Third Sunday of Advent 17 December 2023

The Christmas Party has been a beautiful, long tradition at Regina Coeli. [The carols were added to it starting from last year.] A quick survey among the elderly found that the tradition has been running for at least a decade. Given how often time flies so fast that it surprises us, my guess is that it has actually been going on for up to two decades. Regardless, we were fortunate to be able to celebrate the Christmas Party once again last Sunday, especially with the advent of a new coordinator. The previous coordinator's name was Rita. Her successor's name is Gina. Even in the names there has been continuity!

Although new to the role, Gina showed little or no fear. All I did was to announce the Christmas Party, entrust her with the responsibility and then disappear for a month on annual leave. When I returned, a great momentum had been built up, in terms of both volunteering and participation. I even thought myself, 'Maybe this is how every event ought to be run in the future: with me out of the way!' A small army of volunteers turned up early afternoon for setting up the tables and chairs. Even though there was now extra distance to be covered between the hall and the new school playground, the daunting task was completed in record time!

When the food and desserts started to arrive, it became evident that we would soon run out of space on the serving tables. The church looked about 80% occupied while the carols were in full swing, which appeared to be well received by the audience once again. Many more came directly to the school site, where the jumping castle greeted the children who arrived early. By about 5:30pm, there was a crowd large enough to intimidate any event organisers. Fortunately, ours were ready for this, after having erred on the side of preparing too much food rather than not enough. A long queue formed almost instantaneously. But our senior parishioners were given "priority access" and the rest were compensated for their wait time with a variety of delicious choices.

Perhaps a record-breaking number of families with children attended the Christmas Party! This was partially due to the fact that the coordinator herself was a school mum. I believe that the event was promoted more effectively via private channels (e.g. mums' online chat groups) than via official channels. This was a good reminder to us of the importance of personal invitation when it comes to all matters to do with faith and community-building. By contrast, I thought that the presence of active weekly mass-goers was not as strong as it could have been. This was possibly reflective of my absence over the previous month, but I could be wrong. Nevertheless, the overall number was one of the biggest ever and the fact that so many felt *at home* at this parish event was a real blessing.

First Reading Is 61:1-2.10-11

I exult for joy in the Lord.

The spirit of the Lord has been given to me

for the Lord has anointed me.

He has sent me to bring good news to the poor,

to bind up hearts that are broken; to proclaim liberty to captives, freedom to those in prison; to proclaim a year of favour from the Lord. 'I exult for joy in the Lord, my soul rejoices in my God, for he has clothed me in the garments of

salvation, he has wrapped me in the cloak of integrity,

like a bridegroom wearing his wreath, like a bride adorned in her jewels. 'For as the earth makes fresh things grow, as a garden makes seeds spring up, so will the Lord make both integrity and praise

spring up in the sight of the nations.'

(R.) My soul rejoices in my God.

- My soul glorifies the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God, my Saviour. He looks on his servant in her nothingness; henceforth all ages will call me blessed. (R.)

Gospel Jn1:6-8.19-28

There stands among you, unknown to you, the one who is coming after me.

His name was John.
He came as a witness,
as a witness to speak for the light,
so that everyone might believe through
him.

He was not the light, only a witness to speak for the light.

This is how John appeared as a witness. When the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' he not only declared, but he declared quite openly, 'I am not the Christ.' 'Well then,' they asked, 'are you Elijah?' 'I am not,' he said. 'Are you the Prophet?' He answered, 'No.' So they said to him, 'Who are you? We must take back an answer to those who sent us. What have you to say about yourself?' So John said, 'I am, as Isaiah prophesied:

a voice that cries in the wilderness: Make a straight way for the Lord.'

Now these men had been sent by the Pharisees, and they put this further question to him, 'Why are you baptising if you are not the Christ, and not Elijah, and not the prophet?' John replied, 'I baptise with water; but there stands among you – unknown to you – the one who is coming after me; and I am not fit to undo his sandal-strap.' This happened at Bethany, on the far side of the Jordan, where John was baptising.

Traditionally, the third Sunday of Advent is called Gaudete Sunday. the Sunday of Joy. The joy of this Sunday comes both from the message of the readings and from the anticipation that Christmas is nearing. As described in the Isaian passage, the Messiah is the one imbued with the spirit and with the power of the prophet, the one who will fulfill the promises of God. It becomes obvious in the Gospel that the Messiah is the one proclaimed by the Baptist. John cleared a path for the coming of the anointed one, and from that time on the lives of believers have been the pathway through which the Messiah has entered the world.
