# First Sunday of Advent 3 December 2023

I have been away for so long that it feels slightly surreal to be back. I had been wondering for about a year what it might be like to be free from any stress of work for a prolonged period of time. Now that I know, I must admit to having mixed feelings, which I might discuss perhaps on another day. But I am not complaining! I have been very fortunate to have enjoyed an unbroken, monthlong break. None of this would have been possible, had it not been for a number of key people who could be relied upon to look after the parish in my absence so that I could be free of any concern and easily so. I wish to thank all of them from the bottom of my heart! In particular, I thank Fr Paul Hilder who has been officially retired for a month but is yet to enjoy properly the leisurely freedom of retirement. I trust that by now he has been well and truly reacquainted with most of the parishioners at Regina Coeli.

One of the things which has kept Fr Paul busy over the past month has been the celebration of funerals, of which there have been quite a number. As far as I am aware, at first there was the most tragic death of a father who had two children under the age of ten. And then Val Green, who had hitherto been the most senior parishioner at Regina Coeli, passed away one month shy of 99. And then Sr Marie Therese Weeks, who had been a local resident until several years ago, passed away at the age of 93. Finally, Arthur Webster, a longtime acolyte who used to look after all things liturgical almost single-handedly, also departed from this world. It seems that November really has been a month of holy souls!

The first significant event upon my return has been to host Dr Robert Tilley who gave an Advent talk last Thursday. The idea for this event came about because, just before I left for my annual leave, it dawned on me that there ought to be more opportunities for faith-formation at Regina Coeli. To borrow some of the concepts from the talk itself, our faith has substance which is as real and solid as the coming of God in flesh as a baby. By contrast, what is of the devil is empty and insubstantial, although it can be replete with glamour, which can be rather seductive and addictive. Therefore, in order for us to resist what is of the evil one - what is false, pseudo or virtual - we need to be in contact with the substance of our faith, for the sake of which faith-formation is vitally important. I hope to organise a series of lectures in 2024 precisely for the purpose of providing faith-formation which has substance. Please stay tuned!

The next significant event, which is almost at our doorstep, is the Christmas Carols and Party (next Sunday)! A number of good people have been involved, including a new coordinator. All the updates upon my return have been promising. As I am writing this (Friday), the singers have just left the church after practising the carols. It looks as though we can look forward to another great parish celebration! Please sign up and let it be known that you wish to participate, if you have not done so already. I hope everyone does!

## 3 December 2023

#### First Reading Is 63:16-17; 64:1.3-8

Oh that you would tear the heavens apart and come down.

You, Lord, yourself are our Father, Our Redeemer is your ancient name. Why, Lord, leave us to stray from your ways

and harden our hearts against fearing you?

Return, for the sake of your servants, the tribes of your inheritance.

Oh, that you would tear the heavens open and come down

 at your Presence the mountains would melt.

No ear has heard,

no eye has seen

any god but you act like this

for those who trust him.

You guide those who act with integrity and keep your ways in mind. You were angry when we were sinners; we had long been rebels against you. We were all like men unclean,

No one invoked your name or roused himself to catch hold of you. For you hid your face from us and gave us up to the power of our sins.

Today's readings contain several images: the faithfulness of those who suffer, even as they lament their predicament; the admonition to watch and wait; the expectation of the coming of the Day of the Lord. As trustees of the one who is coming, we live in the 'in between' time of ambiguity and hope. The placement of these readings at the beginning of Advent shapes the context for understanding the entire season. They fix our gaze on the world of human pain and then moves beyond it to the hope of a brighter future. Lamentation and expectation find fulfilment in the Day of the Lord.

Waiting is a prominent image this Sunday. Some people wait to be released from suffering, others await the second coming of Christ. Waiting saps our energies and stifles our enthusiasm. Yet wait we must, and as we wait, we wonder: 'What should I be doing?' The readings suggest that we should wait with patient expectation for the day of reconciliation and peace; we should wait in joyful hope that what is to come will come soon. While we wait, we should faithfully fulfil our responsibilities. We believe that we have a future worth waiting for, that there are promises that God will keep. And so we look expectantly to the Day of the Lord, that future day of ultimate fulfilment.
