Father Paul, I hope you can start your long awaited retirement and we wish you good health and happiness here in the Beverly Hills parish. Thank you for all your help over the past month.


Welcome home Father Peter, we hope you have had a great holiday and a good rest to help you cope with the very busy season ahead.

'The beginning of the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Son of God.' (Mark 1:1)

The opening line of Mark's Gospel...can sound anodyne and harmlessly pious to us, but in the first century, those were fighting words.

Mark's Greek term, euangelion, which we render as "good news," was a word that was typically used to describe an imperial victory. When the emperor won a battle or quelled a rebellion, he sent evangelists ahead with the good news.

Do you see now how subversive Mark's words were? He was writing from Rome, from the belly of the beast, from the heart of the empire whose leaders had killed his friends Peter and Paul just a few years before, and he was declaring that the true victory didn't have a thing to do with Caesar, but rather with someone whom Caesar had put to death and whom God raised up.

Excerpt from the Words of Remembrance for Val Green, by Rod Green (son)

Mum would have been 99 in three weeks' time. How fortunate we are to have had her in our lives for so long! A long life – well and honourably lived! Mum was a child of the Great Depression. Deprived of luxuries growing up, she eschewed them all her life.

She was intelligent, energetic and deeply & truly loved all of her family & friends. She was fiercely independent, & her refusal to become what she saw as a 'burden' on others was a major motivator in her longevity. She lived her life 'doing' for others around her, rather than letting them 'do' for her. Always a giver, never a taker. All of this she taught to us by way of lived example.

As for most of us, my Mother was my first and most enduring love. My first and most loyal friend. My teacher, my carer. The one I knew with certainty would never turn her back. She gifted the lessons of perseverance & striving for better things to all of her family. She was a devoted & loyal friend to many.

The last ten years or so, there has been sadness as Mum watched so many of her family, friends & neighbours pass away. She was the last remaining of all the aunts & uncles of her generation, on both sides of my family. She said to me not long ago "I've lived too long. There won't be anyone left to come to my funeral". Well, on that we prove her wrong today.

She showed to all of us her beautiful qualities:-

Inclusiveness

Acceptance

Openness

Honesty

Faithfulness

And Humility

Second Sunday of Advent, Year B

First Reading Is 40:1-5. 9-11

Prepare the way for the Lord.

'Console my people, console them' savs your God. 'Speak to the heart of Jerusalem

and call to her

that her time of service is ended. that her sin is atoned for.

that she has received from the hand of the

double punishment for all her crimes.' A voice cries, 'Prepare in the wilderness a way for the Lord.

Make a straight highway for our God across the desert.

Let every valley be filled in, every mountain and hill be laid low, let every cliff become a plain, and the ridges a valley; then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed and all mankind shall see it; for the mouth of the Lord has spoken.'

Go up on a high mountain, joyful messenger to Zion. Shout with a loud voice.

joyful messenger to Jerusalem. Shout without fear,

say to the towns of Judah, 'Here is your God.'

Here is the Lord coming with power, his arm subduing all things to him. The prize of his victory is with him, his trophies all go before him. He is like a shepherd feeding his flock,

gathering lambs in his arms, holding them against his breast and leading to their rest the mother ewes.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 84:9-14. R. v.8

(R.) Lord, let us see your kindness, and grant us your salvation.

- 1. I will hear what the Lord God has to say, a voice that speaks of peace, peace for his people. His help is near for those who fear him and his glory will dwell in our land. (R.)
- Mercy and faithfulness have met; justice and peace have embraced. Faithfulness shall spring from the earth and justice look down from heaven. (R.)
- 3. The Lord will make us prosper and our earth shall yield its fruit. Justice shall march before him and peace shall follow his steps. (R.)

Second Reading 2 Pt 3:8-14

We wait for new heavens and a new earth.

There is one thing, my friends, that you must never forget: that with the Lord, 'a day' can mean a thousand years, and a thousand years is like a day. The Lord is not being slow to carry out his promises, as anybody else might be called slow; but he is being patient with you all, wanting nobody to be lost and everybody to be brought to change his ways. The Day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then with a roar the sky will vanish, the elements will catch fire and fall apart, the earth and all that it contains will be burnt up.

Since everything is coming to an end like this, you should be living holy and saintly lives while you wait and long for the Day of God to come, when the sky will dissolve in flames and the elements melt in the heat. What we are waiting for is what he promised: the new heavens and new earth, the place where righteousness will be at home. So then, my friends, while you are waiting, do your best to live lives without spot or stain so that he will find you at peace.

Gospel Acclamation Lk 3:4. 6

Alleluia, alleluia!

Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths:

all people shall see the salvation of God. Alleluia!

Gospel Mk 1:1-8

Make straight the paths of the Lord.

The beginning of the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Son of God. It is written in the book of the prophet Isaiah:

Look, I am going to send my messenger before you;

he will prepare your way. A voice cries in the wilderness: Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight,

and so it was that John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. All Judaea and all the people of Jerusalem made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. John wore a garment of camel-skin, and he lived on locusts and wild honey. In the course of his preaching he said, 'Someone is following me, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to kneel down and undo the strap of his sandals. I have baptised you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit.'

In the wilderness God's salvation comes to a broken people. In the midst of what is seemingly an impossible situation, hope emerges with vigour. In this context, hope is openness to surprise, surprise that God is in no way limited to the imaginings of human minds and the consequences of human history. This is the kind of hope that is proclaimed in the wilderness by John; it is the kind of hope that trusts that from the impossible. God can work a new creation.

There is something of a time warp in Christianity. What is future is made present. The prophetic announces the future as if it is already happening. This sense of the future-present prompts new ways of living. As the future takes root in human lives, the present transformed into a new creation and the Day of the Lord appears.

God's future comes through the wilderness into the broken city and inspires a broken-hearted people. The contrite heart is a broken heart, an emptied-out heart, a hope-filled It is a heart that is unencumbered by the past and that lives currently in the passing of time and the fragility of being alive. The contrite, broken heart can be filled only by what is promised in the future. This is the paradox of Advent. In the middle of the wilderness, God works the impossible in those whose hearts are ready for the surprise of hope.
