The Retreat Day for Seniors went thankfully well. Everyone was on time, except for the sun, although it came out eventually, just in time for us to appreciate the beauty of Mt Shoenstatt in Mulgoa. Morning tea was followed by a reflection on the topic of *prayer*. Lunch was followed by Mass. The day concluded with the rosary in their famous shrine. Clear blue sky and pure sunlight made the place look so dazzlingly beautiful that I personally wanted to stay longer! For some of our seniors it was certainly an adventure to travel so far but they were courageous and everyone returned home safely. Thanks be to God! Speaking of prayer:

*Why do we pray*? Probably one of the most common reasons why we pray is for a certain outcome. We think, 'If I say Prayer A, then, hopefully, I will get Outcome B.' So, we repeat the same prayer, or we go on a search for the "right prayer" which might best bring about the outcome we want, etc. But there is a far better way for us to pray. There is a far greater reason for why we pray. Which is to pray for the sake of *contact with the merciful presence of God* who inspires in us how to think, speak and act, etc.

A mother once told me that she was heartbroken because her daughter, with whom she used to have the closest of relationships, had now become almost like a stranger to her. But when she looked back, she said, she could see that there had been warning signs. Unfortunately, according to the mother herself, she had been too busy or distracted to notice the signs. How often in life do we look back and think, 'If I knew *then* what I know *now* I would have done things *differently*'?

Jesus said, 'Everything that is now covered will be uncovered, and everything now hidden will be made clear.' (Lk12:3) But we don't have to wait until the end to have clarity or transparency. Each time we turn to prayer for the sake of contact with the merciful presence of God, we are loved, forgiven and *enlightened* shown more clearly what to do differently now, so as to shape a different future.

St Paul once asked, 'Are we saved by the love of God which we have earned, or by the love of God which we have not earned but is given to us as a free gift (a.k.a. *mercy*)?' (c.f. Romans 4-5) Think of how hard young people must work in order to earn enough just to buy a little house in Sydney today? By contrast, God's mercy is like the entire universe which has been given to us as a free gift! The same God who has created everything that exists can do amazing things in us and through us, starting from the universes of our soul! This is why when we pray for the sake of contact or *communion*, and pray constantly, the outcome of our prayer will far surpass anything we could have asked for or imagined!

I will be on annual leave over the next month. For the first weekend of my absence, Fr Dominic Nguyen - a good friend of mine - will celebrate the Masses. The rest will be looked after by Fr Paul Hilder - a former parish priest of Regina Coeli - who will have moved back into Beverly Hills for his retirement. Please make them feel welcome, especially the one who is, as a young lady in our parish put it, *a blast from the past!* - *Fr Peter* -



> The Real Presence of Jesus versus the Virtual World: The End of the World and the Birth of the New On Thursday 30 November 2023, 6:30pm @ Regina Coeli Church

In Advent the world is ending, and on Christmas day a new world begins. In the Book of Revelation the end comes with the rise of what is dark, false, and unreal; while at Christmas the beginning comes with the one who is the Truth and the Light. With the turn of 2023 to 2024, everything seems on the edge of an abyss, and all that is offered is the screen and the promise of AI; a virtual world in which we can hide away immersed in distractions. But Advent is the time to look away and consider what is real and what has meaning, to look to Christmas for it says that what is real is the Real Presence of the Lord Jesus Christ; there the light shines in darkness. By way of the Scriptures and the teaching of the Church this talk seeks to explain and explore not the 'beginning and the end', but the 'end and *then* the beginning'.

Dr Robert Tilley did his Doctorate at the University of Sydney with a thesis entitled Reading the Sacred Text. His thesis set out to rethink the nature of 'creation as a text of God' (natural theology) by way of an engagement with Scripture (revealed theology) and did this by way of late and postmodern discussions on the nature of textuality. He has lectured widely on a variety of topics, endeavouring to show how Scripture, theology, philosophy, and the arts all interrelate. He has lectured in Biblical Studies at the Catholic Institute of Sydney for close to fourteen years now, and for a longer period of time was a regular lecturer in Biblical Studies, the arts, and theology at the Aquinas Academy which was based at Wynyard. He has also lectured at UNDA Sydney and tutored in Biblical Studies at the University of Sydney.

The Pharisees went away to work out between them how to trap Jesus in what he said. And they sent their disciples to him, together with the Herodians, to say, 'Master, we know that you are an honest man and teach the way of God in an honest way, and that you are not afraid of anyone, because a man's rank means nothing to you. Tell us your opinion, then. Is it permissible to pay taxes to Caesar or not?' But Jesus was aware of their malice and replied, 'You hypocrites! Why do you set this trap for me? Let me see the money you pay the tax with.' They handed him a denarius, and he said, 'Whose head is this? Whose name?' 'Caesar's' they replied. He then said to them, 'Very well, give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar - and to God what belongs to God.'

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## Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

The frequency with which we consider the question of insider-outsider is an indication of how important universalism and the breaking down of boundaries is within our religious tradition. All peoples, all lands are called on to praise God. Furthermore, God cares about and cares for all people (see Is 19:25), and God works through all people to accomplish good in the world: Gandhi, a Hindu of Indian origin; Martin Luther King, Jr, a Baptist minister; Susan B. Anthony, a suffragist; Nelson Mandela, a Black South African, etc. Human beings have alwavs realised that. in comparison with the grandeur and expansiveness of the universe within which they live, they are weak and vulnerable creatures. This has led them to believe in and offer homage to a divine being, or beings. Praise of God has always been an expression of awe and gratitude as well as humility.

If neither gender, nor race, nor age, nor class nor culture qualifies one for being an insider, what does? Today's readings suggest that it is service of others. In breaking down the walls of prejudice, the social activists of our own age liberate not only the oppressed groups to which they belong, but also those who oppress them. The lives of these dynamic people show us that service of others draws them into our circles and encircles us in theirs. With open arms God invites all into an embrace of divine love. As God has embraced us, so we are called to embrace all others.
