The story of an immigrant (continued...)

Since the publication of Angelina's story last week, extra information has been relayed to me by the family. The ship that they sailed on was known as SS Syd-

ney. It was built as a C3 Class cargo ship and then converted to become an auxiliary aircraft carrier during the Second World War. SS Sydney was returned to the US Navy in Florida at the end of the war and was now in need of a new purpose. An Italian cruise liner by the

name of *Flotta Lauro* purchased SS Sydney and then rebuilt it as a modern two class liner in 1950/1.

SS Sydney carried around 1000 passengers (90% Tourist class, 10% First class) and around 270 crew. It measured 150m in length and 21m in width.

First class occupied two of the superstructure decks, whilst Tourist had three decks below. Both classes had a large range of public rooms featuring décor and furnishings that had that touch of Italian flair and style. Each had their own pool and open-air cinemas. First class accommodations had single and two berth cabins, some with private facilities. Tourist had mostly two, three or four berth cabins, a few having six to eight berths.

SS Sydney sailed between Italy and Australia from 1951 to 1963, although some of her voyages also included those to the US and Canada. Her services ceased entirely in 1975 when she was broken up by professional ship breakers.

Angelina's story inspired the sharing of another story from Anna who was also an immigrant from Italy in 1951. Who knows, perhaps her family travelled on SS Sydney as well! Anna was 11 years old. Her two older brothers had come to Australia first and then sponsored the entire family to immigrate to Australia.

There was a government policy for supporting struggling immigrants at the time but, unfortunately, Anna's family did not qualify for the \$2.50 government grant as they had been sponsored privately by their own family members. The early days in Australia were very tough for them.

Anna's father who was not exactly a young man anymore had to work in factories. Anna attended school where she hardly understood what was being taught. In those days any systematic program for learning English was not widely available. After a short period of part time school attendance, Anna's parents thought it better for her to work full time and contribute to family income.

Anna's grandmother struggled severely with the new life in Australia. After all, she had left what was a relatively comfortable and settled life in Italy for a new one in which nothing could be taken for granted. The men who had to balance the budget had the heartbreaking task of informing the grandmother of what the family had to go without. She once cried out, 'In this country, I cannot even cook!'



Safeguarding Audit 2023 (written by the Safeguarding Office of Sydney Archdiocese)

As you would be aware, the Safeguarding and Ministerial Integrity Office was established in the Archdiocese of Sydney in November 2015. The role of the Safeguarding Office is to raise awareness regarding our collective responsibility to protect the safety, well-being and dignity of children, young people and vulnerable adults within the Archdiocese of Sydney and to respond swiftly and compassionately in circumstances in which children are harmed or at risk of being harmed.

The focus of the Safeguarding Office is the prevention of abuse and harm to children, young people and the vulnerable within our Archdiocese. To this end, the Safeguarding Office has been developing and delivering training programs on a range of Safeguarding protocols and procedures that work together to protect children and young people from harm. This ongoing training is for clergy, staff and volunteers. The Safeguarding Office also supports all parishes with necessary Safeguarding resources and information. The Safeguarding policy is proactive in that it aims to create and maintain a safe and supportive culture in all Parishes.

The Australian Catholic Safeguarding Ltd (ACSL) is a national organisation established in 2020 with the purpose of promoting and overseeing a consistent approach to the practice of Safeguarding in our Church. The mandate of ACSL is "to support Church leaders and Catholic organisations to create safe and nurturing environments for every person who comes into contact with the Church in Australia". (ACSL Annual Report 2021-2022). The ACSL has developed ten Safeguarding standards which incorporate recommendations from the Royal Commission and also the National Principals for Child Safe Organisations, contextualising these requirements for the Catholic Church in Australia.

In November 2023, the Australian Catholic Safeguarding Ltd began an audit of 40 Agencies, Parishes and Chaplaincy Communities within the Archdiocese of Sydney. Our parish was selected to be audited at this time. The audit involved an online portal self-assessment which was completed in November, and a field audit to be completed in February this year.

Our parish has complied with all the documents required by the ACSL. Clergy, staff and volunteers who are mandated have provided a Working With Children Check Number, completed Safeguarding training, and signed the Archdiocesan Code of Conduct, also Safeguarding risk assessments have been completed for parish events and activities when necessary. Thank you to the volunteers who have, when necessary, provided the parish with their relevant documentation, and also completed Safeguarding training.

The unmarried woman dedicates herself to the things of the Lord, that she might be holv.

I would like to see you free from all worry. An unmarried man can devote himself to the Lord's affairs, all he need worry about is pleasing the Lord: but a married man has to bother about the world's affairs and devote himself to pleasing his wife: he is torn two ways. In the same way an unmarried woman, like a young girl, can devote herself to the Lord's affairs; all she need worry about is being holy in body and spirit. The married woman, on the other hand, has to worry about the world's affairs and devote herself to pleasing her husband. I say this only to help you, not to put a halter round your necks, but simply to make sure that everything is as it should be, and that you give your undivided attention to the Lord.

Gospel Mk 1:21-28

This is a new kind of teaching that speaks with authority.

Jesus and his followers went as far as Capernaum, and as soon as the Sabbath came Jesus went to the synagogue and began to teach. And his teaching made a deep impression on them because, unlike the scribes, he taught them with authority.

In their synagogue just then there was a man possessed by an unclean spirit, and it shouted, 'What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God.' But Jesus said sharply, 'Be quiet! Come out of him!' And the unclean spirit threw the man into convulsions and with a loud cry went out of him. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. 'Here is a teaching that is new' they said 'and with authority behind it: he gives orders even to unclean spirits and they obey him.' And his reputation rapidly spread everywhere, through all the surrounding Galilean countryside.

Discipleship requires a change in us. We want to change because in so many ways we are being strangled to death by demons. We are caught in dysfunction and sin; we live in the midst of the battle between good and evil, the struggle of human finitude and failure. We are plunged into the throes of human suffering and pain, and there seems to be no escape.

The demonic seduces us in more ways than we can count and we are often caught in its web before we recognise what has happened. There have always been many and varied voices that claim to have the remedy for our ills. Preachers and politicians have stirred up crowds and ignited their emotions. Promises have been made and predictions advanced, yet the conflict goes on, the demons continue to hold sway. The demon recognised the authority in the voice of Jesus. Do we recognise it?

When we are released by Jesus from the demons that possess us, we are freed from the stranglehold of evil and liberated to live far less encumbered and divided lives. No Earthly reality will possess us, neither relationships nor obligations nor even religious practices. Rather, we will be possessed by Christ who liberates us for the reign of God. Therefore. whether married unmarried, whether in the midst of the community or at its margins, we will be able to heed the voice of God in our hearts and to recognise Jesus in our midst.

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
