The other parish outing was 'Walk with Christ' - a Eucharistic procession through Sydney CBD to celebrate the feast of Corpus Christi. So, no bus turned up when our parishioners gathered outside the church. I cannot wait for its publication in September!

They will be missed. But I still thank the Lord for the blessing they have been at Regina Coeli over all these years. 

Report on visit by Regina Coeli Parishioners to Mary MacKillop Place on 29/5/2024 - By Kay Peters -

Where in Australia can you go to the tomb of a canonised Saint? Father Peter was able to book a small bus and approximately 21 lucky parishioners set off after mass to the shrine of Saint Mary McKillop at North Sydney. Imagine, not having to fly overseas or make a long arduous journey, just a simple bus ride then arrive about forty minutes later.

Unfortunately Father Peter and Anne Kensey were unable to come and they were sorely missed. Reliable Regina took us "under her wing" and looked after the group extremely well.

We were welcomed by Sr. Annie Bond, an articulate modern Josephite Nun. Whilst we were given coffee/tea and biscuits Sr Annie detailed Mary MacKillop's upbringing, her education, her religious vocation, and her love for the poor and unfortunate. A brochure on the significant dates in the life & Sainthood of Mary MacKillop was handed out.

Next, we did a tour of the Museum, Shop with souvenirs. Then, the group were directed into the chapel built in 1913. Mary MacKillop died and was buried at Gore Hill in 1909. Her body was transferred from the Gore Hill Cemetery and re-interred in the Mary MacKillop chapel on the 29/1/1914. Mary's tomb is in a separate serene area in the chapel where pilgrims can personally benefit from this unique experience. Mass is said every day and the chapel was occupied by our group, Catholics in their work lunch hour, and other visitors. A beautiful, meaningful mass.

More food. After Mass the group went back to the dining room for sandwiches, fruit platter and more tea and coffee. The bus driver did eventually get a parking spot to pick us up. Regina again led the group in the Hail Mary to give thanks for our wonderful holy day.

Thankyou Mary MacKillop for being our Australian Saint. Thankyou Father Peter for arranging our pilgrimage. Thankyou Regina for looking after us so well.

Father Paul & Father Kevin were good friends I think they attended the Seminary together. When we introduced ourselves to Father Paul he said he had heard about us, I wonder who told Him! I had a good talk with Father Paul & became a Catholic on 15th September 1998, what a joy that was I was so happy and so was Sybil. Some time later we were asked to become Eucharistic Ministers. We did the training & started giving Holy Communion, what an honour & privilege. Towards the end of 2005 father asked me if I would like to become an Acolyte I replied, "thank you Father but I don't feel I am worthy for such an honour" Father replied "John don't you think I am the best judge of that" I replied "yes Father & I gratefully accept" I did the training along with several others and became an Acolyte in December 2005.

Gospel Mk 3:20-35

It is the end of Satan.

Jesus went home with his disciples, and such a crowd collected that they could not even have a meal. When his relatives heard of this, they set out to take charge of him, convinced he was out of his mind.

The scribes who had come down from Jerusalem were saying, 'Beelzebul is in him,' and, 'It is through the prince of devils that he casts devils out.' So he called them to him and spoke to them in parables, 'How can Satan cast out Satan? If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot last. And if a household is divided against itself, that household can never stand. Now if Satan has rebelled against himself and is divided, he cannot stand either - it is the end of him. But no one can make his way into a strong man's house and burgle his property unless he has tied up the strong man first. Only then can he burgle his house.

'I tell you solemnly, all men's sins will be forgiven, and all their blasphemies; but let anyone blaspheme against the Holy Spirit and he will never have forgiveness: he is guilty of an eternal sin.' This was because they were saying, 'An unclean spirit is in him.'

His mother and brothers now arrived and, standing outside, sent in a message asking for him. A crowd was sitting round him at the time the message was passed to him, 'Your mother and brothers and sisters are outside asking for you.' He replied, 'Who are my mother and my brothers?' And looking round at those sitting in a circle about him, he said, 'Here are my mother and my brothers. Anyone who does the will of God, that person is my brother and sister and mother.'



Reflection

The first way to reject the real Jesus is to domesticate him, and that is what members of his blood family were trying to do. They thought he was 'out of his mind', madly putting himself [and them] in harm's way and he had to be restrained.

Have you or I tried to domesticate Jesus Christ, to reduce him to a non-threatening Jesus-meek-and-mild? If so, we are closer to the family of Nazareth standing just outside his circle, ready to run for cover, than to the new family seated around him, really listening to him and therefore vulnerable.

The second way is to misconstrue all the evidence of Jesus' mission on earth and to claim that he must be in league with the devil, 'He has an unclean spirit'.

If you do this publicly, as did these religious leaders, then you have deliberately put God's plan for the salvation of others at risk, and it is this which is unforgivable. This is real blasphemy.

We might pause for a moment, implore the grace of God, determine to really hear the Gospels, discern the will of God for our lives, and so come back within the ultimate family allegiance of those who dare to call God 'our Father'.

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
