This might seem a touch late, I thought it worthwhile to share with you a homily, which explores the meaning of a holiday, which I presented to the staff from Regina Coeli Primary School, just before they went on their end-of-year break (2022):

Last week I was in the staffroom and overheard someone saying (I paraphrase): 'I am empty. I am spent. I have run out. I have nothing left!' If we can identify with what this person said, then, that is a good place for us to pray from; that is also a good place from which we can engage with our scripture readings today.

There is a common theme in our scripture readings:

A woman who feels empty and spent. Why? Because she's been trying for a long time to have a child, but without success. One day she gets a visit from an angel, after which she is able to conceive and give birth to a child, as a sign that she is not alone; God is with her and has heard her cry!

The theme of a woman who is barren becoming pregnant is a major one throughout Scripture, for two reasons. Firstly, the idea of going from barren to fruitful, empty to plenty, despair to hope, etc., fills us with a powerful sense of God's presence - God's merciful presence. Secondly, all these unlikely pregnancies which are mentioned in Scripture are like shadows that point to the real thing which was coming: an impossible pregnancy - a virgin becoming pregnant or Mary conceiving by the Holy Spirit - which becomes the most definitive sign that God is with us, *Emmanuel!*

Only God can create something out of nothing. We know that God is with us especially when we find something where there seemed to be little or nothing before. This happened at the beginning of creation when God created everything out of nothing. It happened again when Mary conceived by the Hoy Spirit. It happens each time the Eucharist is celebrated and ordinary bread and wine become something out of this world - something truly divine. It happens when God's grace is received by us as a pure gift.

I believe that all this can actually help us have a good holiday. We *could* say that a holiday is merely something that gives us just enough rest so that we can come back for more work, until we get tired again. After which the cycle repeats itself like in the movie Groundhog Day. But, according to the philosopher Josef Pieper, that would not properly capture the full meaning of what a holiday is. He said that true holiday (or true leisure) was one which allowed us to find something where there seemed to be little or nothing before, such that we are able to return even better than before we got tired.

For example, true holiday gives us rest not just to the body but also to the soul; it nourishes the soul and gives it growth and strength. True holiday gives us a depth of insight into who we are and what our mission is, so that we can return with a clearer vision and greater hope. In other words, true holiday is something which becomes possible only if God really is with us, which is precisely what we mean when we say Emmanuel - God is with us!



First Reading 1 Sm 3:3-10.19

Speak, O Lord, your servant is listening.

Samuel was lying in the sanctuary of the Lord where the ark of God was, when the Lord called, 'Samuel! Samuel!' He answered, 'Here I am'. Then he ran to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' Eli said, 'I did not call. Go back and lie down.' So he went and lay down. Once again the Lord called, 'Samuel!' Samuel!' Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' He replied, 'I did not call you, my son; go back and lie down.' Your body, you know, is the temple of the Holy Spirit, which is in you since you have received him from God. You are not your own property; you have been bought and paid for. That is why you should use your body for the glory of God.

Alleluia, alleluia! We have found the Messiah: Jesus Christ, who brings us truth and grace.

Gospel Jn 1:35-42

Alleluia!

They saw where Jesus lived and they stayed with him.

As John stood with two of his disciples, Jesus passed, and John stared hard at him and said, 'Look, there is the lamb of God.' Hearing this, the two disciples followed Jesus. Jesus turned round, saw them following and said, 'What do you want?' They answered, 'Rabbi,' – which means Teacher – 'where do you live?' 'Come and see' he replied; so they went and saw where he lived, and stayed with him the rest of that day. It was about the tenth hour.

One of these two who became followers of Jesus after hearing what John had said was Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter. Early next morning, Andrew met his brother and said to him, 'We have found the Messiah' – which means the Christ – and he took Simon to Jesus. Jesus looked hard at him and said, 'You are Simon son of John; you are to be called Cephas' – meaning Rock.

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Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

Today we consider the call to discipleship. The readings outline the various stages of this call and provide a sketch of some of the characteristics of each stage: the invitation, the discerning process and the resulting transformation.

The call is an invitation from God. It might come to us as inner sensitivity, a kind of a dream or inspiration. Our interest might be captured by a person or an event that first attracts us and then beckons us to investigate further. It can come in the innocence and naivete of childhood, in the vigour of young adulthood, or in the wisdom of years. It comes when God calls.

The second stage involves discernment. Most of us need help recognising moments of religious importance and so we seek out women and men who are practiced in the ways of God, who can help us test the spirit. They might be recognised religious leaders or prophetic guides, or they could be friends or loved ones who know us well and who are also attuned to the workings of God in their own lives.

Finally, when we respond to the call, we discover that we no longer belong solely to ourselves; as disciples, we belong to the body of Christ. We belong to the reign of God; we are now part of the mission of Christ. As disciples, we are called to proclaim to the world the justice of God. What a glorious honour this is!
