5th Sunday of Easter 28 April 2024

The Catholic Church celebrated the first Holy Year of Jubilee in 1300 under Pope Boniface VIII. The subsequent jubilees took place every hundred years, before they became more frequent - every fifty years at first and then every twenty five years eventually. The last of them was the Great Jubilee of 2000, which tells that we are due for another one in 2025! Pope Francis has chosen as the motto of the Jubilee 2025, 'Pilgrims of Hope.' Here is what he had to say:

...In the last two years, not a single country has been unaffected by the sudden outbreak of an epidemic...Our churches remained closed, as did our schools, factories, offices, shops, and venues for recreation. All of us saw certain freedoms curtailed, while the pandemic generated feelings not

only of grief, but also, at times, of doubt, fear and disorientation...The forthcoming Jubilee can contribute greatly to restoring a climate of hope and trust as a prelude to the renewal and rebirth that we so urgently desire...

So what are we to do between now and the great jubilee of 2025? Pope Francis invites us to prepare for the jubilee by being committed to a year of prayer which is interesting given that I have personally been thinking of the great need for us to talk about *how to pray*. There can be no doubt that Catholics pray, some far more than I do. But how do we pray *effectively*, such that there is maximum room in which the works of God's mercy can be accomplished is us?

Contemplative prayer: a key to wellbeing and renewal. This is a working title for a two part presentation I wish to provide for the benefit of anyone who is interested, in the two weeks leading up to Pentecost. I will offer two evening sessions, as well as two morning sessions (more detail on Page 1). Here is Pope Francis on the year of prayer:

...In this time of preparation, I would greatly desire that we devote 2024, the year preceding the Jubilee event, to a great "symphony" of prayer. Prayer, above all else, to renew our desire to be in the presence of the Lord, to listen to him and to adore him. Prayer, moreover, to thank God for the many gifts of his love for us and to praise his work in creation, which summons everyone to respect it and to take concrete and responsible steps to protect it. Prayer as the expression of a single "heart and soul" (cf. Acts 4:32), which then translates into solidarity and the sharing of our daily bread. Prayer that makes it possible for every man and woman in this world to turn to the one God and to reveal to him what lies hidden in the depths of their heart. Prayer as the royal road to holiness, which enables us to be contemplative even in the midst of activity. In a word, may it be an intense year of prayer in which hearts are opened to receive the outpouring of God's grace and to make the "Our Father," the prayer Jesus taught us, the life programme of each of his disciples. - Fr Peter -



MIRACLE AT REGINA COELI Part 1/2

Psalm 9:1 I will give thanks to you, Lord, with all my heart; I will tell of your wonderful deeds.

I very much like to share about a miracle that happened a couple of years ago in Regina Coeli church. This miracle for which I didn't have the courage to share, even though I felt like standing on rooftops and proclaiming, "Jesus is alive in the tabernacle, body, blood, soul and Divinity." It took me a couple of months to build up courage to share it with Fr Peter Kwak,our parish priest and those who knew me well enough. I prayed and waited on the Holy Spirit to impress upon my heart, as to when I should testify about this miracle to our parish community. It has been weighing heavily on me for close to two years. I feel the time has now come for me to share about this miracle.

It happened after a choir practice. The Choir Master and I would be the last to leave. He would lock up, while I waited for him for a ride back home. It was habitual for me, before leaving, to genuflect before the Eucharistic Lord and say, "I love you Lord, good night." I know, the good night part sounds silly now, but that is how I bade goodbye to the Lord. On this particular night, as I turned to the Eucharistic Lord, what I witnessed amazed me. I stood shell-shocked and dumbfounded. The whole front part of the tabernacle was lit-up with laser like light of beautiful colours. The laser strips of lights running vertically, seemed like they crossed each other somehow in different parts. I kept repeatedly saying, "forgive me Lord, I am a sinner and so unworthy." I felt like my heart would explode. As I turned to walk away, I wondered if I had imagined it. I turned around, and went back to face the tabernacle. THE VISION RE-MAINED. God knew this silly child of his will return to check on the reality of it all. God's eyes are on all of us, every moment. I became tongue-tied. Couldn't even call my Choir Master, nor was I able to share with him right away what I have just witnessed.

Where Jesus is present, so is the Father. Where the Father and Son dwell, so present is the Holy Spirit. Where the Holy Trinity dwells, there are hosts of angels and saints to worship and adore. I believe this is the new Holy of Holies for therein dwells, The Bread come down from heaven, The High Priest and The Word. When Jesus died, the curtain to the Holy of Holies in the temple was torn. We are now blessed, as a holy people and as a priestly people, to approach reverently, to receive the Eucharist Lord.

Prayer: O Lord, may the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, where heaven and earth meet, draw us ever so close to the heart and arm of the Father. May this mystical, spiritually rich and yet so real a heavenly experience be our always. In Jesus Name we pray. AMEN AMEN AMEN.

First Reading Acts 9:26-31

He explained how the Lord appeared to Saul and spoke to him on his journey.

When Saul got to Jerusalem he tried to join the disciples, but they were all afraid of him: they could not believe he was really a disciple. Barnabas, however, took charge of him, introduced him to the apostles, and explained how the Lord had appeared to Saul and spoken to him on his journey, and how he had preached boldly at Damascus in the name of Jesus. Saul now started to go round with them in Jerusalem, preaching fearlessly in the name of the Lord. But after he had spoken to the Hellenists, and argued with them, they became determined to kill him. When the brothers knew, they took him to Caesarea, and sent him off from there to Tarsus.

The churches throughout Judaea, Galilee and Samaria were now left in peace, building themselves up, living in the fear of the Lord, and filled with the consolation of the Holy Spirit.

- that we are the children of the truth
- and be able to quieten our conscience in his presence,
- whatever accusations it may raise against us, because God is greater than our conscience and he knows everything.

My dear people, if we cannot be condemned by our own conscience, we need not be afraid in God's presence, and whatever we ask him, we shall receive, because we keep his commandments

and live the kind of life that he wants. His commandments are these: that we believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ

and that we love one another as he told us to. Whoever keeps his commandments lives in God and God lives in him. We know that he lives in us by the Spirit that he has given us.

Gospel Acclamation Jn 15:4-5

Alleluia, alleluia! Live in me and let me live in you, says the Lord; my branches bear much fruit. Alleluia!

Gospel Jn 15:1-8

All who live in me, and I in them, bear much fruit.

Jesus said to his disciples:

'I am the true vine.

- and my Father is the vinedresser.
- Every branch in me that bears no fruit
- he cuts away,
- and every branch that does bear fruit he prunes
- to make it bear even more.
- You are pruned already,
- by means of the word that I have spoken to you.
- Make your home in me, as I make mine in you.
- As a branch cannot bear fruit all by itself, but must remain part of the vine,

neither can you unless you remain in me. I am the vine,

you are the branches.

Today we reflect on the way salvation brings an ecclesial community into being. This community is joined to Jesus as branches are part of the vine. It is a multi-faceted community, devoted to good works and to prayer.

The image of the vine and the branches is an intimate characterisation of the community of believers who share the same divine life. This community thrives on Christ's resurrected life that surges through all of its members. The early church was a multi-ethnic community. It included inhabitants from Jerusalem, Judea, Galilee, Samaria and even Damascus. Some of these people were firmly rooted in Jewish customs, others were more Greek in their culture. It was the fulfilment of the promises made so often in the past, that the saving power of God would reach the whole world.

Our own ecclesial community of believers is also multi-ethnic. Where formerly parishes or liturgical assemblies might be made up of people of only one ethnic identity or economic status, today there is much greater diversity and rapid change of character. Like the early Christians, we too are often suspicious of newcomers. In the face of all of this variety, we are called to open our hearts to the various manifestations of God's power and to fashion a community that gives glory to God. Today's readings remind us that we demonstrate our love for God and for each other in the way we live. Joined to Christ as branches are part of the vine, we too are enlivened and thereby bear fruit in abundance.

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
