speak. But it so happens that next year actually has special significance for our parish. The feast of Regina Coeli was officially instituted in the Catholic Church in 1954. In the same year, the name of our parish, which used to be 'Queen of Peace,' was changed to 'Regina Coeli' (Queen of Heaven) - a brilliant move, as I imagine all would agree! This means that next year - 2024 - would be the 70th anniversary of the parish name, as well as that of the official establishment of the feast of Regina Coeli in the Universal Church! I do not know exactly what form our celebration will take - hopefully similar to what we had this year and yet somehow delightfully new! Let's start praying now so that we might be surprised once again by more instances of inspiration and providence for the 70th anniversary of Regina Coeli!

Twenty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year A

First Reading Is 22:19-23

I place the key of the House of David upon his shoulder.

Thus says the Lord of hosts to Shebna, the master of the palace:

I dismiss you from your office, I remove you from your post, and the same day I call on my servant Eliakim son of Hilkiah. I invest him with your robe, gird him with your sash, entrust him with your authority; and he shall be a father to the inhabitants of Jerusalem and to the House of Judah. Then Simon Peter spoke up, 'You are the Christ,' he said, 'the Son of the living God.' Jesus replied, 'Simon son of Jonah, you are a happy man! Because it was not flesh and blood that revealed this to you but my Father in heaven. So I now say to you: You are Peter and on this rock I will build my Church. And the gates of the underworld can never hold out against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven: whatever you bind on earth shall be considered bound in heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven.' Then he gave the disciples strict orders not to tell anyone that he was the

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Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

The readings highlight two different but related themes: the character of our understanding of Christ, and our understanding of discipleship that flows from it. Christological reflections reach a climax in the question posed to the disciples: Who do you say I am? In this liturgical context, the same question is posed to us. Who is this one who multiplies loaves of bread, who walks on turbulent waters, who breaks the boundaries that separate insider from outsider? It is none other than the messiah.

When Peter testified to Jesus' identity, it was a relevant religious and political statement, for messianic expectation was a burning question at that time. But what does it mean for the average today? Many believers consider messianic expectation a theological theme that belongs to the past. They feel that it is difficult to get excited about the coming of someone who we believe has already come and gone. If Jesus were to pose this question today, how answer?

Like Peter, we too may have good intentions, but when they are put to the test we realize that that was all that they were—good intentions. Still, we should not be discouraged by our weaknesses, for just as Peter's failure did not deter God from entrusting him with power and authority, so our failures need not be obstacles to God's grace in our lives. We watch God entrust the church to individuals who are weak and undependable, and we realize that judgments are inscrutable and God's ways unsearchable.
