Fifth Sunday of Lent 17 March 2024

Let us lie in wait for the virtuous man, since he annoys us and opposes our way of life, reproaches us for our breaches of the law and accuses us of playing false to our upbringing. (Wisdom 2:12)

What can explain human malice toward a good person who acts in accordance with God's will, thereby doing what is true, good and beautiful? Two reasons come to mind. Firstly, a good person is hated for what he exposes. He reflects back to others, by way of contrast, what they are doing wrong, which inspires feelings of guilt and shame in the wrongdoers, who might then prefer to get rid of the good person rather than to change their ways.

Secondly, a good person is hated - or tested - as a step toward doing the same to...God! Does being faithful pay? The most sensible way to find out would be to try the path of faithfulness and then see what happens. But the foolish are tempted instead to put to the test those who are virtuous. What will God do, if anything at all? Will there be a lightning strike? Will God demonstrate once and for all who is in the right and who is in the wrong, and why the difference matters?

These were a few of the reasons why Jesus was rejected. He came not just as any light but as the *pure light of God*. But the people lived in darkness. Therefore, instead of allowing the darkness within to be pierced and dispelled by the light, they preferred to remain as they were. And so Jesus was rejected, shunned and even persecuted, to the point of being crucified. Perhaps this was also why the prodigal son (Luke 15:1-32) ran from the father's house: because God's pure light shone through the father whilst there was growing darkness in the son.

Sin starts in us a negative cycle. We get tempted and go for the false promise which cannot deliver. Consequently, we discover that we have missed the target. [Apparently, the word 'sin' is an archery term which means to 'miss the target.'] And because we have missed the target we are now less happy, less satisfied, and worst of all, *further away from the house of the Father*, a fact of which renders us more vulnerable to the same cycle which repeats itself. In other words, a negative cycle has been started which can grow larger and larger over time.

What will happen if we follow the negative cycle of sin all the way to its logical conclusion? Whatever happens is precisely what Jesus suffered on the cross on our behalf. On the cross Jesus became like the prodigal son whose life hit rock bottom. This was God identifying with us completely so that, no matter what darkness we are in, He can always find us and raise us up. Speaking of which, Jesus, by *rising from the dead*, proved that divine love is more powerful than all darkness!

Is there darkness within us? God has given us a conscience so that, deep down, we always know the truth. Where are the dark corners or shadowy places within, which we tend to ignore or have forgotten about, and intentionally so? Instead of rejecting God's pure light which shines through Jesus, it is possible for us to trust in him and become illuminated by the light. When we confess from the heart with a depth of contrition we come to taste the joy of reconciliation effected by a depth of God's mercy. This, then, starts in us a positive cycle which can grow larger and larger over time, until God's pure light fills all in all! - Fr Peter -



The pope's message to the Research and Formation Center for the Protection of Minors

Seeing one's own weakness as an excuse for failing to be full persons and full Christians, unable to take control of their destiny, will create childish, resentful people, and in no way represents the smallness to which Jesus invites us. On the contrary, the strength of the one who, like Saint Paul, glories in his weaknesses and trusts in the grace of the Lord (cf. 2 Cor 12:8-10) is a gift that we must ask for in prayer, for ourselves and for others. With it, we will be able to face the contradictions of life and make a contribution to the common good in the vocation to which we have been called.

In terms of prevention, our work must undoubtedly aim to eradicate situations that protect those who hide behind their position to impose themselves on others in a perverse way, but also to understand why they are incapable of relating to others in a healthy way. Likewise, it cannot be indifferent to the reason why some accept to go against their own conscience, out of fear, or allow themselves to be cajoled by false promises, knowing in their heart of hearts that they are on the wrong path. Humanizing relationships in any society, including the Church, means working hard to form mature, coherent people who, firm in their faith and ethical principles, are capable of confronting evil, bearing witness to the truth in capital letters.



A society that is not based on these assumptions of moral integrity will be an ailing society, with human and institutional relationships distorted by selfishness, mistrust, fear and deceit. But let us trust our weakness in the strength that the Lord gives us. And we recognize that "we have this treasure in earthen vessels, to show that the transcendent power belongs

to God and not to us" (2 Cor 4:7).

Fifth Sunday of Lent, Year B

First Reading Jer 31:31-34

The days are coming when I will make a new covenant with Israel and I will forgive their iniquity.

See, the days are coming - it is the Lord who speaks - when I will make a new covenant with the House of Israel and the House of Judah, but not a covenant like the one I made with their ancestors on the day I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt. They broke that covenant of mine, so I had to show them who was master. It is the Lord who speaks. No, this is the covenant I will make with the House of Israel when those days arrive - it is the Lord who speaks. Deep within them I will plant my Law, writing it on their hearts. Then I will be their God and they shall be my people. There will be no further need for neighbour to try to teach neighbour, or brother to say to brother, 'Learn to know the Lord!' No, they will all know me, the least no less than the greatest - it is the Lord who speaks - since I will forgive their iniquity and never call their sin to mind.

'Now sentence is being passed on this world;

moment of eschatological fulfilment gathers together the sense of the past ('the days when Christ was in the flesh'), the future ('the days are coming'), and the present ('the hour has come'). We live in the time when the past and the future are made present; we live in the 'already-but-not-yet' time anticipation/fulfilment. This is a moment of great ambiguity, of fear and trepidation but of electric excitement. It is a moment of decision. We hover at the edge of dawn, weighing whether or not to step forward into the new day or to return to the darkness of night.

This 'hour' brings a new covenant, a deep interior relationship with God that is not based on law but which overflows from a commitment of the heart. It brings an abundant harvest that springs from a simple grain of wheat. It brings a promise from God's own Son that those who serve him will be honoured by God, and those who obey him will enjoy eternal life.

Although the 'hour' brings all of these blessings, it only does so with a price. The new covenant could only be written on new hearts; the abundant harvest sprang from the dying grain of wheat; eternal salvation was won at the price of Christ's blood. As challenging as the message of these readings may be, the last note is one of hope. It can overcome the demons that control us, because it is the power of the almighty God.
