A Message from Daniel Portelli, Member of the Parish Finance Committee

Dear Parishioners, the Financial Year (July 2022 to June 2023) has ended, and I wish to share an update on the Parish financial affairs. I have summarised the Financial Results for This Year and Last Year for those that wish to see the detail.

It was a Financial Year where, by and large, parish life finally returned to normal. We are pleased to report that the Parish finished the year in surplus of \$156,390 for the year ended 30 June 2023 (more on Page 3). Firstly, I would like to thank all Parishioners that have continued to support our Parish and have made the generous contributions of both time and money during this period.

The Parish Income for the recently ended Financial Year (2022/23) was \$81,519 higher than Last Year. Much of this increase came from higher donations as regular Mass continued with no interruptions or limitations and the Collection Plate was reinstated. Rising interest rates saw an increase in Interest Income on Term Deposits that are holding surplus funds from Prior Years set aside for future requirements within the Parish. The Parish Hall was hired for the entire Financial Year earning more Hall Hire revenue. There was also a generous bequeathment made to the Church as a one-off increase to Revenue. All these increases offset the decrease in revenue from the temporary Government subsidy, called Job-Keeper, that the Parish received Last Year.

Despite the return to normal Parish life this Financial Year, Parish Expenses were only \$8,183 higher than the Previous Year. The Parish saw increases to normal running costs due to current inflationary pressures, particularly with electricity/gas, Postage/Printing/Telephone, and urgent repairs. However, the increase to Parish Expenses were still modest, which was largely attributed to a delay in certain expenditures, particularly Repairs and Maintenance to Parish property. Additionally, there were several savings measures that were enacted in the Prior Years that the Parish continues to benefit from.

Consequently, the Parish Surplus during this Financial Year is largely attributed to a restraint in Capital Expenditure during this period of uncertainty. However, the Surplus will be carried forward to support the Parish as we hope significant repairs and maintenance work will commence on the Church building in the new year. [More on this will be announced soon.]

The forward outlook is that inflationary pressure on expenses will persist with normal running costs and repairs and maintenance, while weekly donations will continue to remain at levels lower than before COVID19. While the Parish has been fortunate to avoid a deficit during some very challenging years with many generous contributions from Parishioners and financial restraint on expenditure, I would like to encourage all Parishioners to please continue to support the Parish generously with continued donations.

Please remember, if you prefer to make cashless donations to the Parish, there is an EFT machine located at the middle of the Church which can accept any amount you wish to donate using your preferred card. Thank you and God Bless!

Now when the Pharisee who had invited him saw it, he said to himself, 'If this man were a prophet, he would have known who and what kind of woman this is who is touching him - that she is a sinner...And Jesus said to Simon, 'Therefore, I tell you, her sins, which were many, have been forgiven; hence she has shown great love. But the one to whom little is forgiven, loves little.' (Luke 7:47)

It is decidedly not the case...that love precedes divine forgiveness as a sort of prerequisite; on the contrary, forgiveness precedes love as the condition for its possibility. It is not the case that one's moral life must be upright in order to win divine favour; rather, the sheet gift of God's favour tends to produce an upright moral life, a life of love.

The Pharisees' blindness to the implications of the woman's excessive love is tantamount to his blindness to the authentic workings of the God who is really God...His own cultic purity brushes forgiveness off the stage and thus produces

what we see disclosed in the story: a man weak in love. Simon's pharisaical religiosity has blinded him to the need for repentance.

...It is Jesus the judge who shines light into the darkness of Simon's religion itself, into its exclusiveness, violence, self-righteousness, and egotism.

Why are you jealous because I am generous?

Jesus said to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner going out at daybreak to hire workers for his vineyard. He made an agreement with the workers for one denarius a day, and sent them to his vineyard. Going out at about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the market place and said to them, "You go to my vineyard too and I will give you a fair wage." So they went. At about the sixth hour and again at about the ninth hour, he went out and did the same. Then at about the eleventh hour he went out and found more men standing round, and he said to them, "Why have you been standing here idle all day?" "Because no one has hired us" they answered. He said to them, "You go into my vineyard too." In the evening, the owner of the vineyard said to his bailiff, "Call the workers and pay them their wages, starting with the last arrivals and ending with the first." So those who were hired at about the eleventh hour came forward and received one denarius each. When the first came. they expected to get more, but they too received one denarius each. They took it, but grumbled at the landowner. "The men who came last" they said "have done only one hour, and you have treated them the same as us, though we have done a heavy day's work in all the heat." He answered one of them and said, "My friend, I am not being unjust to you; did we not agree on one denarius? Take your earnings and go. I choose to pay the last-comer as much as I pay you. Have I no right to do what I like with my own? Why be envious because I am generous?" Thus the last will be first, and the first, last.'





Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

Our attention shifts slightly in these last Sundays of Ordinary Time. We turn from concentration on the character and responsibilities of discipleship to reflection on the import of the end of time. As we move toward the close of the liturgical year, we are invited to consider the final coming of Christ and the last judgment.

The thought of judgment is enough to strike fear in the hearts of many. We sometimes experience tension between the idea of divine justice, which requires that the good be adequately rewarded and the evil be appropriately punished, and that of the mercy of God, which we hope will be generously extended to us. As seen in the readings for this Sunday, the justice of God does not conform to the standards of human justice. It is incomprehensible, because its foundation is mercy. While we might find consolation in this view of divine judgment when it is directed toward us, our hearts do not always seem to be generous enough to rejoice in the mercy extended to others. It is almost as if we feel that we have been cheated in some way, if God is merciful to others. However, divine mercy can work in us to abolish our pettiness and indignation and replace it with generosity of heart. We are called to conduct ourselves with this kind of generosity, this kind of love, this kind of mercy.
