# 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time 19 November 2023

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The Gospel story is pretty simple. A wealthy man assigns his goods to each of three servants to care for while he is gone. He doesn't give them instructions, at least that we are told of. When he returns, he sees that two of the three servants have invested the money and got back twice the amount. He is delighted. So at this point the moral of the story would be: "make the most of what you have."

But if we look at just the successful servants, we miss the most interesting part of all. We miss the fascinating and puzzling story of the third servant. This poor soul did not invest the money at all! He buried it.

Quite simply, he was afraid of what might happen if he committed it and as a result, lost it. Given the owner's attitude, he was right to be afraid.

Having heard the fearful servant's story, the owner then had the man thrown into "the darkness outside" where there would be "wailing and grinding of teeth." Quite an overreaction, it seems. Hadn't the poor servant just wanted to keep the owner's money safe? But there is much more to it.

The monetary unit "talent" in Jesus' time was not a small . Even one talent could be worth more than a labourer would earn in a lifetime. And the owner entrusted a lot more than just money to the servants, he left them all his possessions, everything he had. In fact, the owner took a great risk and he wanted them to do the same, not leave the investment decaying somewhere . That is the story.

Ok, now make the switch. Assume that the parable was about God. Maybe God entrusts an even greater amount to you and me. Life, abilities, the gift of loving, the living breathing human beings around us, and, every so often, real and open acts of unselfish love. God gives all this free of charge, gives to us our lives with all their rewards and catastrophes, and he says to us, *dive in. You are my beloved!* 

This seems wonderful. But then an awful question arises. Does God curse those who are afraid and who bury what they are given? Jesus at least seems to say so - "to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away."

We are all frightened. But God always has compassion for us. God patiently waits to see if we will accept just a bit of the love he offers. And also, if we will even find just enough courage to invest some of this love in other people.

There is one thing that will go away if it is buried, but which gets greater if we use it. *Love*.

Think about it. If fear closes the door tightly against love, guess where the unloving one will be: in the darkness outside the door, wailing and gnashing those teeth. *Without love.* 

The message to you and me? Let love in. See what happens! *Fr John Foley SJ* liturgy.sluhostedsites.org

# Advent Special: A talk by Dr Robert Tilley The Real Presence of Jesus versus the Virtual World: The End of the World and the Birth of the New

## On Thursday 30 November 2023, 6:30pm @ Regina Coeli Church

In Advent the world is ending, and on Christmas day a new world begins. In the Book of Revelation the end comes with the rise of what is dark, false, and unreal; while at Christmas the beginning comes with the one who is the Truth and the Light. With the turn of 2023 to 2024, everything seems on the edge of an abyss, and all that is offered is the screen and the promise of AI; a virtual world in which we can hide away immersed in distractions. But Advent is the time to look away and consider what is real and what has meaning, to look to Christmas for it says that what is real is the Real Presence of the Lord Jesus Christ; there the light shines in darkness. By way of the Scriptures and the teaching of the Church this talk seeks to explain and explore not the 'beginning and the end', but the 'end and *then* the beginning'.

Dr Robert Tilley did his Doctorate at the University of Sydney with a thesis entitled Reading the Sacred Text. His thesis set out to rethink the nature of 'creation as a text of God' (natural theology) by way of an engagement with Scripture (revealed theology) and did this by way of late and postmodern discussions on the nature of textuality. He has lectured widely on a variety of topics, endeavouring to show how Scripture, theology, philosophy, and the arts all interrelate. He has lectured in Biblical Studies at the Catholic Institute of Sydney for close to fourteen years now, and for a longer period of time was a regular lecturer in Biblical Studies, the arts, and theology at the Aquinas Academy which was based at Wynyard. He has also lectured at UNDA Sydney and tutored in Biblical Studies at the University of Sydney.

#### First Reading Prv 31:10-13.19-20.30-31

Give her a share in what she has worked for.

A perfect wife - who can find her? She is far beyond the price of pearls. Her husband's heart has confidence in her. from her he will derive no little profit. Advantage and not hurt she brings him all the days of her life. She is always busy with wool and with flax, she does her work with eager hands. She sets her hands to the distaff. her fingers grasp the spindle. She holds out her hand to the poor. she opens her arms to the needy. Charm is deceitful, and beauty empty: the woman who is wise is the one to praise. Give her a share in what her hands have worked for,

and let her works tell her praises at the city gates.

You will not be expecting us to write anything to you, brothers, about 'times and seasons', since you know very well that the Day of the Lord is going to come like a thief in the night. It is when people are saying, 'How quiet and peaceful it is' that the worst suddenly happens, as suddenly as labour pains come on a pregnant woman; and there will be no way for anybody to evade it. But it is not as if you live in the dark, my brothers, for that Day to overtake you like a thief. No, you are all sons of light and sons of the day: we do not belong to the night or to darkness, so we should not go on sleeping, as everyone else does, but stay wide awake and sober.

Alleluia, alleluia! Live in me and let me live in you, says the Lord; my branches bear much fruit. Alleluia!

#### Gospel Mt 25:14-30

Because you have been faithful over a few things, enter into the joy of the Lord.

Jesus spoke this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a man on his way abroad who summoned his servants and entrusted his property to them. To one he gave five talents, to another two, to a third one; each in proportion to his ability. Then he set out. The man who had received the five talents promptly went and traded with them and made five more. The man who had received two made two more in the same way. But the man who had received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. Now a long time after, the master of those servants came back and went through his accounts with them. The man who had received the five talents came forward bringing five more. "Sir", he said "you entrusted me with five talents; here are five more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Next the man with the two talents came forward. "Sir," he said "you entrusted me with two talents; here are two more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things. I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Last came forward the man who had the one talent. "Sir," said he "I had heard you were a hard man, reaping where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered; so I was afraid, and I went off and hid your talent in the ground. Here it is; it was yours, you have it back." But his master answered him, "You wicked and lazy servant! So you knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered? Well then, you should have deposited my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have recovered my capital with interest. So now, take the talent from him and give it to the man who has the five talents. For to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away. As for this good-for-nothing servant, throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth."'

#### Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

It is not enough that we wait patiently. We are expected to be industrious as we await the advent of the reign of God. We have all been entrusted with talents that really belong to God, and we must use these talents to the best of our ability in the interim between the Lord's departure and his final return. The ideal wisdom figure in the first reading is a model of such industriousness.

Fidelity to the reign of God requires that we be willing to take risks. We do not know the time of the Lord's coming, and so there will have to be a kind of tentativeness to all of our plans. We will never be able to be certain that they will be brought to fruition. We must spend and be spent without the assurance that we will be able to reap the rewards of our investment. To refuse to risk is to refuse to trust.

If we have been wise and have industriously employed the Lord's talents, which were entrusted to us, we will be richly rewarded. However, if we have not realised the potential that is possessed by our talents, and if we have not employed them as they were meant to be employed, we will be punished. The foolish man in the gospel knew that the householder was exacting. He had some idea of what to expect. He made his choice and he had to accept the consequences of that choice.
